Bravery award for flood save

Former Palm Island-based policeman Snr Constable Rohan McDonald has been presented with a Commendation for Brave Conduct after rescuing a woman trapped in floodwaters in February 2010.

The Governor of Queensland Penelope Wensley, AC presented the award at an Investiture Ceremony at Government House in Brisbane last month.

The citation said: "On the evening of 18 February 2010, Senior Constable McDonald and a colleague responded to a woman trapped in floodwaters after her vehicle was washed into a swollen creek on Palm Island.

They arrived at the first causeway crossing and searched for the vehicle.

They were then informed that the vehicle was at the next causeway.

With approximately 1.5 metres of water rushing over the causeway, they crossed the flood way and ran two kilometres to the second causeway.

When they arrived, they saw a sedan in the creek, its rear lodged into trees.

The policemen tied a strap to a metal pole and waded into the creek, forcing open the door and dragging the woman free.

The officers then carried her back to the creek bank and administered first aid.

For his actions, Senior Constable McDonald is commended for brave conduct."

Snr Cons McDonald is currently posted in south east Queensland.

Police union payment widely condemned Australians for Native Title and Reconciliation Queensland (ANTaR Qld) and others have condemned a recent State Government decision to reimburse the Queensland Police Union for the cost of legal fees arising from the 2004 death in custody on Palm Island.

"It is hard to comprehend why the State Government would support the actions of these police officers." ANTaR Qld President Kitty Carra said.

"The Coroner's report and the CMC findings clearly showed that these police officers did not carry out a thorough, impartial and rigorous inquiry.

"The circumstances surrounding this death remain a shameful part of Qld's recent history."

Terry O'Gorman from the Council for Civil Liberties described it as "yet another bad misstep in this whole sorry saga".

Barrister Andrew Boe said the Government's decision to

reimburse the Police Union was "obscene".

Mayor Alf Lacey said the Government's compensation payout to the QPU was racist.

"If you're black in this state you get nothing and if you're white you get the bank vault," he said.

Ms Carra said the decision was wrong.


"If the Police Union wants to defend officers who collude in the perversion of justice it is not for the Queensland Government to then endorse that," she said.

ANTaR Qld called on the Government to reverse its decision.

Also at the carnival were Cowboys assistant coach Terry Matterson, back Robert Lui, and Toyota Cup back Javid Bowen, a cousin of Matty Bowen.

As well as playing some top class football, the visitors enjoyed a cultural experience at the Evolution Mining sponsored carnival.

Everybody was welcomed to country by traditional owner Allan Palm Island, followed by speeches from Deputy Mayor Mislam Sam, Cr Eddie Walsh, Obe Geia jnr and others.

"It is good to see so many local players and families as well as the visitors here," Mr Geia said.

"Most times our youngsters have to travel away, and at this carnival they play in front of their families."

St Michael's Catholic School dancers performed before the games and received loud applause.

The carnival also received great positive publicity with coverage by the Palm Island Voice, the Townsville Bulletin, Seven News, Koori Mail, Torres News and Cooktown Local News.

Local Bwgcolman Radio broadcast games and Radio 4KIG also did a live cross to the carnival.

Others in attendance included professional boxer Jordan Gee Hoy, who was watching his nephews Aron Gallagher, Tristan Evans and Nehemiah Gallego, all of whom played for Vincent State School





"This is a really great carnival with so much talent on offer. I have really enjoyed the day," Mr Gee Hoy said.

Neil Sabatino, of Hammond Island descent, was the Good Shepherd School coach and said there was an overflow of talent.

The Challenge, now in its fourth year, was a partnership between the Palm Island community, the North Queensland Toyota Cowboys, the NRL All Stars Game, the Department of Sport & Recreation and the Palm Island PCYC.

It was hosted and run by the Palm Island community.

It's a unique carnival for the kids from Palm Island, who get the chance to play some home games in front of their family and friends, and the youngsters from the mainland, who travel two hours by ferry to play on the picturesque island north-east of Townsville.

Each young footballer has earned the right to play in the carnival thanks to their regular attendance and positive behaviour at school all year.

North Queensland Toyota Cowboys community manager Fiona Pelling said it was a huge day for the kids. "It's a huge day for many of the kids – four hours of travel for those who come from Townsville or Magnetic Island, a couple of kilometres walking as well as five modified length games of rugby league – but a very enjoyable and educational one as well" she said.

"Once all the teams have arrived we all take part in a community welcome to country which includes some traditional dancing from the Palm Island locals.

"We really encourage all the kids, once they are invited, to join the dancing because it's a great ice breaker and really sets the atmosphere for the day."



Comeback boost for boxing team



FORMER Australian amateur boxing champion Gerald Wotton jnr looks set to make a successful boxing comeback after eight years break from the ring.

Now aged 28, trainer Ray Dennis said the classy Wotton won his Australian title back in 2001.

"Gerald was a very good boxer and will be a great part of the team," Mr Dennis said.

After training strongly at the Palm PCYC gym, Mr Dennis said he doesn't expect Wotton will have a rusty start when he gets into the ring.

"That may be at a tournament in Moranbah on 10th November," he said.

"Gerald won a lot last time he fought."

However Skipjacks was the first to score, courtesy of centre Mickeal Sibley at the eighth minute without a conversion.

Army hit back soon after with a converted try to lead 6-4 but a second Mickeal Sibley try after a high kick saw Skipjacks hold an 8-6 advantage.

At the 23rd minute mark Army scored to hold a 12-8 lead at halftime.

After the break it was all the Army which scored four tries to lead 32-8.

In the dying minutes speedy back Fred Haines jnr crossed for Skipjacks and the Anthony Gadd conversion sealed the 32-14 final result.

Army had some Indigenous footballers who starred including Thursday Islander Private Nomoa who was excellent in attack and strong in defence from his wing.

"I am very proud of my Torres Strait heritage and want to say hello to all of my family up there," he said.

Another top player for the Army was big forward Apa Matalau who made plenty of metres up the centre of the ruck.

Skipjacks best were Mickeal Sibley, captain Fred Bulsey, Esrom Geia until he went off with a knee injury, Georgie Dabea, Jeremy Pulleh and James Sibley. Overall Skipjacks will hold their 3-2 lead out of the five matches.



Skipjacks hold 3-2 lead overall in tight Shield play-off

IT took a whole Australian Army rep side of superfit players to overcome Palm Island Skipjacks 32-14 in a game played as a curtain raiser to the Test between Australia and New Zealand in Townsville last month.

And that was only after a second half blitz after Army led by only four points at halftime.

The 13th October game was at Dairy Farmer's Stadium for the prestigious Bill Coolburra Memorial Shield. Two hours later Australia beat New Zealand 18-10 in front of 26,000 spectators.

It was the fifth Bill Coolburra Memorial Shield game between the Australian Army Thunder and the team which were the PIRL 2012 competition premiers.

The game was full of positives for Palm Island. The Island received great publicity and the lads performed brilliantly on their biggest stage ever.
