It's a BIG job!

A new Balance Tank is part of the upgrade of the Sewer Treatment Plant designed to improve the management of sewerage on Palm Island.

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council Water and Waste Reform Coordinator Steve Martin said the new tank could hold up to two million litres of sewerage.

"It's main function is to slow the rate that sewerage is fed into the Bioreactor, allowing us more time to treat the sewerage and thereby improve the quality of the effluent," he said.

"The tank will also allow us to take the Bioreactor offline for repairs or maintenance - something that cannot happen now.

"We have been delayed by the recent rain from Cyclone Jasper, but we hope to have the base poured in mid-January, 2024.

"The steel tank will then be erected in February, 2024."
