Welcome back march draws high praise from Governor

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Queensland Governor enjoys first visit to Yarrabah

Governor of Queensland, His Excellency the Honourable Paul de Jersey and his wife Mrs Kaye de Jersey praised Yarrabah State School for their 'welcome-back' march initiative on their first official visit to Yarrabah last Friday.

The visit included opportunities to meet with a variety of community members at the schools, Council and a community morning tea hosted by the Arts & Cultural Precinct.

Mayor Ross Andrews passed on his apologies for not being able to attend due to a pre-planned family commitment, which also included Gungandji King Jabaan.

His Excellency congratulated the school on its initiatives such as the welcome-back march.

"You are fortunate in having families, school staff and a local community so invested in your success," he told staff, students and community present. "Your school motto is Aim High Like a Seahawk, and I encourage you to do just that.

"The seahawk is very special because it is one of the few species that occurs nearly worldwide. It thrives in all habitats."

"Aim high while you are at school, and, like the seahawk, you will find success wherever you choose to go and whatever you choose to do."

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His Excellency the Honourable Paul de Jersey also met with elected members of the Yarrabah Shire Council and discussed a number of projects underway in the community including the jetty project and local festivals.

“I wish you well with the seventh Yarrabah Band Festival in June,” His Excellency said.

“I understand you are expecting an even larger crowd than the 5,000 who attended last year. What a wonderful location for a day-long cultural celebration bringing together leading musicians and community performers.”

Deputy Mayor Michael Sands said the visit was a success.

“We had several points of connection due to him being a retired judge from the Cairns region,” he said.

“I remember him out here in Yarrabah in the early 1990s and having discussions with him.

“He’s got direct contact with Ministers all the time and he’s appointed by the Queen, he’s not elected there, so now we’ve touched base with him, we can use him to get access to Ministers on things like housing or health.

“He even gave us as a Council an invitation for when we’re down in Brisbane.”

Cr Sands said it was good to meet his wife as well.

“She was very down to earth,” he said.

He also said it was clear the Governor and his wife were very proud of their children and grandchildren, who have Cherbourg and Woorabinda connections.

Cr Nadine Cannon said it was an honour and a privilege to meet His Excellency and Mrs de Jersey.

“On behalf of Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council and the community, it was an honour to have them visit our beautiful Paradise by the Sea,” she said.

“It was great to see the acknowledgement, respect and appreciation they had for our cultural identity.”

She said the Governor’s entourage enjoyed a ‘sneak preview’ of the upcoming exhibition ‘Djabu Gilga Yigan (Land Sea Sky)’ and the following morning tea which was attended by Elders, YASC staff, police and other local agencies.

“I also want to acknowledge our local people who were proud and humble, and appreciated the visit,” she said.

'Youpla' focus for Jamal's visit

Former NRL player Jamal Idris and his brother Isaac Simon have taken up ownership of a funeral plan business, now called 'Youpla', which was exposed last year as being non-indigenous owned despite being called the 'Aboriginal Community Benefits Fund'.

Mr Idris said his brother and Mum took over the ownership in December last year and they were keen to get that message out to communities.

"That's why we're here in Yarrabah," he said.

Mr Idris and his staff visited Yarrabah last week.

"We've come here to give the community a bit of information about Youpla now," he said.

"We've met up with the Yarrabah Leaders' Forum and Cleveland, and we've met with the Council.

"Youpla wasn't owned by Aboriginal people but now it is.

"Everyone's been welcoming,

and it's been awesome.

"I didn't get a chance to go to the school, I was going to give them a little Q & A about some football stories, but I didn't get a chance because I was with the men's group having a yarn about a bit of mental health, which was really good."

He said it was his first visit to Yarrabah.

"It's it's beautiful," he said.

"We're out here by the water, it's so different to where I'm from, which is Foster, on the New South Wales coast.

"Cold water people! We feel at home by the ocean."
