

FNQ Councils meet in Yarrie

The Far North Queensland Regional Organisation of Council's (FNQROC's) AGM and Bi-monthly board meeting were held in Yarrabah last Monday.

The FNQROC represents 13 member councils from Hinchinbrook to Cook and west to Carpentaria, including Croydon and Etheridge.

All 13 attended to see presentations from the Queensland Reconstruction Authority and the Department of Housing & Public Works as

well as the Department of Environment & Heritage Protection, who were there to discuss crocodile management with the Councils.

Representatives from the Department of Infrastructure, Local Government and Planning, and the Local Government Association of Queensland were also at the meeting.

The role of FNQROC is to foster cooperation and resource sharing between Councils and effectively advocate regional positions and priorities, working



closely with regional partners and stakeholders.

Executive Officer Darlene Irvine said their membership represented 17% of Queensland local governments, giving them strength in their advocacy work.

The agenda of the FNQROC includes transport infrastructure and connectivity via ports, roads and rail; reliable and affordable water and energy; respect for and manage of natural assets and environment; equitable social infrastructure; and, an equitable communication network.



In the federal budget Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council was allocated \$5m over four years to build our capacity to run a community based job active service

Last week Council met with the Department of Employment and My Pathway to talk about how such a community-based service should be structured.


