



Our students need YOUR support!

Pormpur Paanthu, in conjunction with Pormpuraaw State School and Shire Council, are doing their best to work with high school students who have not yet returned to school – but they need help and support from parents and carers, and have written a joint letter to the community to explain why.

“All students are now back in school except those in the Cape,” they wrote.

“Due to location, and the biosecurity laws, our boarding students are now falling behind their classmates.

“They will continue to do so if they are not completing and submitting their schoolwork, either at home or in a community venue.

“In addition, now that all the students in Queensland are back in classrooms with compulsory attendance, there may be consequences for students who do not

attend one of the spaces.”

Despite not having any provision in staff or resources, the State School has committed to providing support and options for high school students.

“Ms Rachel is in daily communication with all High Schools,” the letter said.

“Records of completed work and attendance are returned back to schools.

“If students are not engaging with their respective schoolwork, schools may take action and remove access to schooling altogether.”

PPAC has offered staff and the Youth Centre (Corner Shed) to support the School program.

“Staff are providing supervision, lunch, transport when required and snacks,” they said.

“They have Wi-Fi and learning resources available to students.

“As well as this, they are doing home visits, calls and family support to engage our young people.”

A community meeting has been called for 11.30am TOMORROW, Tuesday 2 June, at the Justice Centre to discuss.

Healing Centre

Counselling continues to be delivered face to face from the Healing Centre. Telephone counselling is also being offered to clients. DV prevention month is progressing well with social distancing.

Family Wellbeing

FWB service continues to provide face to face support in the office.

FWB continue to provide home visits (maintaining recommended social distancing requirements) to families which cannot travel to the service.

Men's Support

All Men's Support group activates and Men's Group meetings are limited to 20 people or less.

Night Patrol is still operating, however, transport will only provided for clients being transported to the Women's Shelter.

Youth Centre

Open for students to do online studies (for educational purposes only).

Playgroup

Playgroup is allowed for a group of 20 people or less, including children and parents.

Women's Shelter

Supported Crisis accommodation is still being delivered. Centre-based support (case management) limited to 20 people or less. Women's Group activities limited to 10 people or less.

Early Childhood

(Long Day Care & Outside School Hours Care)

The Australian Government's Department of Education, Skills & Employment has advised all Early Childhood Education and Care services are to remain open during Covid-19.

Services are required to:

- stay open unless closed on public health advice or for other health and safety reasons
- ensure families are not charged a fee, including an out of pocket or gap* fee
- prioritise care to essential workers, vulnerable and disadvantaged children and previously enrolled children
- continue to record attendance of children
- comply with all other provider obligations including National Quality Framework and other relevant conditions of approval under Family Assistance Law.

If families have ceased their enrolment they should re-enrol so they can keep their Child Care Subsidy (CCS) eligibility and subsidies will flow as usual.
