Island's 1056 voters ready to have their say

PALM Island Aboriginal Shire Council Mayor Alf Lacey will face three opponents on Saturday 28 April at the Queensland Local Government elections.

Also standing for the Mayor's position will be current Deputy Mayor Cr Raymond Sibley, former Mayor Delena Oui-Foster and former rugby league player Obadiah (Obe) Geia senior.

At the last election on 15 March 2008, Mr Lacey claimed 45.99% of the votes to win from Mrs Oui-Foster with 39.71% with the other Mayoral candidate, Josephine Geia, gaining 14.31%.

For the election of Mayor, first-past-the-post will win the position. Meanwhile 14 candidates have nominated for the four Councillor positions.

The four candidates who poll the

most votes on a first-past-the-post basis will become the elected members of the new Council.

Voters are required to place the numbers 1, 2, 3 and 4 in order of preference in the squares next to the candidates of their choice.

In the running is Mislam Sam, Edward Walsh, Frank Conway, Owen Marpoondin, Ruth Gorringer, Roy Prior, Archie Fraser, Collette Wotton, Georgina Haines, Deniece Geia, Albert Gorringer, Selene Shepherd, Arthur Clumpoint and Luella Bligh.

Ruth Gorringer is the only current Councillor who will stand for re-election.

Zina Prior has not nominated, Hal Walsh resigned his position two months ago and Cr Sibley is standing for Mayor.

A total of 13 candidates stood for the four positions on the Council in 2008. Zina Prior claimed 13.18% of the votes, Ruth Gorringer 11.59%, Raymond Sibley 10.71% and Mick Thaiday 10.26%.

Mr Thaiday passed away in March 2010 and Mr Walsh was elected as a Councillor at a bi-election.

Palm Island has 1056 voters (504 males and 552 females) according to the Australian Electoral Commission's Close of Roll Figures.



Hopes for Island launch of Dulcie's Strike yarn

Black Ink Press of Townsville has published a book by Dulcie Isaro, "The Day Palm Island Fought Back – The Strike of 1957" (paperback, RRP \$15) and hopes to hold dual launches - on Palm Island and in Townsville - to mark the 55th anniversary of the Strike.

Dulcie was a teenager at the time, and her family was sent to Woorabinda. An elder now, she tells the story as if it were yesterday and she has also done her own simple line drawings to go with the text. "We are now making plans for launching the book, and would like to do it in the first week in June, the (55 year) anniversary of the strike," Black Ink Press coordinator Jeanie Adams said. "Dulcie lives in Townsville now and would like to have the



launch here. But perhaps if the anniversary is being celebrated on Palm Island, there could be a launch there too."

Mrs Adams said she was putting the word out in the hope that Palm Islanders would be interested in being involved. "This seems a great opportunity for an organisation like 4K1G or the Catherine Freeman Foundation to become a partner



with us, to play host, to provide a really positive media event and a good experience for the youth of Palm Island," she said. "We will also publish Dulcie's play about the strike, and hope to re-publish the book written by her father in 1981, 'Under the Act'."


Children were then asked to interview their elders with a particular focus on their reactions to the photos and the relevance of local history research and availability on Palm Island.


"This is a great community thing and helps many families including a lot of Indigenous ones," Bowen said.

LNP flags plan to end alcohol ban

A Liberal National Party government in Queensland would review the effectiveness of alcohol bans in Indigenous communities in its first 18 months of office.

LNP leader, Campbell Newman said he would one day want to see the bans lifted but could not commit to taking action in his first term.

He said the bans would "probably" not be lifted in his first term but he did commit to a

review within 18 months.

"We'll undertake a review of the effectiveness of alcohol management plans and that will set the course for the future," he said.

"What I'm talking about here is the future of Aboriginal people on Cape York and other parts of the State.

"I'm talking about them ultimately having a proper dignified lifestyle like all other

Queenslanders."

Mr Newman argues ultimately the bans should go because they were not working "very effectively".

"Alcohol management plans are a bandaid for the symptoms of the fundamental problem, which is people living in conditions of despair and misery because they are in a welfare trap the Australian Labor Party, both at a Federal and State level, has created for them," he said.

The alcohol bans have been in place since 2002 in 19 Queensland Indigenous communities to reduce violence.

In some areas, there is no alcohol permitted and in others the amount a person can carry is limited.

Mr Newman said the LNP had talked about lifting the alcohol bans for many months.

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opponent too far and angering Aboriginal voters in the process after she accused the Liberal National Party leader, Campbell Newman of trying to buy Aboriginal votes by offering to end grog bans in Indigenous communities in the State.

Gracelyn Smallwood described Ms Bligh's comments as "obscene" and rejected the notion Indigenous Australians would be swayed one way or the other by just one issue.

Ms Bligh denied she had insinuated Indigenous voters were being bought by the prospect of the LNP allowing alcohol to be obtained in their communities. She said she was simply very concerned at the prospect of increased violence if alcohol was again freely available in communities where history had shown it was linked to family violence.

Ms Bligh argued the alcohol bans had reduced alcohol-related harm and domestic violence. "One of the things that has kept Aboriginal women safer has been our government's alcohol restrictions," she said.

"When the rate of alcohol-fuelled violence and when school attendance rates all reach the Statewide average then we won't need these plans anymore," she said.

Ms Bligh was later asked if Aboriginal voters should be offended by her suggestion their votes could be bought with alcohol.

She replied: "I think what's offensive is that Campbell Newman will wind back the clock and put women and children at risk of alcohol-fuelled violence."

LNP's alcohol ban plan is just "depths of depravity" says Bligh

Queensland Premier, Anna Bligh has accused Liberal National Party leader, Campbell Newman of trying to "buy Aboriginal votes with grog".

Ms Bligh made the extraordinary claim after Mr Newman said he would review "paternalistic" alcohol management plans in Aboriginal communities if elected.

Deputy Premier Andrew Fraser backed Ms Bligh, saying Mr Newman was "sly-grogging for votes".

"Let's be very frank about what Campbell Newman is doing," Ms Bligh said. "He is looking to buy Aboriginal votes with grog. It's disgusting."

Most Indigenous Queenslanders would thoroughly welcome any moves by the Liberal National Party to lift alcohol bans in communities, the Palm Island Mayor, Alf Lacey has said.

LNP leader, Campbell Newman has said he wants to "move on" from alcohol bans in Aboriginal communities, arguing Labor has trapped people in the welfare system.

Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey commended Mr Newman for "having the guts" to work with Indigenous people on "draconian" alcohol management plans.

"When we see a set of laws, one for Aboriginal people and one for non-Aboriginal people, then there's something very wrong in the state of Queensland," Mr Lacey said.

"Prohibition does not work, it will not work and these stupid laws that were implemented by the Labor government have never worked.

"Certainly the news from the LNP brings a big sigh of relief for Indigenous Queenslanders.

Cherbourg Mayor Sammy Murray said the bans create more problems than they solved.

"You turn people who would never get into trouble with the law into criminals," he said.

"I want to be a role model for youngsters and hope they can develop their own talent whether it be painting, boxing or football – we all have skills."

Mr Conway said 15 paintings were hanging at the Holiday Inn.

"It takes me about three to four days to finish a painting," he said. He said he was delighted to hear an Art Committee had been formed on Palm Island to encourage and support painters and sculptors.

Palm boxers are mostly competing these days in Boxing Association competitions which require long travelling down south.


Association boxers are eligible for Commonwealth Games selection.

A LARGE number of Palm Island residents will travel to Bowen this Saturday to watch the Barracudas take on the home side in a representative rugby league game.

Last year a combined Palm Island/Bowen team made its debut in the prestigious Foley Shield which commenced in 1948.

This season only three centres – Mackay, Townsville and Cairns – will contest the Foley Shield with games to be held at different venues.

The dumping of Palm Island/Bowen was heavily criticized by local rugby league supporters.

However they will get behind the Barracudas on Saturday and already

many residents have indicated they will travel the 200km south of Townsville for the game.
