- Restricting autonomy
- Gaslighting
- Name-calling
- Controlling money
- Reinforcing roles
- Jealousy
- Controlling your body
- Making threats
- Sexual coercion

How do we want other people on the mainland to view us? That's not our culture. We know it's not. There's a lot of reasons why these things happen. One of the things we fail at, is our men not taking responsibility for our actions, we choose not to do anything about it, or ourselves. They are choices we make every day." Uncle Alfie Clay.

Australian Literacy & Numeracy Foundation Ambassador Jeremy Donovan spent two days on Palm Island working with students on several projects around the community last week.

"Coming to Palm Island is always like coming home for me," he said.
"As a proud Kuku Yalanji man,
Palm Island has always felt like home with family connections throughout the Island community."

He said he had been an Ambassador for the ALNF for 15 years.

"The ALNF also have a strong connection to the Island, working with staff at St Mary MacKillop Goodoo Early Learning Centre,

St Michael's Primary School and Bwgcolman Community school since 2010," he said.

"The Early Language and Literacy (EL&L) team Jo and Ilona were here the week before, working with Goodoo and St Michael's and look forward to returning in August."

He said in January he had started a conversation with their 'Subtext: Art for Literacy' team about bringing the program to Palm Island.

"Working alongside Sarah Donnelley who heads up the 'Subtext' team, we worked to capture the Stories of the Island through the eyes and voices of the young people," he said.

"We worked across all the schools on the Island inspiring learning through the expression of Art and Culture.

"My story of success has always be grounded in both of these.

On our last day on the Island, Jeremy supported Bwgcolman students to repaint two of the pillars damaged with graffiti. "Using one of my Basic art concepts, I talked with students about a shared desire to use this approach to cleaning up some of the graffiti on the Island," he said. "I am hoping this is just the beginning and I can return soon to work with the students to paint them all in detail capturing and creating their stories."

Music, Art and Culture, nothing is more rewarding than bringing this passion back to young people on community — even more important when many of these young people are my family."

He said he was born in Mossman Gorge but raised in foster care.

"I know what displacement looks and feels like," he said.

"Having failed in school and spent much of my young life incarcerated I could of been defined by pain.

"But pain became my foundation of inspiration and success."

He said he was excited to support students to share their stories and create online 'eBooks' to share and celebrate.

"The students we worked with at St Michael's and Bwgcolman were incredibly respectful and engaged," he said.

"We were so impressed by their creativity, storytelling and pride in this special place.

"The Island should be very proud of its young people."
