Protective services team ready to be formed next month



Queensland Police Service's Protective Services Group (PSG) First Nations Recruit Course kicked off last week, with 11 participants from Palm Island, Yarrabah and Lockhart River.

Protective security officer recruits complete a comprehensive training program that covers operation skills and tactics training; security legislation; and organisational policies and procedures.

In opening the course PSG Commander Supt Keiryn Dermody spoke to participants about how QPS — as an organisation and as individuals — needed to be proactive and dedicated to breaking down cultural barriers.

She also said how pleased and excited she was to be able to lead and provide support and guidance to an initiative that has now proven its ability to promote and enable cultural change across the QPS and the wider public sector.

QPS First Nations Division Uncle Adrian Coolwell was also in Townsville to support participants as a course mentor.

Palm Island will have a full contingent of 14 Protective Service Officers at the completion of the course next month.



PM invited as Mayor lobbies for housing

Prime Minister Anthony Albanese has an invitation in-hand to visit Palm Island community after re-elected Mayor Alf Lacey hit the ground running with his first week of meetings in Brisbane last week, thanks to the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ).

A small contingent of mayors was able to join — and put a question to — Prime Minister Anthony Albanese at the Queensland Media Club.

Mayor Lacey said he took the opportunity to invite the PM to Palm Island — and was told he should "work with the PM's office to make it happen".

He said it was good to be back. "A couple of State Ministers were there and one of them said,

'Alf, we've been waiting for you to return'."

The LGAQ table of mayors included Lockhart River Mayor Wayne Butcher, Ipswich Mayor Teresa Harding, Gladstone Mayor Matt Burnett, Toowoomba Mayor Geoff McDonald and Mayor Lacey.

Mayor Butcher also said it was good to see Mayor Lacey back.

"He's straight back into it and it's great to see him back," he said.

Mayor Lacey said the question they asked the PM was around housing.

"Wayne and I took the opportunity to pursue the Prime Minister further on investment for housing in our communities," Mayor Lacey said. "We want an investment similar to the Northern Territory, who have \$4 billion."


The question, read to the Prime Minister by MC Lydia Lynch read in part: "When will your Government announce a similar deal for Queensland?"

Mayor Lacey said the answer was a work in progress.

"There are negotiations still happening between the states and Commonwealth," he said.

"From our point of view, we want to be at the table for those negotiations.

"Hopefully we'll see a better outcome for our communities then."
