Deadly Palm Boxers Win Again

The Australian Boxing League championships were held at Parkes in N.S.W on the 29th and 30th of November and the 1st of December

There were 50 bouts over the three night event. The titles were sponsored by Aussie Bum, a clothing company.

All of the boxers were supplied with singlets, shorts and gowns in the colors of their home state, which they were allowed to keep.

You should be able to see this year's titles on the internet.

Once again our young boxers proved themselves against top class opponents from as far north as Cairns, Yungaburra, and Babinda and as far south as Tasmania.

Our boxers won three gold and two silver medals.

Selwyn Seaton defeated Jeremy White of NSW in the elimination bout and defeated Colby Johnson of Mt Isa in the finals to win gold.


This makes Selwyn now undefeated in 12 bouts. A remarkable achievement for a talented young athlete.

Luke Lenoy was very unlucky not to come home with two gold medals.

Luke defeated Cory Wilson from NSW in the elimination bout. But he was defeated by Raymond Cupitt from Yungaburra in the finals to win silver in the 60kg class. The loss was a split decision.

Luke then stepped up to the 63.5kg division to win gold when he completely out classed Brett Hampton from NSW, when Luke stopped him in the second round.

Hosea Murphy won gold for his own school boy's 44.5kg division and then stepped up to win a silver medal in the older junior division when he was defeated by Harley Broom from Rockhampton.







Since I started training on Palm Island in 1999, Palm Island Boxers have won 28 gold medals at the Australian titles.

The PCYC and the Palm Island Council have been a great help to us through 2007. We are grateful for the financial help that the council provided and the use of the PCYC gym. Hopefully we can run a tournament here next year after some repairs are done on the boxing ring.

Many thanks go to Chloe Hooper, the Townsville Bulletin, Mike Reynolds, Sport and Recreation and the Palm Island Council.

There was a pro/ am tournament held at the Entertainment Centre in Townsville on the 9th December starting at 2pm.

There were 8 bouts scheduled for that date, 4 professional bouts and 4 amateur.

Luke Lenoy or Selwyn Seaton were scheduled to fight Colby Johnson from Mt Isa and Inossi Geia was also lined up for a bout.

Fred Mundraby will be the main pro bout and Josh King and Joel Casey will also be taking part in what should be a good program.

A report on this tournament will be brought to you in an future issue of *Palm Island Voice*.

This is the last tournament for the year and I would like to thank everyone who has helped the Palm Island Boxers for their assistance throughout the year.

Celebrate New Year's Eve at Coolgaree Bay Hotel




To celebrate New Year's Eve, the Hotel will open from 4pm on Monday 31 December, and stay open until 2am, 1 January.

BE SMART AND BE SAFE

Take things easy over festive season

The message from the guys at ATODS this holiday period is to DRINK SMART, DRINK SAFE.

The Christmas and New Year period can be both a time of great celebration and of sadness.

Please be careful if you are going to attend parties and have a drink of alcohol. Drink smart, drink safe.

Make sure you always eat before drinking, even if it is a piece of fruit, like a mango.

Drink lots of water, between and after drinks. It's free.

If you are drinking, set yourself a limit and don't go over.

If you are not sure of the safe limit for men it is 4

standard drinks a day. For women it is 2 standard drinks.

If you are pregnant no alcohol is safe. The only safe thing for you and your baby is NO grog at all. Even small amounts can harm your unborn child.

Lastly rethink that yarndi if you are smoking it. It is dangerous to your health, so please cut down.

If you would like to talk to someone about the grog or yarndi, don't hesitate to talk with the ATODS staff.

We will have staff available on some

days between Christmas and New Year and then back to our full shift starting back on 2 January.

More Great Postcards...






The wonderful postcards from Palm Island. which were featured in previous issues of **Palm Island** Voice, have put a "good news"

Speaking out about an unspoken issue

A young Palm Island woman is calling on the Palm Island community to speak up and speak out about the unspoken issue of relationship violence.

This young woman, who asked not to be named, is still coming to terms with the effect domestic and relationship violence has had in her life.

She said that, as a community, people here see domestic violence happening all the time. But to help break the cycle of violence, people need to speak up about what is going on.

Her message to the people who are affected by violence in relationships is that you don't have to put up with it.

There is always someone to turn to, with an open ear to listen. But most importantly, she says you should not be afraid to report the abuse. She said, "It is important to the women in our community to keep their kids safe. But if people don't report the abuse, it will go on, and the cycle of violence we live in will continue and our kids will suffer." She added that it was important not to let your kids witness the violence or abuse, because they then think it is a normal way to act, and will grow up to behave in the same way. Domestic violence is always bad, but it is even worse when kids see it happening. She believes a lot of kids hang around in the streets because they are too scared to go home.

She said thinking about her kids kept her strong, and helped her to focus on getting the help she needed to leave a violent relationship. Small threats lead to bigger threats, and bigger threats become actions. So, this young woman feels that even a threat of violence should be enough to make you grab what you need and leave.

Alcohol and drugs can often trigger violence but it can happen even if someone is sober. Once a cycle of abuse starts it usually only gets worse, unless you and the other person get help.

She found the Palm Island police to be very helpful, providing advice about where she could get help. Community groups such as Kootana Women's Centre (for women) and the Palm Island Men's Business Group (for men) can provide guidance and assistance. Also, the Palm Island office of Relationships Australia can help if you need to have a yarn. And the staff at Joyce Palmer Health Service can refer you, your kids, or your partner to counsellors.

If you are not comfortable talking to someone lo-



cally, there are people from Townsville who will come and help.

When you speak to people working in this area anything you say will be treated with respect and kept private.

The young woman who is speaking out about this difficult issue feels that, without help, there's only one place perpetrators will end up, and that's in gaol.

She asked them to think about what they are doing when they hurt their kids or partners and urged them to remember there are other ways to solve problems without using violence.

Finally, she asked the men in the community to remember that, even though they may not be violent, the women and

kids who were being affected might be your sister, daughter or mother.

"So, if you know something bad is happening to someone you know and love, encourage them to get help or to get out."

First Aid Hints and Tips

Sexual Health Matters

Ian the local ambo and Rachel from sexual health have got together to canvass Palm Island to increase awareness of sexually transmitted diseases.

We will be going to all areas of Palm Island either in an Ambulance or the Local Health Bus to make it easy for people to check their sexual health.

We will be setting up, usually in the afternoon, to encourage people to do a little urine test to check for STDs especially Chlamydia and Gonorrhoea.

There is no shame in this. The test is private and confidential and if you do have something its easily treated.

As part of Ian's course that he is doing he will soon be able to treat people – so people on the island will have different options they can see Rachel the sexual health nurse – Deacon (Frank) sexual health worker or Ian the ambo

We will also be promoting healthy diets and eating habits and will provide fluids and fruits as part of our visits around the island.

So if you are sexually active and feel that you may have contracted something the option is there to seek help—keep an eye out for Rachel and Myself set up in your local area soon.

We encourage all people to talk to us.



Stinger Suits Have Arrived

The specially designed Palm Island Stinger Suits, will be available from the Ambulance Station and the store from the 22 December.

These suits were arranged and ordered as part of the Palm Island Ambulance Service JellyFish 2007 project to provide stinger suits for Palm Island kids to use when they are involved in water activities arranged by the schools or PCYC.

However, it is better for your kids to wear a stinger suit everytime they go in the water. So, if you can, buy your children their own stinger suit so they are better protected when swimming.

There are various sizes are available (but remember, they come in kids sizes only).

The cost of the suits is \$30 for one, \$20 per extra suit. The normal price in the shops is \$70.00 each.

Money from the sale of these suits will go toward buying more suits at this discounted price.



STINGER FIRST AID

- Protect yourself from being stung.
- Pour Vinegar liberally over the sting site. Up to 8 litres may be required.
- If you don't have vinegar and are able, go to the nearest Vinegar Station.
- Make the person comfortable
- Protect airway, breathing and circulation
- Ring the Ambulance on **000**
- **DO NOT** wash the area with fresh water

Immunisation Important for All

In July 2007, three new vaccines were added to the Immunisation schedule for families in Queensland. Vaccines are important because they protect us from many preventable diseases.

Sometimes it is difficult for parents to keep up with the latest vaccines needed for their children, or themselves.

The Child Health Clinic can help you to make sure your family is up to date with their vaccinations.

You can have your immunisations at the Child Health Clinic between the hours of 8:00am and 4:30pm.

You don't need to make an appointment to see Aggie for your immunisations. Also, if you are unsure about what immunisations you are due for, call Aggie on 4752 5172 and she will be able to assist.

Remember: These vaccines are FREE.

Doctors run clinics Monday to Friday 8 am to 5 pm. See the administration staff for appointments

Pharmacy

Mon, Wed Thurs, Fri 10am to 1 pm 2pm to 4.30 pm Tuesday only close 6.30 pm

Dressing Clinic

8am to 4pm Monday to Friday only – unless it is an emergency

Dental Clinic

Tuesday every week in the Community Health Area. You need a current **Health Care Card** or **Pension card** to be eligible for this service. Come up between 9-10am to have your problem looked at. Then you will be booked in for an appointment at the next available clinic.

Physiotherapy

Physiotherapist visits every Wednesday. Contact the hospital to make and appointment.

Renal Clinic

The Renal Specialist (nephrologist) visits every two months, and clinics with the Renal Dietician and Social Worker are held every month. If you have been referred as a patient, the clinic will contact you with details of your appointment.

Paediatrics Clinic

The Paediatrics Clinic is held monthly at JPHS. Contact the hospital for more details.

Speech Therapy

The Speech Therapist visits Palm Island every month. Contact the hospital for more details.

Eye Clinic

The Optometrist visits once a month and the eye specialist (opthamologist) comes twice a year. Contact the hospital for more details.

Diabetes Clinic

The Diabetes clinic is held monthly. Contact the hospital for more details.

Podiatry

The podiatry clinic is held every month. Contact the hospital for more details.

Mental Health Team

The Mental Health Team Office is open from 8.30am to 4.30pm. Phone 4753 5163. The Team can help with mental health assessment, crisis intervention, case management, consultation and liaison with persons presenting to JPHS emergency department, court liaison, Individual counselling and family therapy.

Child Health Clinic

Aggie is available from 8am to 4.30 Monday to Friday to provide help with child health problems issues such as immunisation and baby health checks. Also provide help for some women's health issues and family counselling. Ring on 4752 5172 or call in anytime.

Midwife Clinic

The midwife is available every Tuesday and Friday from 8.30am till 3.30pm. She can provide pregnancy testing, antenatal care and eduction, organise ultrasounds, offer postnatal care, contraceptive advice and help with women's health issues. Call 0437 550 171 or just come up and see her.

Sexual Health Clinic

Rachel, and Frank are in the office 8am to 4.30pm Monday to Friday. The clinic is open late on Tuesday nights till 6.30pm. No appointment is needed.

We provide advice, treatment and management of any sexual health issues.

Women's Health Nurse

The Nurse will be available on the following dates:

- Tuesday 20th November
- Tuesday 4th December

You can go to the clinic if you need help or advice about any aspects of women's health. The team can help with information about issues such as contraception, menopause, or protecting yourself against diseases that may cause infertility.

REMEMBER: If you come for your regular pap smear, we can *prevent* cervical cancer. If you are under 26 years you can are eligible for a free Gardisil vaccination, which can help to protect you against cervical cancer.

Ring Rachel for an appointment on 4752 5165, or simply drop in between 8.00am-3.00pm on the day.
