Restrictions eased - with more to come

Restrictions on movement in and out of Yarrabah have eased and residents can now travel during daylight hours as long as they leave and return within a six hour period, Mayor Ross Andrews says.

But, he said, any future detections of local transmission of Covid-19 in the Cairns or Hinterland Area will mean a review and possible return of restrictions.

"There has been a couple of demonstrations over the past few weeks where people have expressed their concerns about the restrictions and their frustrations in terms of being restricted now for the past 10 or so weeks," he said.

"I can understand their frustration, but we've been working through a process with the State and the Federal Governments since then and we have been able to ease some of those restrictions.

"Over everything else, we are following public health advice so we can look after and protect the most vulnerable people in our community, who are our elders and chronically ill.



"The restrictions to date have been a challenge for all of us and I hope it has helped that we can now travel to Cairns and go about our daily business, do some shopping, pay bills and so forth.

"Some of the feeling I've been getting is one rule for Queenslanders and other

rules for others, but I think it's really important to see Covid-19 for what it is – a threat to life.

"The virus is real and until there is a vaccine or a cure we all need to remain vigilant, and we need people to understand: if there is another outbreak in Cairns or in our region, the restrictions will be back."

He said residents living away from the community were still subject to the 14 days isolation condition. He also said anyone who did not have exemption pass was still obliged to apply for isolation or exemption if they wanted to return.

"The Local Disaster Management Group (LDMG) and Council has worked hard on a comprehensive crisis response plan to protect the community, not only from this pandemic, but from any future emergencies," Cr Andrews told SBS News last week.

"We have a comprehensive quarantine isolation plan and a proposal that we

have submitted to the District Disaster Management Group (DDMG) and from there, that proposal will go to the State Government. I think it's important to acknowledge that we need to balance health and safety with community wellbeing.

"Remembering we have very high levels of chronic disease and we have overcrowding, which are the result of systemic neglect from governments over a very long period of time, the question for us is, 'how can we find the right medium that will work for everybody?'"

He said once the Federal Government transferred responsibility for the Biosecurity Act back to the State Government's Chief Health Officers Directive process, the plan would become a reality.

"We are all looking to the 12th June 2020 to see what happens next," he said.

"It's a challenging environment for all of us at the moment."

Donations gratefully received by several Yarrabah agencies

Far from being 'out of sight, out of mind', hundreds of donations have been made to support the Yarrabah community during the lockdown period, including a full truckload of goods diverted from heading down south.

Circles of Care Yarrabah Program Coordinator Leisa Garling said several services were working together to make sure the goods went to where they needed to go.

"The donations have come from all over Cairns and the surrounding areas," she said.

"They included six pallets of goods which were bound for bushfire country down south.

"But the lady who collected them, Jaimie-Lee Markham, contacted us and said she wanted them to come here, after she heard about our situation.

"When I asked who helped her to put it all together she said, 'a small group of friends and strangers offered their time to collect, sort through and pack'.

"The logistics were tricky but

we spoke to Council and they not only offered to pick up the items with their truck but they gave us a space to sort through, store and put packs together for families.

"They even made their own staff available to us to help, which was amazing – it wouldn't have been possible without YASC's partnership and support."

She said the donated items included:

- Clothes from sizes 0000 to 5XL
- Hygiene items
- Nappies, wipes, baby food
- Blankets & sleeping bags
- Towels
- Kitchenware
- Some non-perishable food
- Animal food

MEANWHILE St Alban's Op Shop was continually receiving basic household goods and had a lot of winter clothing at the moment, Rev Annette told the Yarrabah News.

"During lockdown the op shop was the only department store In Yarrabah and became somewhat of a community hub and gathering place," she said.

"We will continue to endeavour to stock the things people need, particularly for those residents who do not have a way of getting in to town for shopping."

She said the Church was grateful for the support of Total Food Network, who planned to hold a sausage sizzle fundraiser for them in early June.

REMEMBER: there is no treatment or vaccine - getting into an ICU will be really hard if lots of people get sick!


