Mall re-development expected to take 6 weeks

Work has begun on Palm Island's Mall with a new upgrade expected to take about six weeks to complete.

Mayor Alf Lacey said the development was in partnership between the Council and the Queensland State Government through the Department of Economic Development.

"The Mall has been looking tired for quite some time and I'm pleased to inform the community Council has been able to secure much needed money to upgrade the area, to make it a more comfortable and livable area in the community," Cr Lacey said.

"It's a much-needed face lift given the Mall is probably one

of the shining lights of the town as a place of gathering. "People of every generation have used the Mall to sit down and catch up with their young, their old and everyone in between."

He said the Mall would be closed for the next six weeks and asked the community to be patient.

"Cooperate with Council officers and I would ask the community to watch the space as it develops," he said.

"As one the most popular places on the island, it will

be rewarding for everyone in the community, particularly families, to have a more comfortable space to share together and with friends.

"We want to ensure the Mall continues to be a popular community space everyone can enjoy."

Grant monies hard-won for sports precinct upgrade

After two years of hard work and 'rigorous' assessment, more than \$400,000 has been granted to the Palm Island Council to upgrade essential services at the community's sports precinct to ensure its safe operation and improve security.

Mayor Alf Lacey said he was pleased to have the State Government's support.

"Council is pleased, and I'm certainly pleased, all that hard work has paid off and we can deliver some really good results for the benefit for the whole community," he said.

"What it means for us is we will see the upgrade to the facility itself, but more importantly I think it's about

the health and wellbeing of the community on Palm.

"Council will be holding a forum down at the sport complex in the near future to talk about how we can incorporate community input into the upgrade, the design and what needs to happen.

"There are some preliminary works that have been done for the design phase, but Council will be looking to all

interested community members and sporting bodies on Palm for input.


"Community notices will come out soon because this is going to be a whole of community facility and we need as much input into the upgrade as possible.

Community input essential to healthy future

The 2017–27 Palm Island Health Action Plan is being developed now and community input is needed to make sure the team working on the plan gets it right.

Team leaders Barbara Schmidt and Phillip Mills said a team of people were working to find out what Palm Islanders themselves thought were the most important issues to be addressed to improve health in the community.

Lillian Lampton and John 'Chico' Charles are on the team to let individuals and community groups know about the development of the Plan and to encourage community members to tell the planning team about the health issues they think need to be addressed in the plan.

Joyce Palmer Health Service's Indigenous Community Liaison and Engagement worker Jennifer Ketchell and Palm Island Aboriginal Council's Health Liaison Officer Leonie Hopkins were also on the team to provide advice and logistical support for the health planning activities.

Community members and service providers have been meeting with the team over the past six weeks to collect information about current services and to look at what has changed over the past six years.

Information collected by the health planning team was to be

shared at the Palm Island Health Planning meeting held yesterday and today. Everyone was invited to the meeting to help provide direction about health strategies the community wanted to be included in the Palm Island Health Action plan 2017– 2027.

"This is exciting times for Palm Island because the vision of the people, both past and present, for health is becoming more clear and will soon be a reality," the team said. "Current progress with health planning for the next ten years means the community is moving forward and we are making our own decisions about what we believe is the right way for our community and the actions required for the healthy continuation of our lives on Palm Island and long life for our future generation.

"The Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council carried the voice of Palm Island community and fought vigorously to secure the funding to build a new purpose built primary health care centre on Palm Island so we have better access to primary health care services.

"The Townsville Hospital and

Health Service has committed to move the community health programs from Joyce Palmer Health Service to the new purpose built facility and that the primary health care facility will transition to the management of a community controlled health organisation.

"It is important to note that the hospital emergency department, renal dialysis and inpatient beds will stay at the Joyce Palm Health Service building and not be moving.

"The commitments made by the Queensland Government means the health planning meeting will be more than a talk fest.

"Important decisions – which will affect Palm Islanders for generations to come – about what people want the community controlled health service to look like and how they want the primary health care services to be delivered have been discussed."

He's had enough!



“It’s got to be people who are not from my Island,” Elder Keith Pickles says when it comes to people destroying street signs around the community.

Furious at the disrespect for a small but hard fought-for right to own and name the streets the Island, Mr Pickles, 70, invited anyone who didn’t like living in the community to leave.

“This is about the way some fools or idiots – I don’t know how they would like to be perceived – are destroying street signs all over the community,” he said.

“I don’t know why people are just destroying them, I don’t know why.

“It’s got to be people who are not from my Island and don’t care about my Island, so if they don’t like my Island, please leave, don’t destroy it.”

Mr Pickles was born on Palm Island just after World War II.

He did an apprenticeship at the Golden Circle Cannery in Brisbane in the 1960s and is a retired mechanic, who has now taken matters into his own hands.

When he saw people trying to break the signs on the street he lives on, he took it upon himself to save them by nailing them onto his house.

The signs are therefore still functional, unable to be bent out of shape and safe from vandals.


He said he hates the way people “rubbish and vandalise our beautiful island”.
