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Conference visitors inspired by progress



Staff at Gurriny recently took the opportunity to show more than 90 health professionals and students what they have achieved so far in the transition to community-controlled health services in Yarrabah.

From relatively humble beginnings in the 1990s, Gurriny Yealamucka Health Services Aboriginal Corporation been a model of what self-empowerment programs can achieve.

Gurriny CEO Sue Andrews said the visit was very much about transition.

“I think it was a unique opportunity for all of them to visit an Australian Indigenous community,” she said.

“The staff here spoke very eloquently about how Gurriny has grown has grown from the base of the social and emotional wellbeing program, which was all about empowerment, and from there moving into the clinical services of an extended general practice

within the concept of Gurriny’s model of care, which is about community outreach.”

Senior Medical Officer Dr Kingsley Pearson said the visiting group had been attending a World Summit on rural and remote medicine in Cairns over the week.

“730 people attended the conference,” he said.

“I think it was a great experience for those young doctors, and particularly medical students, to hear what we’re doing, because what we are hoping is they then get interested working in more rural and remote locations, which are always starved of good doctors and good health staff.

“It was a very positive and

empowering thing for everyone concerned, not only have that sort of conference in Cairns, but for them to come out and see Yarrabah and Gurriny.

“After we did the presentation for the second group there was a Cree Indian doctor who was impressed to hear the staff talking about how Gurriny had developed.

“She said those were exactly the issues they deal with for their communities and it was hard to actually get governments and health organisations to be aware of the social determinants of health and the importance of empowering the community around health and health decisions.

“That was great feedback for all our staff to hear.”



With my years of experience I always hope to give input alongside my fellow directors, who have experience in their own fields, into the smooth running of the organisation which in turn leads to contented staff and people being well-cared for.

Many of us oldies are eagerly and constantly scanning the horizon for younger people to take over these roles.



Senior Medical Officer Dr Kingsley Pearson

I'm from Sydney, originally, but I spent all of my medical life in rural locations.

I first moved to Nimbin in Northern New South Wales as a GP back in the early 1980s and I was GP there for about 12-13 years. Then I set up in Lismore, just down the road from there in a combined general and alternative medicine practice. I started working for Katherine West Health Service in Lajamanu in the Northern Territory in 2007 and I spent about 18 months with them. After that I worked on Elcho Island in a similar sort of role as a remote area GP for about two years.

And then I heard about Yarrabah and decided to come and do a locum here back in 2010 with Queensland Health and really enjoyed it, and sort of came back on and off between working in the Solomon Islands and the Northern Territory and Yarrabah for a

couple of years. Early last year I initiated a Chronic Disease Program for the community here and through developing that I saw what was happening with the transition and decided I really wanted to be a part of that process.

I have a unique role in Gurriny because I'm also the Medical Superintendent for the Queensland Health doctors in this facility.

That means a dual role, one with Queensland Health and one with Gurriny, and that's mostly to help support the transition process.

And I love it.
