All grades of the Yarrabah Seahawks are still celebrating their historic wins an CDRL grand finals last month.

The A-Grade in particular, created history by winning their first grand final, beating Innisfail Leprechauns 31-22, while the reserve grade took out their game against Brothers, 30-24.

The club has been in the CDRL for 17 years and hundreds of Yarrabah residents travelled to Cairns for a huge day of football action.

After the final siren in the A grade decider Yarrabah supporters ran out to celebrate the win and that continued on well into the week, coach Eddie Prior said.

"The trophy was driven through Yarrabah on the back of a truck and the boys were still celebrating four days after the win," he said.

"On the field we got it spot on for most of the game and it was a real team effort."

Early on the result looked in doubt when the Leprechauns bolted to a 12-nil lead after two early tries in the first 10 minutes.

At the 57th minute, scores were finally levelled.

Prior said it was difficult to nominated the best players – when pressed he mentioned halfback Coleridge Dabah, veteran five eight Charlie Murgha, fullback Hezron Murgha, forwards Jack Webster and Cyprion Mossman and utility and captain Milton Mossman as standouts.

The A-grade win was Yarrabah's fifth premiership in all grades on top of reserve grade titles in 2012, 2015 and the club's first premiership, the under-18s in 2000.

### Blue Card system under scrutiny

Queensland Parliament's Legal Affairs and Community Safety Committee met with Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council and the Community Justice Group last week to discuss a Bill introduced by KAP State Leader Robbie Katter, which will reform the Blue Card system.

The Bill - called the Working with Children Legislation (Indigenous Communities) Amendment Bill 2017 - will create a framework which enables a Community Justice Group to approve the issue of a Blue Card to work in a particular community, even if the applicant has previous criminal offences that would normally mean they would be rejected.

It details a range of factors the Community Justice Group must consider in making its decision. It is the role of the committee to examine how the bill proposes to work.

The Committee will then be required to write a report to the Queensland Parliament with a recommendation about whether or not the bill should become law.

The committee has not yet made a decision about whether to recommend that the bill should become law.

They said that was why they were in Yarrabah, to hear the community's

views and experiences around the Blue Card system.
