


A team from the Local Government Association of Queensland (LGAQ) flew into Palm Island to deliver an Elected Member Update (EMU) earlier this month.

liveable one," they said.



Due to increasing numbers of horses on Palm Island, a removal of horses to the mainland — where they will be rehomed — will start tomorrow, Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council Civil, Open Space and Training Manager Vaughn Charles (pictured below) says.

Under the local laws of the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council (which can be found on the website) there were conditions for owning a horse on Palm Island.

They included they must be kept in a holding area no smaller than 5000 square metres per horse and they must be prevented from wandering in public places unless they are under control.

Mr Charles said the Council's Animal Control Team had worked with landholders and horse groups on the mainland to identify suitable land/homes.

"We're aiming to take up to 50 horses off Island in a horse truck this time, and if it works we will do it again in the future." he said.

He said they would be supported by a police escort when they moved the horses from where they were being held to the barge via truck.

"The selection of horses for rehoming off Island will be managed by the team, who will continue to meet with community members, interested stakeholders and horse owners as needed," he said.

"The Animal Control team will also be taking steps to make sure horse numbers are kept to a minimum, such as desexing stallions."

Council CEO Michael Bissell Owners needed to take responsibility for their horses and action would be taken where necessary to enforce local laws.

"Council would like to thank the parties who have engaged with us to make this happen, especially the Palm Island Barge Company," Mr Bissell said.


