

Palm to host North Queensland local government conference

Palm Island will host the North Queensland Local Government Association's annual conference next week, which will see more than 100 delegates, including Mayors, Councillors, sponsors and speakers from north of Rockhampton.

On the agenda will be discussion around issues of relevance to councils across north Queensland, representing a significant opportunity for Palm Island as a chance to showcase the island.

Services for the conference will be delivered primarily by local businesses and local people including managing and organising the conference, accommodating delegates, catering, transport, cleaning and more.

While the conference is only over a short time, a considerable amount of money will be spent in the local community.

At the close of the conference delegates will also be invited to take history tours and purchase souvenirs at locally run markets in the Cultural Precinct.

Attracting conferences like this, and the Indigenous Leader's Forum last month, provides chances to generate good news stories for Palm Island.

It is not easy to host conferences like these, it takes a lot of planning and a lot of people to bring it all together.

It is an opportunity to show what we can do.

To assist us conference organisers have raised more

than \$80,000 in sponsorship, an amount which far exceeds previous NQLGA conferences.

Delegates will be accommodated at the Palm Island Motel, Klub Kuda, QBuild and John Friend camps at Butler Bay, and in a tent city erected for the purpose of the conference on the Bwgcolman Community School oval.

New dialysis chair sits well with patients

Dialysis has recommenced at the Joyce Palmer Health Service following a refurbishment and upgrade to equipment Townsville Hospital and Health Service Indigenous service group director Liza Tomlinson says.

"We started treating patients at the newly renovated facility on Tuesday 23 June and we can currently see up to eight patients per day," Ms Tomlinson said.

"The upgrades to the renal unit include refurbishment works which allow for increased space, a new reverse osmosis machine, an additional haemodialysis machine and all-new dialysis chairs.

"The unit previously housed three dialysis chairs so we also increased that number to four, allowing more of our patients to have their dialysis on the island, helping to

reduce travel and allowing patients to stay in their own community for treatment. Four chairs means four patients can dialysis in the morning and four patients can dialysis in the afternoon. To support the afternoon rotation of patients dialysing we have also recruited an additional nurse."

Ms Tomlinson said another major improvement from a technical perspective was the installation of the reverse osmosis water-treatment plant.

"This equipment produces ultrapure water in line with other major

hospitals in Australia," she said.


Joyce Palmer Director of Nursing John Rallings said community and staff had welcomed the new facility.

"Our staff have received plenty of support and praise from the community," Mr Rallings said.

"Patients who dialysis at the new facility are very appreciative of the new area and have commended us on the upgrades."

The refurbished unit will be named in the coming months following close consultation with the Palm Island community and an official opening will follow shortly after.

Bwngcolman Community School may boast not one but at least two ‘first-time’ university graduates over the next few years after four current students travelled to Melbourne for a recent camp.

The university camp experience was attended by year 12 students Kathleen Haines and Heath Lacey, and year 11 students Jeriah Coutts and Alma Solomon.

They were supported by Senior Secondary Coordinator Lynette Kim Sing who said it was the first time the camp had been available to students from a community school.

“The Palm students were the only ones attending a Community School, the rest were from private schools, boarding schools or large

schools in major towns or cities, where the Yrs 11/12 curriculum is already set for a pathway to university,” she said.

“The Melbourne University staff couldn’t stop thanking me for getting the students to Melbourne.

“They said the Palm students added to the overall experience for all the other 47 participants.

“They said their willingness to share their culture through their dances, was motivating for all the other students.

“They taught the HULA to everyone else and the ‘shake a leg’ to the co-ordinator.

“Academically they were on an even par with the others, showing that they can still learn in a small community and display levels of confidence and self-motivation, that even students in the large schools, have not yet developed.

“I am extremely proud of them.”

Stolen wages payments hope for early 2016

The creation of a Stolen Wages Reparations Fund is a key Budget initiative aimed at delivering better outcomes for Indigenous Queenslanders Minister for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Partnerships Curtis Pitt says.

He said the Government was upholding its election commitment with \$21 million over three years to establish a Stolen Wages Reparations Fund.

He said a special taskforce would be established to develop criteria for the allocation of funds as well as assessing applications.

Queensland Council of Unions Field Officer Lara Watson said Minister Pitt sent a letter to all remote community Mayor's inviting them to use their own protocols and structures to select a Stolen Wages Representative.

"Sixteen nominations were received for the Stolen Wages Taskforce and they will go to Cabinet for them to select

representatives for that taskforce," she said.

"We should know who those representatives will be around mid-August."

She also said a '1800' number and website would be set up for Stolen Wages as soon as possible.

"Claimants who were eligible last time will then have a number to contact to change their details, if they have changed since receiving a payment last time," she said.

Ms Watson said the taskforce was to be well-supported.

"There has been two additional people employed by Government to work on Stolen Wages, and the Taskforce will have a team dedicated to assist them in administration,

research and any other area of need.

"Once the Taskforce representatives have been selected there will be a submission process which will allow people to advise the Taskforce on what issues they need to address, what should be included in their recommendations and any other matter they wish to highlight.

"The Government would like to start payments by the end of the year, but will rely on the direction of the Taskforce and Community recommendations on how that process might be achieved.

"They are confident payments & the application process for new claims will commence no later than February 2016."

During NAIDOC week the Palm Island Council hosted a BBQ with contractors Mendi and Hutchinson Builders at the new Rodeo Grounds subdivision to offer the community a chance to have a look at the new development.

Mayor Alf Lacey said the area would eventually be one of the biggest suburbs on the island.

“The civil works part of it is now completed and now within a month the first 20 homes will start to be built,” he said.

“Council has won a tender to build nine of those houses in our own right, which will be a great achievement for our Council workforce.

“And that should bring some extra employment as the project rolls on.

“With 59 houses to eventually be built on this subdivision, this area will be Palm Island’s biggest suburb.

“So Council is very pleased and excited about this.

“One of the nicest thing about it was the school’s student council was given the opportunity to name all the streets down there, so all those names have come from them.”

JETS lead the ladder in the Palm Island Community Rugby League competition after the second last round of fixtures last Saturday (25th July).

Sitting on 12 points, Jets top the table from premiers Butler Bay Bulls and Skipjacks (8 points) and Bwgcorman Brothers (4 points).

In last Saturday's fixtures Skipjacks beat Jets 42-28 and Butler Bay Bulls defeated Bwgcorman Brothers 50-28.

This weekend in the last round Bulls meets Jets and Skipjacks take on Bwgcorman Brothers.

Next Saturday the semi finals are on and the sides finishing first and second will meet in a qualifier. Third and fourth will clash in an elimination semi final.
