Mayors call for housing support

Mayors and councillors from Queensland's 17 First Nations councils met in Cairns last week at the Local Government Association of Queensland's (LGAQ's) Indigenous Leaders Forum (ILF) to discuss issues of critical importance to their communities.

Chairs for the two-day meeting were Lockhart River Mayor Wayne Butcher and Hope Vale Mayor Jason Woibo.

Sessions included open 'Yarn Up' opportunities for each of the local government areas to raise their own issues, as well as youth crime, COVID updates, Indigenous businesses and vendor panels, regional waste planning, alcohol management plans, marine infrastructure and freight, housing and land tenure. *Continued next page...*

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The meeting voted to lead a delegation to Canberra to get action on housing after the major parties failed to send a minister or shadow minister to the ILF at the height of the Federal Election campaign.

ILF co-chair Lockhart River Mayor Wayne Butcher said the lack of action spoke volumes about their priorities.

“If they won’t come to us, then we will go to them because unless this issue is addressed our communities will continue to fall behind,” he said.

He said they would continue to pressure all political parties because the overcrowding crisis simply could not be allowed to continue.

LGAQ CEO Alison Smith backed the ILF and said they were calling for \$100 million a year over the next five years for housing.

During the program you will also learn about the support services available to help you succeed in your studies, meet other students who will be an important network for you, and become aware of the range of scholarships that are available to support your studies.
