

Mayors pressure for more housing \$

Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull and his Government's decision to cease the National Partnership Agreement on Remote Indigenous Housing (NPARIH) was the focus of a meeting between Queensland Mayors, local government leaders and housing experts in Cairns earlier this month.

A joint-statement from the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Mayors said anything less than the existing program, due to finish at the end of this financial year, would reverse gains made in Closing the Gap targets in health, justice, education and community well-being.

"The meeting also resolved to push to end the exclusion of the communities of Yarrabah, Cherbourg and Torres Shire from national indigenous housing program funding," the statement said.

Yarrabah Mayor Ross Andrews said they didn't want to compete with other communities.

"We want to encourage the Government to continue funding housing stock for our communities," he said.

"All the social determinants are affected by this issue."

Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey said "argy bargy" between the State and their Federal counterparts was not helpful.

"I think it's really important that we don't want to buy into the argy bargy between State and Federal," he said.

"We're only interested in seeing houses being delivered on the ground for our people. Another round of investment from state and the federal governments is really important for our community when we look at the

numbers of housing needed in our community."

Yarrabah Deputy Mayor Cr Michael Sands said it was a political game.

"It's nothing new to me," he said.

"They're using us as a political football, we've got a big waiting list, 3-400, or maybe more than that, and seven to ten houses a year is not going to cater for that.

"We're going to negotiate for more land, if we're successful in getting funding for more houses.

"Housing is the main issue on anyone's agenda, because with housing, health and education comes with it. Things come out of that, health issues come out of that, then you'd have kids not going to school because they never have a good night's sleep, or they haven't got a bed to sleep in.

"It's a big social issue."

Register your animals

A recent spate of complaints from the community about dogs and horses causing problems in our streets has prompted Council to appoint Milton Richards as our permanent Animal Management Officer.

Milton has been helping out in the area for some time as a casual employee, but an increase in complaints about nuisance animals means Council will now be enforcing local by-laws, some of which have already been in place for well over 12 months.

They mean any offending animals may be seized by Council and owners required to pay a fine before the animal can be released.

Council also says dogs, cats and horses must be registered annually.

Registration paid now will be valid to 31 July 2019.


