Proud day for new carpenters

More than three years of hard work, determination and commitment has paid off for five of our finest young men who have recently graduated from their apprenticeships and are now fully-fledged Carpenters.

The five have already been instrumental in the construction of more than 20 houses in Yarrabah during their training, and are currently working on another four to be completed by June this year.

Last year graduate Charles Murgha told the ABC's Ann Arnold how boys had stopped to watch the work they were doing and ask them how they could get a job building houses when they left school.

He said completing the apprenticeship made him proud.

YASC Works & Infrastructure Executive Manager Dawn Lake said the Council and community was also proud of their achievements.

"These men completed their pre-vocational and on-the-job training while they worked on house upgrades in Yarrabah for six months before they joined the Council," she said.

"Over the past three years they have worked on the construction of no less than 23 houses in the community.

"Fredrick, Roy, Coleridge, Wendell and Charles have gained valuable skills from their mentors Gerard Cullen,



Wes Gray and Colin Fourmile since the very beginning of the New Housing Construction program, which started in 2015.

Mayors make their cases i

A delegation of nine far north Queensland Mayors and CEOs, including Cr Andrews, present a federal election ‘wish list’ to politicians in Canberra last week.

Cr Andrews said he was invited to present to Prime Minister Scott Morrison on behalf of the delegation on housing issues across the region, which included Cape York.

“I gave a presentation to the Prime Minister on the National Partnership Agreement on Re-mote Indigenous Housing (NPARIH),” he said.

“They haven’t really moved on it and it’s still a political football between the federal government and the states.

“The best we can do is just keep talking to our politicians about it, and plugging our case.”

Cairns Mayor Bob Manning said the unity shown by the delegation was important.

“This delegation provided an opportunity for all Far North Queensland councils to work together for the good of the broader region,” Cr Manning said.

“A shared approach holds greater weight and demonstrates the level of cooperation and coordination we have up here.”

Cr Andrews said there were spin-offs for everyone in the range of commitments sought by the group,

which included environmental management, tourism infrastructure, digital connectivity, Great Barrier Reef management and housing for Indigenous communities.

The Mayors were Cr Bob Manning – Cairns Regional; Cr Jack Bawden – Carpentaria Shire; Cr John Kremmer – Cassowary Coast Regional; Cr Scott – Cook Shire (Deputy Chair); Cr Trevor Pickering – Croyden Shire; Cr Julia Leu – Douglas Shire; Cr V Devlin – Etheridge Shire; Cr Joe Paronella – Tablelands Regional; Cr Ross Andrews – Yarrabah Aboriginal Shire Council.

The United Nations General Assembly declared 2019 the International Year of Indigenous Languages (IY2019) to raise awareness of the crucial role languages play in people’s daily lives. One of Yarrabah’s many contributions to language survival over the years was the
