Struggle remembered on new plaque

The walls of the Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council foyer are sporting a new plaque acknowledging the work of those who took up the challenge of fighting the government for greater control over our community in the 1980s.

Member for Kennedy Bob Katter said three men in particular - Alf Neal Snr, Roy Gray and Michael Connolly – would always be remembered for their work.

"The people wanted to run their own affairs," he said. "They didn't want to be told what to do by white fellas out of Brisbane, they want to stand on their own two feet. And it was inspirational to me that after 150 years of oppression and suppression they were still able to see the bright shining light of what could be and they were determined to get there.

"When I was appointed minister it was paternalism at it's worst.

"This community had 12 decision makers, every one of them were white fellas, almost all of them from Brisbane, and every aspect of our lives was run and controlled by them.

"But these three blokes: Mick Connolly, who is now an Anglican priest here; Roy Grey, who was a great, inspirational fighter; and Alfie Neal who has never given up – he was in his 60s then and he's still going strong. The three of them were just determined."

Mayor Ross Andrews said the plaque marked the return of the title deeds to Yarrabah in 1986, finally bringing the Yarrabah community under the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Community's (Administration, Justice, Land and Other Matters) Act, or Community Services Act.

"It's a very significant day for our community, where we celebrate the legacy of our three leaders who took up the challenge to the Queensland government about having a greater say and having greater control of our community," he said. "We celebrate their courage and vision for our community."

"It was a long, hard struggle but handing over the title deed back in 86 meant we came under the Community Services Act, which gave us a greater say in building up our community.

"It was a tool we could use to achieve self-management for our people, it meant a lot to us back then and today as well."

He said many of those challenges had carried forward to the present.

"Those challenges continue today, where all of the negative social indicators are still pointing in the wrong direction," he said.

"So even though those challenges remain today, we continue to try and work with government, nongovernment organisations, private, corporate and the other sectors out there to help us.

"We have worked really hard in terms of building up relationships, and with the efforts of Bob Katter to help us achieve our vision back in 86, we continue with this struggle."

He said it was important to keep working for what they wanted to achieve.

"We had discussions today about getting people engaged in real economy, small business as well, building up an economy where we create employment and we access other markets out there such as tourism," he said. "It's important for us to continue on that journey, to continue to work hard, and to continue working with government to try and overcome many of the challenges we're facing."





SeaGals win on Palm Island

Yarrabah teams – especially the SeaGals! – did well in this years Christmas Cup on Palm Island earlier this month.

It was the first time the competition had been played in more than 20 years and featured three matches: local team the Butler Bay Bulls defeated the Woorabinda Warriors 26-24 for the Hector 'Dibby' Poynter Shield; Yarrabah's own SeaGals defeated the Barracudettes 48-4; and in the main match Barracudas won over Yarrabah 36-18.

In the women's match, Sezen Oraloglu

was named Best Back and Timmekka Hunting-Singleton Best Forward.

Barracudas coach Fred Bulsey snr said the main game was a good action-packed showdown.

"The big crowd of more than 800 loved the football, which we won, but credit to Yarrabah for coming down," he said. It was a long day for players and supporters who left Gordonvale at 2am on the day for a 320km bus road trip before catching the ferry to Palm Island with the Woorabinda Warriors, who had travelled twice that distance.

It was generally agreed it had been a hot but fun and relaxed day, and a great opportunity to catch up with families before Christmas.
