Palm mentioned in Path to Treaty Act passage

The Path to Treaty Act 2023 became law in the Queensland Parliament's sitting in Cairns last month.

Local MP Scott Stewart told the Parliament he supported the Bill.

"This bill signals to everyone that we are ready and willing to confront the past and work together on a better way forward," he said.

"Truth-telling and listening are key as we embark on this landmark journey together.

"There are not many places

in Queensland this applies to more than Palm Island, which has at times had a dark and troublesome history.

"Sadly, more than 100 years ago Palm Island became a place to which more than 40 different Indigenous groups were displaced and forcibly sent.

"For this reason, it is a unique community with a huge range of voices." Continues next page...

"As the local member,
I know some of the
struggles Palm Island has

face," Mr Stewart said.

"What I continuously hear is that community leaders on Palm Island want to work more collaboratively with governments.

"That was made clear to me during the committee's public hearing on Palm Island earlier this year.

"While we are doing that now, we can always do it better.

"Path to Treaty will help make partnerships and relationships with Indigenous people right throughout Queensland more meaningful."

The Path to Treaty Act 2023 was underpinned by the UN Declaration to the Rights of Indigenous Peoples, and specified key bodies to be appointed to progress the Queensland truth telling and healing process and to prepare community for treatyreadiness.

Interim Truth and Treaty Body (ITTB) co-chair Cheryl Buchanan said they were excited with the changes unfolding that would support progressing the truth and treaty process in Queensland.

"It was so surreal to witness both sides of the House vote on something so important and historic," Cheryl said.

"My hope is the Act will allow us to move to place of conciliation.

"That we start to look at how to mend our hearts, our minds, our values and to not replay the trauma of the past everyday, but to celebrate this time in our history and remember those who came before us, the proud amazing warriors—men, women and young people.

"It's time for change."

A reshuffle of the Queensland cabinet saw the appointment of the Honourable Leeanne Enoch MP as the Minister for Treaty, who said she was "absolutely determined" to help guide Queensland through the truth and treaty process.

A key focus for the ITTB was to lead the establishment of the First Nations Treaty Institute and to support the Queensland Government to establish the Truth Telling and Healing Inquiry.

The Institute and the Inquiry will guide Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples and the Queensland Government in working together towards truth telling, and ultimately treaty negotiations.

Local workers drive Sewer Treatment Plant upgrade

PIASC received funding to upgrade our Sewer Treatment Plant through the Local Government Grants and Subsidies Program (LGGSP - \$1.7mil) and Building Our Regions (BOR - \$2mil).

PIASC Reform Coordinator, Water and Waste Steve Martin said the first part of the project was to clear and level the land.

"The old STP structures were removed and the land cleared and levelled," he said.

"All of this work was performed by Council employees, using some new plant and equipment that was recently purchased by Council.

"Employees did a series of training programs that gave them the qualifications to carry out this work, which was mostly carried out by Lenin Yasserie and Billo Wotton.

"The next phase of the project is to build a new two million litre balance tank.

"Construction of the footings for that tank will commence this month.

"Over the next 12 months, Council will construct new screens, pumps, pipework and other structures that will change the way our Sewer Treatment Plant operates and improve the quality of the effluent that flows to Francis Creek."

"In the next three weeks, works will be carried out and we ask that all parents ask their kids to keep away from the work sites," he said.

"This will not interfere with junior and senior players wanting to train at the netball courts and rugby league grounds during the week."

The one day rugby league carnival was established in 2009 by the Cowboys to bring communities together and promote the importance of inclusion in North Queensland.

The event has grown to include local and mainland teams of 15 players aged 10-12 years.


This year's winners were St Clare's Catholic School ahead of runners up, Marian Catholic School.

Uncle Ray Dennis loved Palm Islanders and Palm Island, and Palm Island loved him, long time friend and supporter Alf Wilson writes...

That was evident from the first time I saw him there not long after he arrived on Palm in 1999.

I got a call from the nowdefunct Aussie Post magazine to go to Palm to do a story and pics on Ray training local boxers, in what the editor of the day described as a "tin shed".

We became warm friends and I stayed with Uncle Ray many times early on.

At first he lived in the dongas - Council accommodation which he was caretaker for - near the footy oval.

He then moved to the building in the park that used to be across from the mall, where I also stayed with him many times.

There were many trips to the PCYC gym where he loved training the boxers, both male and female.

Most were young, some were adults.

I also used to catch up with

him at boxing tournaments in Townsville, and I travelled with him and the boxers to many out of town destinations.

These trips, in small buses, were to places from Mount Isa to Emerald, Blackwater, Rockhampton, Charters Towers, Ingham and Cairns, to name just some.

On every trip Uncle Ray, who was a pensioner, would buy food for our young boxers.

One trip, I recall he could not arrange a sponsor to hire a bus, so he paid for it from his own pocket.

He was passionate for the boxers and their families, and indeed the entire population of his beloved Palm Island.

We would often walk down to the Coolgaree Bar and Grill, and just about everybody would greet him — "hello Uncle Ray" — as a mark of their genuine respect for this wonderful man.

He was always at NAIDOC celebrations, Spring Fairs and football games on Palm, supporting the community he loved.

It was an honour to be able to be at the boxing tournament held at the PCYC in 2018 as part of Palm's 100-year-old anniversary event.

There he was recognised and applauded by hundreds for his achievement of being inducted into the Queensland Boxing Hall of Fame.


In recent years Uncle Ray struggled with illness and mobility, but his love of the Bwgcolman people and their island paradise never waned.

Tribute: Thomas Geia


