Good record pays off for hard working students

Coolgaree looking to future – and that’s no wind up

Coolgaree Aboriginal Corporation for CDEP is under special administration following a request for assistance from the directors, Registrar of Indigenous Corporations Anthony Beven says.

The directors met with Mr Beven to ask for help to restructure and reform the Corporation ahead of the introduction of the new Remote Jobs and Communities Program (RJCP), which will replace CDEP on 1 July 2013.

The Corporation intends to tender for the new program and Mr Beven has agreed to appoint a special administrator to assist them in that process.

“Over many years Coolgaree has provided essential employment opportunities to the Palm Island community,” Mr Beven said. “To ensure its future, some difficult decisions now need to be taken. It is

pleasing that the directors have sought assistance at an early stage to meet the new challenges facing Coolgaree.”

Mr Beven has appointed Alan Eldridge from Australian Indigenous Business Services (AIBS) as the administrator.

“The future of Coolgaree is important to Palm Islanders and the special administrator will be aiming to secure its long-term future,” he said.

The special administrator has been appointed for six months. Member for Herbert, Ewen Jones, told ABC radio he would meet the administrator in the next few weeks to get a briefing on its restructure.

He said he was confident the administrator could fix the financial problems affecting the corporation.

“We need a good, positive outcome out of this but the problem you have when you do a CDEP program, it’s one thing getting the money, it’s another thing getting the outcomes,” he said. “I know that there are some issues over there when it comes to process and attendance at these programs and I think that’s what has to be addressed.

“But I think by and large the conversations I’ve had with the administrator have been centred on how we go forward, it’s not about winding up.”

Pink Day fun

Palm Island's Pink Day, organised by PCYC, was about celebrating and honouring women who have survived breast cancer, as well as remembering and cherishing the memories of those who had not, PCYC Youth Program coordinator Deniece Geia says.

She said the event was sponsored by Evolution Mining, who donated food and gifts handed out on the day.

"We wanted to make women feel special and loved and to show our appreciation," Ms Geia said.

Sydney play ready to roll...

Three Palm Islanders – Kylie Doomadgee, Harry Reuben, and Maggie Blackley – are about to hit the stages of Sydney in new production called 'Beautiful One Day' writes Rachel Maza (left) for the *Palm Island Voice*...

The play is a collaboration between three theatre companies: Ilbjerri Theatre (Black fulla theatre in Melbourne), Belvoir and Version 1.0 (both migaloo theatre companies in Sydney).

They will be performing in and co-devising this show along with three other performer/devisers including myself - Bwgcolman descendant Rachael Maza.

My father, Bob Maza was born here in 1939, my Yidinji Grandmother was sent here 1918 and Murray Islander grandfather in 1921 – they're pictured below with my Uncle Claude.

Myself and the rest of the team (who are Paul Dwyer, Sean Bacon, Eamon Flack, Jane Phegan, Paul Prestipino) have been visiting Palm over the past 18 months talking to as many people as possible, and working with Maggie, Kylie and Harry in developing this play.

The play will be primarily documentary-based – that is to say based on true stories, real accounts of actual events taken from autobiographies; interviews; newspaper articles; court transcripts etc. Sometimes the actors will retell these stories word for word, sometimes we will show video of Palm Islanders that have been interviewed.

Palm Island is too often stereotyped in the media.



'Beautiful One Day' will show Australia the other side of the story: our side of the story.


I want Australia to see what a proud and resilient people Palm Islanders are despite everything they've been subjected to.

Attending SCHOOL is COOL!!!

After travelling 2,500km south from their island home to the snow fields of Mt Buller, eight Palm Island saw snow for the first time in September, thanks to the Cathy Freeman Foundation.

The students spent a week learning how to snowboard as a reward for their school achievement.

The children were there as part of the CFF Horizons Program, which acknowledged their academic achievement and awarded the interstate experience based on merit, attitude and a demonstrated desire to achieve.

CFF CEO, Sonya Stephen said they were offering great incentives.

"The program offers great incentives for students to further engage in school and improve on their literacy and behaviour," she said.

"For some of these kids, it is the first time they have even heard of snow, let alone seen it or

touched it!

"We are very excited and proud to offer them this opportunity for their outstanding achievement in school."

CFF was recently recognised by the Australian Government as having 'programs that work'.

"We know our programs are having a positive impact on educational outcomes," Ms Stephen said.

"Being able to recognise and reward a child's achievement contributes to these outcomes.

The CFF Horizons Program is funded by global financial institution, Credit Suisse, which is also providing volunteers to assist and participate in some of the activities with the children.

For many it was their first trip to Fantome and a chance to explore the remnants of the settlement.

The day before they left on their trip the class watched 'Fantome', the 2010 film about Joe Eggslesse and his memories, which gave them some idea of what had occurred on the Island from 1928 until as recently as 1973.

Joe is a regular visitor to the school when he is on Palm and recently accompanied another group of students to Fantome Island.

But it wasn't all about history, as the pictures show, with plenty of time spent swimming, floating on blow up boats, diving and picnics.


An exhausted group of happy students and teachers arrived home late in the afternoon looking forward to a good nights sleep!

Palm Island Barracudas lost their first game 28-16 to Pergura from PNG, then thrashed Mossman 48-nil.

But they then lost 48-6 to the star studded and ultimate grand finalists Mulga Tigers, which included ex-West Tigers and Penrith player Dane Lawrie, Canberra Raiders' Travis Waddell and Malcolm Congoo, and ex-Cowboys star Rod Jensen. Co-coach Alex Morgan rated Mickleal Sibley, Gabriel Geesu, Germaine Bulsey, Isiah Oui, William Blackman, Gresham Ross, James Sibley, Anthony Thompson and Hosea Murphy as the best players.

"The majority of our players were under 25 and it would have only been their first or second Allblacks carnival," he said.

"Our main players from Townsville Allblacks were scattered in other teams.

"The players we had could hold their head up high and be proud of their efforts, because they

never took a backward step against much bigger and more experienced opposition.

"They have done themselves and their community proud and will only be better for the experience."

OTHER PALM PLAYERS

Four of Palm's best footballers – Fred Bulsey, Raoul Miller and brothers Darryl and Clinton Pearson lined up for Hope Vale side Dharrabah Bulls, which was coached by Cowboys superstar Matty Bowen.

Bulls won their first two games against a Boigu Island side and a Tablelands team.

The side had the bye in round three on day one and then easily defeated Natives in the quarter final before losing to Curacoa Crusaders in their semi final.



It was another big win for Palm Island football when Curacao Crusaders were overall winners of the Cairns Allblacks Carnival last month.

They won the grand final against Badu Island side Mulga Tigers 34-16. A huge field of 30 men's teams, 13 under-18 teams and four women's sides contested the carnival. Telston Sibley coached the team through their undefeated run with Malcolm Lawrence dominating the final in the second half after scores were deadlocked 10-all at halftime. Curacao Crusaders included Melbourne Storm NRL player Maurice Blair. Palm Island players included Ron Geia jnr, Josiah Geia, Walter Geia, Jason Bulsey, Obe Geia, Frank Baira, Stephen Lowatta, Pita Bourne, Fred Haines jnr, Justin Sibley, and Vernon Bourne.
