by Mayor Alf Lacey and the

They said they were delighted to

be welcomed by the four-year-olds.

"It is not every day that
superheroes meet you,"

Ms Palaszczuk said. "I am
honoured to be here."

The four were then driven to the Coolgaree Sports Bar and Grill where they met locals, including elders, who spoke about various issues including unemployment.

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"(Mayor) Alf Lacey is a ferocious fighter to get things happening for Palm Island, I promised him I would visit and I have delivered," Ms Palaszczuk said.

"I was here seven years ago and there has been some very important, positive changes.

"Employment is an issue here, that is getting young people into work."

The Premier promised she would come to Palm Island again in March 2015.

After some snacks and coffee they walked to the Council offices and before entering Ms Palaszczuk spoke to Ringo about various matters.

The four had a private meeting with Cr Lacey, Cr Eddie Walsh, Cr Robert Castors, Cr Roy Prior and Cr Deniece Geia.

Then it was onto the nearby Joyce Palmer Medical centre where they were met by Tony Mooney ?// and staff, who took them on a tour during which they also spoke to some patients.

A drive to the dam followed and then it was onto Bwgcolman State School where Ms Palaszczuk and Ms Trad made presentations to pupils.

They left Palm Island around 2pm.

Cr Lacey said the visit had been very positive.

"I want to thank the Premier and her Ministers for taking the time to visit us," he said.

"It makes us realise how important our Palm Island community is to them and we look forward to working with all of them again as we progress and develop into our future."

Dialysis patients grateful for Bwgcolman Unit

Queensland Premier Annastacia Palaszczuk paid a quick visit to long-term dialysis patient Colyning Walsh, a beneficiary of a much upgraded renal unit at the Joyce Palmer Health Service, while she was there.

The upgraded unit has meant patients such as Mrs Walsh didn't have to travel to mainland Townsville for their thrice weekly treatments.

Townsville Hospital and Health board chair Tony Mooney said the unit started treating patients in a renovated dialysis unit in June last year.

"The upgraded renal unit included refurbishment works which allowed for increased space, a new reverse osmosis machine, an additional haemodialysis machine and all-new dialysis chairs," he said.

"The renovation of the unit increased the number of dialysis chairs from three to four which allowed more patients to have their dialysis on the Island."

The refurbished unit was recently named the Bwgcolman Dialysis Unit and currently supports eight patients dialysing three times a week.

Mrs Walsh's husband, Cr Eddie Walsh, said it had made a big difference to their lives.

"This unit has been a huge benefit to Palm island as our people needing dialysis can have it here on the island and not go to Townsville," he said.



Mrs Walsh said she been receiving dialysis for seven years.

"I contracted Swine Flu in 2009 and have treatment three days a week on Monday Wednesday and Friday," she said.

"I have to say the nursing staff I have met over the years were always the best — first class all of them, and dedicated from when I started in Townsville to Myra and Matt, who are caring people.

"It makes one appreciate life even I have this dreaded sickness that I would not wish on anyone.

"There are a lot of things that I miss out on now that people take for granted, like looking after and keeping my little grandchildren with me on long weekends, going for long walks along the beach and picking up beautiful sea shells to add to my collection, and going on long trips.

"My husband Eddie and I had planned years ago that he would one day take me to places he had been and meet some of his friends.

"Places like West Australia, the Torres Strait, Alice Springs, and go and see my mother's country and my father's country.

"But all and all life wasn't meant to be easy, you take what's given to you, accept it and get on with what you have. There are people worse off than us in the world they say, I believe I still have my family who love and care for me and I for them."

Health partnership hopes



Palm Island Council offered a James Cook University delegation a warm welcome when they came to meet about forming collaborative long term community health goals and projects with the community last week.

A key outcome of the initial meeting was to trial working arrangements between JCU and community leaders to address pressing animal and public health issues on the Island.

The move would provide JCU an opportunity to develop experience for their final year Bachelor of Veterinary Science students and promote the concept of a 'one health' approach to improving community health.

With the support of veterinarians and members of the community, it would also enable students to actively engage with priorities identified by the community that were relevant to their needs.

Managing water quality within constructed and traditional water sources, management

of local populations of dogs, horses and pigs, responsible pet ownership and care, raising awareness of zoonotic diseases and engaging with schools and the community to assist with educational needs was also discussed at the meeting.

The visitors were Pro ViceChancellor for the Australian
Aboriginal and Torres Strait
Islander Centre at James Cook
University, Professor Martin
Nakata and staff from the
College of Healthcare Sciences
at JCU (Dr Lynore Geia) and
College of Public Health,
Medical & Veterinary Sciences
(A/Prof John Cavalieri, Dr Leo
Foyle, Dr Caroline Mann).
In the longer term Prof

In the longer term Prot Nakata and Dr Geia said they would like to see the partnership grow to involve other disciplines within JCU to help improve community health and education generally.

They said the future of young people's capacity in science, technology, engineering and mathematics (STEM) was also a priority. A focus on STEM education in Queensland schools was critical to ensuring the next generation of Palm Islanders were equipped with the knowledge and skills set needed to find meaningful educational and vocational opportunities after graduating from high school.

"An ongoing partnership between the Palm Island community and JCU makes sense on many levels," Prof Nakata said.

PALM Island Barracudas won the plate section grand final of the 30th Bindal Allblacks carnival in Townsville, beating Elijah's Heroes 32-28 in a cliffhanger played over three big days of footy earlier this month.

Sixteen men's teams, as well as under 16 and under 19 sides, competed at North Queensland's biggest Allblacks carnival held at the Townsville Sports Reserve.

Gresham Ross jnr, was named player of the entire carnival after scoring three tries in the decider, while crafty back Darryl Pearson scored two four pointers.

The lead changed several times in the final and at halftime Elijah's Heroes, a side creating awareness about autism, led 18-16.

"The grand final the game was filled with mistakes and missed opportunities but we managed to get over them in the last five minutes to win.

"Our seniors played very well for us all weekend and were instrumental in getting our team in good positions to win those close games. And it was good to send one of Barracudas' old war horses, Fred Bulsey, into retirement with the win."

Mr Prior said he was grateful for the players' loyalty over the year.

"I just want to personally thank the players who stuck by myself and Lloyd Morgan this year and showed some loyalty," he said.

"It's been pretty tough but to

stick together and play through some real tough games shows character and commitment to our community supporters.

"As our representative team I could not be prouder, it's just an honour to be a part of it and to coach a bunch of players who been together now for few years. They have grown from teenagers to men who now have families of their own, and that is something special.

"I'll take great pride in being a part of this team for years to come."

Palm Island's Nui Rabuka was one of many fire fighters to participate in Firefighters Remembrance Day march held in Townsville earlier this month.

Queensland Fire and Emergency Services (QFES) and Fire and Emergency Services Minister Bill Byrne paid tribute to fallen firefighters on Firefighters Remembrance Day on 10 October.
