



Big win for Mossman Mill

After fighting long and hard for a sustainable future for Mossman's sugar industry, Member for Cook Cynthia Lui said she was pleased to see the Palaszczuk Government announce a support package for the long-term future of the Mossman sugar mill.

The money – \$25 million – will be used to assist Far Northern Milling Pty Ltd in the establishment of an innovative bio-refinery that will help to underpin the long-term future of Mossman sugar mill.

Ms Lui said the package meant the mill could keep running and building a bio-refinery was a step closer.

"I have been fighting to get certainty for the growers and to get a clear pathway forward to build a sustainable future for the industry, and this announcement is a strong outcome.

"The bio-refinery will provide a viable future for the mill and long-term economic benefits to the community.

"It will also diversify the Douglas Shire economy through the introduction of a considerable number of green chemical manufacturing jobs.

Chair of Far Northern Milling Maryann Salvetti said the support provided by the Queensland Government was vital to helping Far Northern Milling realise their ambition to develop an innovative bio-refinery to provide certainty to the Mossman Mill and the regions canegrowers.

"We would like to thank Cynthia Lui, the Minister for State Development, Manufacturing, Infrastructure and Planning Cameron Dick and the Department for this support and their vote of confidence in our vision of creating a bio-future for our community," she said. "We now have a pathway forward to save Mossman Mill and the jobs it supports, which is great news for the Mossman sugar community."



Mareeba Hospital on track

Projected time lines for a new Endoscopy Service / Operation Theatre Upgrade Project at Mareeba Hospital are on track.

"Refurbishment of the operating theatre is due to commence in May and services are expected to start early in the 2019/20 financial year," Ms Lui said.

She said they also expected CT scanning services to start in December 2019.

MEANWHILE new staff accommodation at the Hospital, opened in August last year, is well over two thirds occupied with

only two rooms available for extra staffing needs.

"The new staff accommodation cost \$1.5 million and was a big part of our commitment to improving health service delivery in regional Queensland," Ms Lui said.

"After promising to make things happen for Mareeba Hospital to support the great work they do, it's great to see the results making a difference to this community."

January 19 is National Corrections Day which recognises 25,000 frontline staff in prison, parole and other corrective-services. Newell Beach development means safety for all

The promised development of a two-lane boat ramp, floating walkway and an upstream rock groyne at popular Newell Beach is on-track to be finished by late next year, Ms Lui said she was happy to announce.

"Environmental investigation field work and data collection for wave, tide and flood modelling was completed in December 2018," she said.

"Modelling studies and environmental reports are scheduled

to be completed by mid 2019."

She said current investigations would help to assess the most appropriate configuration for the new facility.

"Consultation with local boating stakeholders, Douglas Shire

Council and state approval agencies will happen once the concept has been further developed," she said.

"We have worked hard towards making this popular launching spot be as safe as it can be."

'World class' Wangetti



Preliminary work towards a business case for the Wangetti Trail completed in October last year has resulted in a State Government contribution of nearly \$6 million towards the first phase of what will be a world-class eco-tourism experience, Ms Lui says.

The seven kilometre 'Mowbray North' component of the 94 kilometre Wangetti Trail will stretch from Port Douglas south to the Mowbray River, with construction scheduled to commence in September 2019.

The government had been forwarded a letter of support from the Traditional Owners who were working with the State to develop the idea. "We're partnering with the traditional owners, the private sector and local councils to make this project a reality," she said.

The Trail would be a 'game-changer' when it came to creating tourism jobs in north Queensland.

"This particular section of the Trail alone is tipped to create 30 jobs," she said.

"The Mowbray North piece

is also estimated to bring significant economic benefits to the region with 11,000 additional international visitors per year and \$6.1 million in overnight expenditure.

"Federal funding will be crucial to completing the Wangetti Trail. We'll continue to lobby the Commonwealth to get Tropical North Queensland's fair share and ensure the Wangetti Trail project stays on track."

Douglas Shire Council Mayor Julia Leu said the Mowbray North project included several improvements that locals and visitors would embrace.

"It is especially fantastic to see the re-purposed Old Mowbray River Bridge included, which is a really important project that Council has been keen to get moving," she said.

"This suite of projects will not

only give our visitors another reason to stay in the Douglas Shire, it will provide more recreational opportunities for our locals and deliver a better outdoors experience in their own backyard."

Works for the Wangetti Trail - Mowbray North project will include:

- Re-purposed Old Mowbray River Bridge;
- Visitors' carpark and safety upgrades to the Captain Cook Highway;
- Crocodile viewing platform
- 2.25km mangrove experience boardwalk;
- 5 km trail to Four Mile Beach and Flagstaff Hill; and,
- Indigenous business opportunities for construction, maintenance, guided walks and other activities.

Bamaga

The Bamaga Hospital Staff Accommodation project will see six new one-bedroom units and two new three-bedroom houses built over two years (2018-9) in the far northern community. This will help attract quality health professionals to the region.

'Building our Regions' helps Lockhart



The Lockhart River airport terminal, now complete, is one of the projects short listed in the government's latest round of the Building our Regions program, Ms Lui says.

The site received \$531,000 to provide a new airport terminal building with a total floor area of 108 square metres. Ms Lui said the old terminal would be maintained and refurbished as an important part of the history of the area.

"Projects like these are an exciting part of what can be achieved with this program," she said.

"The terminal will make a big difference to those coming and going

from Lockhart River and the surrounding Portland Roads and tourism areas."

North Queensland sun," she said. "This is an important project requested by the Coen community and our government has listened to and delivered on their needs."



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
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Mr Brown said they hoped the old building would be refurbished because there was a lot of history attached to it. "We feel strongly that it should be maintained," he said.

The long, slow PDR drive...

Nearly 20 years ago former Labor Member for Cook Steve Bredhauer predicted it would take 20 years to complete the seal on the Cape York Peninsula Development Road.

Now, in 2019, Ms Lui says remote communities across the Cape are still looking forward to finally have a well-engineered and more reliable sealed road in what she described was a 'transformational time' for Cape York residents.

"The important thing now is that as momentous and successful as the Cape York Region Package has been, the job is only half done," she said.

The Cape York Region Package was a 5-year \$276 million program of works (2014-15 to 2018-19) jointly funded by the Australian and Queensland Governments to upgrade critical infrastructure on Cape York

Peninsula by the end of this year. "When the final pour of bitumen on the current project is made next year, about 170 kilometres of this road will have been sealed," Ms Lui said.

"That leaves about 200 kilometres of unsealed ochre left to seal.

"I want to see that original partnership continue to finish and we will be pushing for a new agreement with the Federal Government.

"That means we can ensure the pipeline of jobs and training opportunities continues to help fully set up a new and more prosperous future for all our Cape communities."

Torres Strait tour reveals

Since my election prioritising seawall and coastal mitigation works for outer islands in the Torres Strait has been high on my agenda, Ms Lui says...

I was very relieved when the Palaszczuk Government approved additional funding of \$20 million to progress the priority seawall and coastal mitigation works on Saibai, Boigu, Poruma, Iama, Masig and Warraber Islands.

Mitigation works will protect critical infrastructure from the impacts of climate change and severe weather events.



Mer Island to have new health clinic

A new health care clinic on Mer Island in the Torres Strait is a step closer to construction after a detailed business case was reviewed by the government's Investment Review Committee in December last year, Ms Lui says.

"The \$7 million budget allows for design of the clinic and includes a plan for government employee housing to be built on the existing clinic site," she said.

"While there were some land use issues and an Indigenous Land Use Agreement yet to be finalised, it is hoped building will start by the end of 2019 and be finished around mid-2020."
