Radio station just weeks away

It's been a long time coming, but Yarrabah will soon have it's own radio station - Black Star Yarrabah - operating out of the Indigenous Knowledge Centre.

"It's been a really long time for people over here, and the community is growing all the time," Acting Black Star Manager Jim Remedio (pictured on the right with cabinet maker Steve) said.

The station will join the Black Star network, who have set up nearly 20 similar stations across the Gulf, Cape and Tablelands.

"There's a lot of development work here in Yarrabah, and they really need to have some kind of information service of their own," he said.

"They will get all their support services from us, all their music content and their use, weather, all of that will come through.

"As you can see, we've just started today, we just measured up to put in the desk and furniture.

"We're working on a time frame of about the end of July or mid-August to have it going.

"There are a few regulatory things to do first, and one of the things we want to do is move up higher so we can reach people further south that don't get radio services.

"We will also be setting up a training program so we'll have people on the right production skills and things like that.

"We've got a long way to go, but they've waiting a long time and I guess they want to do it right."

IKC Coordinator Pam Mundraby said it was an honour to host the station, at least for now.

"It will be great," she said.

The Black Star network is owned and run by an organisation called QRAM - Queensland Remote Aboriginal Media (https://qram.com.au/blackstar/)





Housing crisis strategy consultations set to progress through the community

Late last week Yarrabah Leaders' Forum met with Department of Public Works and Housing and Andre Grant from the Centre for Appropriate Technologies (CAT) to progress consultation around the Yarrabah Homeless and Housing Strategy developed by consultant Kate Steel.

YLF members at the meeting included coordinator Cleveland Fagan, as well as local board members and CEOs from Seahawks, Gurriny, Gindaja, Mutkin, northern and southern PBCs, Council and others.

Mayor Ross Andrews said it was a positive meeting.

"A lot of positive feedback was received," he said.

"There are plans for more consultative workshops with block holders and others around the community.

"We hope, by the end of this year, to have a strategy with an appropriate action plan, all evidence-based, ready to present to Governments on Yarrabah's housing crisis."

ANZAC stories caught and kept

In 2016 Council engaged historian Geoff Wharton to research biographies of Yarrabah people who served in the First World War, fought more than a century ago.

Mr Wharton said his quest for information started from an incomplete list about eight names and took him to archives and libraries at Cairns, Townsville, Brisbane, Canberra, Sydney and Melbourne.

"I also made email contacts as far away as Darwin, Perth, Scotland and Wales," he said.

At this year's ANZAC Day service he spoke about the results of his research and provided an exhibition of 14 veterans' portraits to be kept permanently by the Yarrabah RSL Sub Branch.

"As well as five non-indigenous mission staff and two missionary's sons, biographies of seven Indigenous soldiers have been compiled," he said. "These include Privates Jack Baker and Arthur Murdock who served in infantry battalions on the Western Front in Europe and Troopers Harry Doyle, Valentine Hare, David Molloy, William Nicholld (Nicholls) and Jack Pollard who served in light horse regiments in the Palestine campaign."

Mr Wharton's talk was introduced by Uncle Richard Pollard, who wore replicas of the service medals issued to his late father, Trooper Jack Pollard, "A" Squadron, 11th Light Horse Regiment.

The project was supported by a Department of Veterans' Affairs Saluting Their Service grant.




Members of the Hopevale FRC include Victor Gibson, Doreen Hart, Erica Deeral, Selina Bowen and Cheryl Cannon.
