Residents' anger at being searched again (and again)...



'ENOUGH'!

PALM Island residents are angry police have searched their bags again on at least two separate occasions as they boarded the Sealink ferry in Townsville last week.

Regular bag checks have been conducted either at the Breakwater ferry terminal in Townsville or at Palm's Reel Women Jetty over the past few weeks. Several passengers were keen to offer the *Palm Island Voice* their opinion on the searches.

Football official Vernon Walsh questioned why such rules should apply to his beloved island and not on mainland Townsville.

"We feel as if we have rules on us that others don't and it is not right," Mr Walsh said.

Bwgcolman Radio station manager Tim Miller said the searches were "degrading".

"The police are treating Palm Islanders like second class citizens and in that category are the white people who work on the Island," he said.

Bronwyn Kerr described the searches as disgraceful and said they were targeting Aboriginal people.

"They found nothing, this is really a bad law," she said.

On a separate occasion, just days later resident Phillip Kyle said he was angry three officers could be spared by Queensland Police to conduct the searches.

"There is a sex predator on the loose in Townsville and they send three down here to search bags," Mr Kyle said.

More time to enrol

Palm Islanders and other Queenslanders looking to enrol before local government elections now have more time to do so.

Attorney General and Local Government Minister Paul Lucas said the move means people will be able to enrol to vote in Local Government Elections until February 25, the same day as rolls close for State Government elections.

"What this means is that voters who have moved or their enrolment is not up to date enrol for both Local Government elections as long as their enrolment is received before February 25," he said.

"If you've moved house or will be 18 years old by April 28, it's important to ensure you are on the rolls so you are eligible to exercise your democratic right to vote.

"Also, with council elections, you are only able to vote on the day if you are in your Local Government Area.

"However, if you are away, you need to organise in advance for a postal or pre-poll vote.

"Updating your details for Local Government elections mean you will automatically be enrolled for the State election."

The 2012 State Government election will be held on Saturday 24 March, followed by Local Government elections on Saturday 28 April.

Former workers' camp adds 16 rooms to visitors' accommodation options



There is a shared shower and toilet block, a covered area to sit and eat, and a great kitchen.

Councils win software \$

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council is one of 12 Indigenous Councils across Queensland set to benefit from State Government grant to assist in replacing key financial management software.


Minister for Local Government Paul Lucas said the Councils had worked together to identify a common solution that would result in cost savings for their communities.

"I commend their approach to source a common system and obtain a group rate as it enables better sharing of resources, portability of skills and value for money," he said.

"The grant will be provided through the Department of Local Government and Planning's Indigenous Councils' Capacity Building

Program."

Indigenous Councils to benefit from the grant are: Aurukun Shire Council, Cherbourg Aboriginal Shire Council, Doomadgee Aboriginal Shire Council, Hope Vale Aboriginal Shire Council, Kowanyama Aboriginal Shire Council, Lockhart River Aboriginal Shire Council, Mornington Shire Council, Napranum Aboriginal Shire Council, Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council, Pormpuraaw Aboriginal Shire Council, Woorabinda Aboriginal Shire Council and Wujal Wujal Aboriginal Shire Council.

Road works on track

Infrastructure works on Palm Island still going full steam ahead while the rain stays away, hopefully long enough to see these roadworks on Bamboo Creek Road completed in time.

It's a tough job with a view which is hard to take, but workers seem happy enough to take trek up the mountain each day to get to work.

Visitors, such as Andrew Woods (*below left*) have also been busy, including developing an appreciation for Palm Island's spectacular scenery. Late last

month he was delivering road base to the Bamboo Creek Road work site driving a golden oldie 1988 model Ford Louisville. Andrew works for his brother's company, Woods Truck Hire, and said he was enjoying his time on Palm. "This is a really beautiful place," he said.

He said the Louisville came over the ocean by barge from Lucinda past Ingham.

"My brother purchased the truck from Caboolture, it goes really well and is suited to this work," he said. "I am picking up material from near the jetty and delivering it to an area where it is being stockpiled for the upgrade of a road up to the hill here."



'Stay well away from power lines' – Ergon

Palm Islanders can look forward to continued reliable power supply into the future with vital maintenance works underway on power lines and plans to update equipment at the Island's power station.

Ergon Energy Regional Services Manager Geoff Bowes said crews had been working on routine maintenance around the Island's electricity network in recent weeks that would continue to ensure a safe and reliable supply.

"We are also finalising plans to replace one of the generators

at our Palm Island power station in the near future," Mr Bowes said earlier this month. He said the estimated \$1.3 million investment in the Palm Island power station would help keep a reliable supply of power available to Ergon Energy's customers. "Our first priority is always

keeping our network safe," he said.

"However I would urge everyone in the community – whether on Palm Island or anywhere – to ensure their children know to stay well away from power lines and treat this equipment with the respect it deserves."

Deadly Ears team back soon

The State Government's Deadly Ears team visited Joyce Palmer Health Centre for the first time late last year to provide Ear Nose & Throat clinic and surgery for the children of Palm Island and is set for a return visit at the end of April...

Deadly Ears is Queensland Health's Statewide Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Ear Health Program for children working towards managing and reducing the high rates of ear disease in Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander communities.

The team wanted to thank the health centre staff for being so prepared for their visit.

"Our visit increased the work load to the local area staff and we have been impressed," they said.

Efforts particularly noticed by the team were the cleanliness and tidiness of the Health Centre, thanks to cleaning staff, the food supplied for both the Deadly Ears team and the children following their surgery, and the efficiency of the health care staff in organising clinic appointments and attendance.

"It was great to see the staff members taking the opportunity to participate in professional development to increase the understanding of treatment of ear disease in children," they said.

"The client attendance at clinic was excellent.

"We saw 99 clients over 1 ½ days and did surgery on 19 clients over 2 days.

"Yes, it is a long wait for some on surgery day but they waited and remained hungry just so they could get their surgery done.

"Thank you to the children and parents for your patience on these days."

Deadly Ears will return next year on 30 April – 1 May for clinic and 2 – 3 May for surgery.

"We will return about 6 months after this," they said.

"Comments from community members were that it was wonderful to have their procedures done here and not have to travel to Townsville and leave family."

TWO Palm Island Barracudas rugby league sides will face off from Woorabinda, Hope Vale, Yarrabah, Charters Towers, at a gala Allblacks carnival here on 25 and 26th February

The two-day carnival will be held at the football oval and is expected to attract up to 2000 local and visiting team supporters and spectators.

Bindal Sharks from Townsville and Murray Island Descendants from Cairns will be the teams to beat, both being from North Queensland's two biggest cities.

The carnival has been organised by coach of the 2011 PIRL winners (Jets), Norman Bounghi, and Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey.

Each of the teams will have a huge incentive with \$8000 on offer for the winners and \$2500 for the runners up.

Barracudas Gold and Barracudas Green will be our own local heroes, ready to take on the visitors.

Team officials will include former Newcastle Knights NRL star Milton Thaiday, Skipjacks club champion forward Fred Bulsey, Genami Geia, Lloyd Morgan and Vaughn Charles. Three referees will travel from Cairns to handle the games which start with a round robin in two pools on Saturday 25 February at 9am.

Games will be played over 20-minute halves and will continue under floodlights into the evening.

The Descendants side is being organised by Cairns-based referee Richard Grogan who has regularly officiated over games at the Island of Origin Series on Badu Island, the Zenadth Kes on Thursday Island and Bamaga's Dan Ropeyarn carnival.

"They are all from Cairns and are of Torres Strait Islanders descent mostly Mer," Mr Bounghi said. Descendants are sure to have many supporters

amongst people of TSI heritage living on Palm.

Palm Island sides competed at the Hope Vale Allblacks carnivals held last October.

Mr Bounghi said the Hope Vale team was also strong, having been organised by members of the Bowen family who are relatives of Cowboys star Matty Blair.

The Palm Sharks reached the grand final of the Townsville Allblacks carnival last November but were losing to Cannonballs.

Abinda is also expected to field a very strong team with many of their players having lived on Palm Island as well.



SOME of the best and toughest forwards and fastest backs will compete at the Palm Island Allblacks carnival this weekend.

The "up front" clashes are likely to resemble a battle of Panzer tanks during World War II.

However there will be no metal but lots of bone jarring tackles as the sides try and get on top to give their speedy backs plenty of scoring opportunities.

Harry Mooka (above), regarded as amongst the top bracket of Allblacks carnivals forwards in Queensland will line up for TSI side Descendants from Cairns.

"I'll be playing for Descendants and most of our players will be in their first season but there will be the likes of brothers Brian and Fenton Murgha from Yarrabah and Lewis and Bert Whap from Mabuia Island," he said.

"We are looking forward to coming to Palm."

As a prop forward Mr Mooka's Allblacks carnival record is outstanding, having played in winning sides at Cairns, Townsville, Thursday Island, Badu Island, Mount Isa, Rockhampton and Bamaga.

He is now hopeful of adding Palm Island to his CV of winning venues even though the Barracudas' forwards will have other ideas.

Mooka's impressive record includes:

2009: Island of Origin on TI for winner Mulga United and won forward of carnival.

2010: Daniel Ropeyarn cup (Bamaga) Played for NPA side and winners Alau Eagles, and won player of the finals.

2011: Player of the Carnival at Island of Origin on Badu.

2011: Gordonvale Allblacks played for Cairns Descendants; captained Waur United from Moa Island at the Daniel Ropeyarn cup carnival in Bamaga; and Argun warriors at the Cairns Allblacks (all winners).

2011: Zenadth Kes Torres Strait Cup played for Malu Kiwai from Boigu Island and won that comp alongside Ben Barba and his three Brothers.

2011: Major Cup (Mt Isa) played for Boigu island and won that.

2011: Cooktown Allblacks captained Cairns Panthers to the grand final and fell short by a golden point field goal.

New boxers hit their stride in training

Hopes are high an influx of new youngsters will prove to be a major bonus for the Palm Island Boxing Club.

Assistant trainer Chris Evers said 10 senior and 16 juniors have become regular attendees at PCYC training sessions.

"There are a lot of new faces and most of the regulars here as well," he said.

Former star boxer Selwyn Seaton is back in training along with current champions Patrick Clarke, David Sam and Thomas Blanket.

"It is very good to see Selwyn back here," Evers said.

Not only is Seaton a polished pugilist but he is also a genuine role model for the younger brigade.

Sixteen-year-old Sam is hard at training after winning a national boxing title at Hobart earlier this month in the Youth Super Heavyweight division.

Mr Evers said the new boxers would be evaluated so see who is ready for a bout in coming months.

"There is a Boxing Association tournament on 17 March at Bundaberg which our boxers may go to but we just have to get finance for it," he said.

The team has also been invited to participate in the Sunstate Amateur Boxing League tournaments at Home Hill on 3 March, Charters Towers on 17 March, and at Townsville Kanaka Kings Club on 31 March.

If funding can be obtained some Palm boxers are certain to accept the invitation considering all three venues are close in compared to some of the longer trips they have

made in recent times.

Meanwhile back on the Island, male boxers have been in big numbers at training, not so women.

"We didn't have any girls here at training tonight," Mr Evers said.

The club remains hopeful that champion fighter Noby Clay will return to training soon and it is known quality boxer Reggie Palm Island has been spending lots of time with his partner and baby in Charters Towers.

Mr Evers looks set to take over as head trainer in coming months with veteran Ray Dennis on the verge of retirement.

"I know Chris will do a wonderful job," Mr Dennis said.
