

We're the first!

Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council is the first Indigenous Council to become a newly registered Housing Provider under a new National Regulatory System for Community Housing (NRSCH).

The achievement comes thanks to three years of hard work by the Yarrabah Housing and Community Services Departments, YASC Community Services Executive Manager Vicki Jones says.

"It was a team effort, not only by my team but also the Executive Managers, and CEO," she said.

"There were a number of components to becoming registered

and we had to tick all those boxes."

She said NRSCH was a national system to regulate and monitor community housing providers which came into effect in 2014.

"As we manage and hold the Department's housing stock we had to be registered to be able to continue to deliver a housing service to the community," she said.

"Basically it provides a consistent

national legislative environment in an area where there are complex issues across the board around land tenure, local governments, and local housing co-ops, etcetera.


"The Queensland Government made registration a condition of funding for social housing services under the 2003 Housing Act as a way of supporting the sector and ensuring protection for tenants and assets.

"It means a more structured process for our tenancy records as well as regular routine inspections and meetings with clients to discuss things like rent.

"I'm thrilled we are the first Indigenous Council to attain registration.

"If anyone has any questions please feel free to drop in and see one of our housing team members."





Palm Island ready to blow!

As part of this year's Centenary celebrations on Palm Island there will be a Deadly Didge n' Dance Festival next month.

Festival organisers said the event would include a talent contest, which will run throughout March before a final in April, and a world record attempt.

Yarrabah dance groups are invited to put in an Expression of Interest before 16 March 2018 (a special extension, just for us!) if they wish to perform during the Festival.

No paperwork is necessary to participate in the corroboree or world record attempt.

Performers will be joining musicians and artists such as Dan Sultan, Isaiah Firebrace and Archie Roach as well as local dancers, along with other activities including workshops, storytelling, poetry, markets and more.

Alwyn aiming to walk with the talk

With determination in spades, young Alwyn Doolan from Woorabinda was thrilled to be able to visit Yarrabah last week with news the walk he is planning from Bamaga to Canberra - inspired by Clinton Pryor's walk from Perth to Canberra - should kick off in the next week or two.

Alwyn, 28, has the support of the Woorabinda Aboriginal Shire Council, his community and elders.

"I just wanted to let the locals here

in Yarrabah know that I'll be coming back down and walking through," he said. "And if they have any messages they want me to deliver to Canberra

then by all means I'll be happy to carry that with me."

He said his Yarrabah Festival shirt, presented to him to wear back into the community later this year by artist Philomena Yeatman, was already treasured.

He also said the route he had planned would take in as many communities as possible.

"There's certain stops that I'll make, major towns, but certainly Indigenous communities like Yarrabah, and Woorabinda, where I come from, and all that," Alwyn said.

"This is not just for myself but for our people, and hopefully they'll get behind me to support what I'm trying to do."

He said he hoped Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull would have the "decency" to meet him.

"It's a major thing to walk all this way, hopefully he'll have the respect to actually meet me and sit down and discuss," he said.



Yarrabah's 'older' young people, aged 15-25, will soon be in good hands for at least three nights a week, thanks to the YASC Youth Wellbeing team.

Shaun Murgha, Cyprian Mossman, Gabriel Lui, Lyndell Connelly, Darren Miller Jnr, and Caitlyn Mossman will be working every Thursday, Friday and Saturday nights from 4:30-11:30pm to provide case management and activities such as bubble soccer, cooking classes, lifestyle programs, mentoring, art projects, coaching and hooking up with education, training and employment opportunities.

YASC Community Services
Executive Manager Vicki Jones
said she was looking forward to
the program giving older youth an
opportunity to come along.

"We are currently renovating the Leisure Centre to include a movies room, a games rooms, new kitchen, cooking stations and some hangout areas," she said. "We are also looking to incorporating an outdoor Yarning Circle at the rear of the facility and a new toilet/shower block.

"We want to create a safe and inviting space where they can come along and have a meal, catch up with friends, meet new friends, learn some new skills, and maybe enrol in a course or two.

"We are looking for mentor volunteers to join the program so if anyone is interested in becoming a mentor please contact HR at Council for a Volunteer form.

"We have also teamed up with PCYC's Adrian Thomas – Safe Communities Coordinator.

"He is currently delivering a free Men's Martial Arts program on Thursday nights from 7:30-8:30pm, and on Tuesday night 7:30-8:30pm


for Women in the Community Hall.
