## Local government candidates urged to attend free training session

Community-minded residents considering nominating for Council in March are urged to go along to a free information and training sessions to be held at the RTC later this month.

Department of Local Government, Racing and Multicultural Affairs Director-General Warwick Agnew (left) said the sessions were to assist people who may not be able to access the compulsory training online before nominating.

"While the compulsory training is online on the department's website, these sessions allow those people who may not have access to the online training to fulfil that nomination requirement in person," he said.

"It's vital intending candidates have a clear understanding of what is required so they can be confident as a candidate

and then as a councillor, once elected."

He said all candidates needed to be aware of recent reforms



aimed at improving transparency and accountability.

"These changes will have an impact on the requirements for candidates in the lead up to the elections, from compulsory training, to dedicated campaign accounts as well as tighter reporting obligations on expenditure, gifts and donations," he said. "Of course, anyone putting their hand up as a candidate in the elections, needs to go in with their eyes wide open, particularly in terms of their legal obligations."

The "So You Want To Be A Councillor" session will be held at the RTC from 1.30-4.30pm on Thursday 20 February.

"Over the past twelve years I have worked firsthand with freelance artists and artists from the Arts Centre's network, all peak arts bodies in Australia and all of our Commonwealth and State arts funding partners.

"I was fortunate to arrive at the emergence of the FNQ Arts industry which set the foundations for IACA, UMI ARTS, CIAF and Arts Queensland's 'Backing Indigenous Arts' funding.

"The report 'I Just Want to Paint' (2006) was the dream of a group of senior Indigenous artists whose vision was to have a strong FNQ Indigenous Arts Industry.

"Many of these leaders are no longer with us and I believe it's important their dreams are not lost to history.

"I am looking forward to my new Role at CIAF and will always have the Yarrabah Artists and Arts Precinct close to my heart." Ms Boll has worked as an independent curator in several locations including Girringun Aboriginal Art Centre.
