PIASC moving and shaking at statewide Councils' meeting

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council has tabled several motions for consideration this week at the Local Government Association of Queensland's annual conference in Cairns this week.

They include asking delegates from 75 of the state's 77 local councils to consider supporting the Uluru Statement from the Heart's Voice campaign for a referendum, which has already been supported by the national Australian Local Government Association, as well as motions around infrastructure funding arrangements, renewable energy intiatives, housing and Police Liason Officers.

The Indigenous Education & Research Centre covers all accommodation, meals and travel costs for students participating in this program.


