LGAQ supports call for more housing

Representatives from 77 councils met in Brisbane last week for the Local Government Association of Queensland's (LGAQ's) annual conference.

The meeting included an Indigenous Leaders' Forum (ILF) for the 17 First Nations Councils, who called on the State Government to take action on unacceptable levels of overcrowding in many of the State's First Nations communities.

Councils voted to call on the Federal Government to facilitate a bilateral funding agreement with the Queensland State Government to substantially increase investment in First Nations housing.

The LGAQ said Queensland's

the communities they represent

— were a crucial part of the
cultural, social, and economic
fabric of our state.

They called on the major and minor political parties to partner with Indigenous Leaders and sign up to empower First
Nations Peoples by:

- Reducing chronic overcrowding to boost housing supply
- Empowering communities with guaranteed operational funding increases
- Permanently extending the Indigenous Councils' Critical Infrastructure Program
- 4. Better engagement with First Nations communities to improve local health services and focused action on Closing the Gap outcomes through a new First Nations Council's Accord partnership.

The ILF and the LGAQ meetings were attended by Mayor Alf Lacey, Deputy Mayor Mersane Oui and Councillor Ebansese Oui.

Counting continues for the State election

The official first preference count is ongoing in all 93 electorates after the State Elections in Queensland, with the Returning Officer and election officials counting more than 400 ballot papers from the Palm Island booth for the seat of Townsville on Saturday.

The preliminary count for the seat overall indicated it was lost by incumbent ALP member Scott Stewart to Liberal National Party (LNP) candidate Adam Baillie.

Official results were yet to be declared at the time of printing.

The Palm Island booth results indicated almost half of the nearly

400 formal votes (203) went to Mr Stewart.

The lowest number of votes from Palm Island pollsters was seven for One Nation candidate Alan Butt.

Mr Baillie said he was a small business owner and proud father of three school-aged children.

He said youth crime and the lack

of consequences faced by young offenders was what motivated him to nominate as a candidate.

Declarations of results will only be made once the outcome is certain and all votes are counted, including the preliminary and official count and distribution of preferences (where required).
