Youth rally over Easter in first for Palm Island

Palm Island's PCYC is gearing up to host its first-ever Easter Youth Rally this weekend.

Palm Islanders aged from 14-27 years old are all welcome, organiser Deniece Geia said.

"It's Holy Week for most Catholics on the Island as well as many Christians who celebrate the birth, death and resurrection of Christ," Mrs Geia said. She said the idea came from the young people themselves who have been congregating at the PCYC during the Deadly Youth night programs. "Most of them just want to talk and share their thoughts, especially their faith, and how they see

the world," she said.

"From there, little ideas began to grow into a bigger idea to invite young people from across the region to join in Holy Week celebrations. "This is an opportunity to connect with local indigenous youths as they share cultures and stories and learn from each other's experiences." The rally kicks off at 9am on Good Friday (April 6) with an AIM church service, followed by a barbecue lunch.

Activities over the alcohol- and drug-free weekend include an under-18 disco, sports, bible study, traditional dancing and drumming and music workshops.

Supporters of the rally include a youth group from Streams of Living Waters, based in Townsville.

"Agencies, schools, youth groups and church groups are invited to attend to encourage a positive gathering of young people in a safe, friendly environment," Mrs Geia said.

"PCYC has public liability coverage as well as excellent facilities.

"This rally is not just about preaching the gospel but also about living the gospel and sharing it through various activities that stimulate the body, mind and spirit," she said.

"We are looking forward to a large crowd of young people. I would like to thank the wonderful sponsors who have contributed to making the rally a success."

Statewide landslide reflect PI booth result

New State Member for Townsville John Hathaway received by far the highest percentage of the 645 formal votes cast by Palm Islanders at the school polling booth on the March 24 State election.

LNP candidate Mr Hathaway received 308 votes which represented 47.91% of the total compared with 169 (26.20%) by former member Mandy Johnstone (pictured). Katter's Australian Party candidate Ray Grigg also polled well with 123 votes (19.07%). Mr Hathaway, Ms Johnstone and Mr Grigg all visited Palm Island in the lead up to the election. Other candidates Jenny Stirling for the Greens received 29 votes (4.10%) whilst First Family Party's Michael Punshon gained 15 votes (2.33%).

The LNP won a landslide

victory and will hold a massive majority in the new Parliament. Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey congratulated the new Government.

"I want to congratulate Campbell Newman and the LNP Government for their win and say, as I said before the election, that we will work with any government that is in power," he said.

"On behalf of the people of Palm we hope they continue to stick with their pre-election commitments to working with us to ensure Palm Island gets the attention it needs.

"Indications before the election



were very supportive so we look forward to a productive working relationship and certainly I'll work with them to get what is right for Palm but also for the region."

Rover support for CFF

The CFF team was presented a brand new Freelander 2 car as a measure of Land Rover's support for their work on the Island at Townsville's Pallarenda Beach last week. "We are so excited to have a Land Rover on Palm Island and this will make life so much easier there. It is amazing," Ms Stephen said. The state of the art Land Rover will be used on community outreach programs. "Land Rover has given us the mobility to drive literacy and



school achievement rates in the right direction," Ms Stephen said.

"We consistently attempt to engage with all sectors of the community and given the size and geographical dispersion of the population, it is critical that we have motor vehicle access to be able to link with the whole of community."

The Land Rover will travel by barge to Palm next week.

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council Community Infrastructure News

Infrastructure projects such as the trench for new drainage works (*pictured right*) and housing programs will continue to boost local employment in the community over the next two years, Mayor Alf Lacey says.

"And it is projects like that we hope will encourage young people in our community to take up opportunities to seek employment so they can have a better standard of life and a better way of life," he said.

"Most of this current work is funded by NDRRA (Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements), which is a natural disaster program between the Commonwealth and the state, and we'll see more of these projects happening as time go on.

"I think one of the other most important things is the Upper Lama Lama new subdivision, and also the Kitchener Bligh outstation, have gone out to tender.

"We're due to make an announcement on who will win those contracts with a projected start-up time in mid-April.

"We've said very strongly to bidders that local employment and training must be a part of these projects.

"I'm certainly very supportive and committed to making sure we see good outcomes for the people of Palm with any of these major infrastructure program contracts.

"These subdivisions bring with them almost 60 brand new homes for the community over the next year and a bit, and that's certainly a massive improvement from our point of view.



"We've put up a display in the supermarket showing the different styles of housing and what the subdivisions will look like.

"The other important thing is our replacement homes are already starting



to be built by construction companies, already replacing three homes in the community.

"There's also been a massive upgrade program, to renovate and repair existing homes.

"When I go around and talk to people they seem quite pleased to see that their renovation is getting done.

"Everyone will have some type of work done to them under the Upgrade Program.

"I'm proud to be a part of those achievements to ensure we have our housing, which is a basic need in any community – finally we can start seeing families moving to more comfortable housing with better designs to suit us.

"So I'm very happy to let the community know that the 2012 Community Housing Development Program for Palm Island is all on track.

"On another note, I can confidentially say that the Reconstruction Authority has committed \$12.5 million for the Foreshore Development here on Palm.

"So, that's going to be another massive infrastructure project for the community.

"Council has put in a submission under the normal process, and I have advocated very strongly with the Authority for that.

"We've said all along that the foreshore on Palm Island is in bad need of repair. Palm needs to be given some priority in terms of reconstruction so I'm very pleased with that outcome."



Boxers a knock-out in State tournament

KNOCKOUT punches by two star Palm Island boxers were a highlight of the Queensland Boxing Association tournament at far off Inala in Brisbane last Saturday night.

Experienced 20-year-old Thomas Blanket knocked out V Lay of Brisbane in round two of his bout. Debutant Shanden Burns, aged 15, also scored a second round knockout in his impressive win over R Wassmuth of Caboolture.

Eight Palm boxers made the long bus journey south and Shanden was one of five having their first bout.

The others were Marcus Ketchup, Levi Baira, Kevin Kidner and Chris Evers jnr who were all impressive.

Marcus, aged 13, defeated B Roberts of the Gold Coast on points and Levi, 10, drew with Sunshine Coast boxer B Ncgaughran.

Chris, 9, beat T Kennedy of Brisbane, and Kevin, 10, lost on points to D Gleeson from the State capital.

Patrick Clarke lost on points to J Katz of the Gold Coast and Selwyn Seaton went down on points to A Phillips from the Gold Coast.

The other boxer who made the journey David Sam didn't get a fight in his super heavyweight division but was on-hand to help assistant trainer Chris Evers snr in the corner during bouts.

"Officials down at Inala were very impressed with Thomas and Shanden and also our little boxers who have big futures," Chris snr said the next day.

"There were a lot of Murris in the crowd at the Inala PCYC and it was a great atmosphere."

The boxers left Palm Island on last Thursday's ferry and then made the marathon 15 hour bus journey to the State capital.

"There have been a lot of new boxers training on Palm Island lately and I wanted to give some of them a bout," he said. "They are young fellas."

The team stayed at Kangaroo Point the night of the tournament and then drove back on Sunday and to catch Monday's ferry back to Palm.

The team was considering travelling back to Brisbane for a tournament at Acacia Ridge in three weeks time. There is also a possibility some of our boxers may compete at the State Amateur Boxing League tournament in Kuranda in the coming weeks.

Morgan to play for state U-15 AFL



RUGBY league may be fanatically followed on Palm Island but that has in no way held back Ethan Morgan from being selected to play for the Queensland under-15 Indigenous Team in Australian Rules.

Ethan will play in the National Kickstart Championships from 10-13 April.

This follows his attendance at a Kickstart Camp at Tallebudgera on the Gold Coast where five Palm Island and Townsville students were among 50 talented young indigenous footballers from all over the state.

Ethan along with Thomas K. Solomon, Shanden Burns, Lance Hudson and Koipe Castors were selected for the camp via community nominations based on criteria of leadership qualities, school and community involvement, and football ability.

Over three days the group was led through a rigorous

schedule which encompassed, high performance testing, career development and leadership sessions, cultural activity and, of course, an intensive football program led by Queensland under-14 Indigenous head coach and former Brisbane Lions player Anthony Corrie.

"The most pleasing aspect about the group, aside from their athletic ability, was their commitment and desire to better themselves as people and be role models within their community," Corrie said. This year AFL Queensland partnered with the Queensland Government's Department of Communities to ensure the program was

more accessible to athletes from remote communities. Schools and clubs across the state were quick to recognise the opportunity and AFL Queensland were overwhelmed with player nominations to attend the camp.

"The response to the program this year has been sensational," AFL Queensland Engagement Manager Trent Ryan said.

"It provides young Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander men an opportunity to showcase their football ability but it is broader than that, it equips them with personal skills that will enable them to succeed regardless of how far their footy takes them."

Sensational score kicks off 2012 PIRL

THE much anticipated Palm Island Rugby League comp kicked off last Saturday with champion back Tabua Oui scoring an amazing opening 54 points.

Oui scored seven tries and kicked 13 goals for his side Mount Bentley Raiders, which defeated Hornets 92-22 at the Palm football oval. Playing in the centre, Oui totally dominated for Raiders who have reentered the competition after a break last season.

A son of the late and great former champion Palm Island back Hector Poynter, Oui has been a loyal Barracudas player at many Allblacks carnivals and is rated one of the top club footballers in north Oueensland.

He was named amongst Palm's best ever in the legends of league published in the 100th Issue of the *Palm Island Voice*.

Kevin Morgan also scored three tries for Raiders, Frank Baira two and singles went to Wayne Barry, Caleb Geia, Costa Sam, and Josh Baira. Kevin Morgan kicked one goal.

For Hornets Owen Robertson scored two tries with one apiece to Darryl Bramwell and Cooper Kerr, Josh Landers kicked two goals and Owen Robertson one.

The match between reigning premiers Jets and Butler Bay Bulls was called off at halftime because Jets was reduced to just seven players after injuries.

Allan Brown, Billo Wotton and William Blackman scored two tries each in a first half blitz with singles to Pita Morgan, Frank Morgan and Robert Bulsey.

Pita Morgan booted seven goals.

Jets try scorers were Robert Chookie and Keenan Kerr, while Gavin Barry kicked a lone goal.

In the other match Mundy bay Warriors defeated Brothers by forfeit. Skipjacks had the bye.

Palm Island Rugby League President Ili Dabea all sides will be at full strength in round two next weekend.

"We had a big crowd and thanks to locals who were referees and touch judges," Ili said.
