

Sandy Boyd residents to move for their safety



For their own safety, and after agreeing with their families, Sandy Boyd residents will be moved, Palm Island Mayor Mislam Sam says.

"It's in their best interests, we don't have the staff to keep them safe," he said.

"This virus is running rampant through out community — we've had a couple of close calls and we are at high risk right now.

"So we went out and spoke to the families and we all agree – the move will be for everybody's benefit."

Kids eligible for vaccination now

Children aged from 5-11 are now eligible to be vaccinated, and should be before they return to school, Indigenous health experts say.

They said getting it done before the school year started was essential.

"The vaccine is one third of the dose for adults and will help to protect all of us," they said.

"Vaccinations are available at Palm Island Community Company PICC health centre from Tuesday and teams will be visiting families at home as well

"Don't miss out what

so many Australians are struggling to get access to.

"School is delayed so kids don't start school during peak sickness and have a chance to get protected."



The State Government said "add a jab to your back-to-school checklist".

"From today, children aged five to 11 are eligible to receive a COVID-19 vaccination," they said.

"The last thing we want to see is Queensland children sick in hospital with COVID-19.

"Parents are being urged to get their children vaccinated as soon as possible."



Rapid tests on the table for all incoming visitors

Rapid testing prior to travel on Plane or Ferry or Barge for Palm visitors is in place, Palm Island LDMG says.

They said the testing was optional for residents. All flights, ferries, barge trips now have Rapid Antigen testing available.

"We are very fortunate to have access to these tests - can't buy them anywhere yet," they said.

"If you are not a resident of Palm Island and you are visiting for any reason you should be tested before you travel."

They said if you tested positive on Palm as a visitor you would generally need to isolate where you are tested.

"Find out before you leave, this protects anyone accidentally coming when they are positive but don't know it," they said.

"You won't be allowed back on Hinterland or the Ferry if you are positive."


If residents would like to test before they travel that option is available to them as well.

They said the test took 15 minutes and to therefore arrive early.

"Remember you are the most contagious before you show any signs of symptoms," they said.

"Everyone is working together to provide this service including our wonderful Aboriginal Health Workers, SES volunteers, Council staff, Transport operators and our health services, just to name a few."
