Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council's (PIASC's) new Information Communication Technology (ICT) Support Officer David Yasserie was born in Townsville but grew up on Palm Island.

He went finished school at Shalom Christian College. "I did my certificate II in Information Communication Technology (ICT) doing a traineeship," he said.

"I've recently worked for Commonwealth doing an Indigenous Cadetship Program in the ICT field at Brisbane office.

"The best job I ever did was decommissioning laptops, entering all the laptops serial and model numbers into a spreadsheet before sending them to the service provider like DELL or Lenovo."

It was precise work that has left him feeling wellqualified to take on his new role with PIASC.

"I want to give all the knowledge and skills that I've learned and gained over the past eight years," he said.

"I studied at university for six years, did multiple internships and lived and worked in Brisbane for the past two years."
