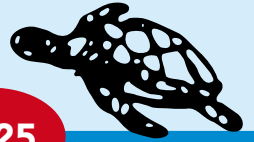

History in the making – Mayor Alf Lacey elected for second term

Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey has returned to office for a second four-year term after gaining more than 200 votes over his nearest rivals in last weekend's Council elections.



Cr Lacey has made history in the political landscape of Palm as the only Mayor to ever be returned for a second term.

The new Council will be Roy Prior, Eddie Walsh, Mislam Sam and Frank Conway. Crs Prior, Sam and Conway were members of Mr Lacey's team in the lead-up to the elections.

Cr Lacey said he was stunned at the results, much humbled and very grateful.

"I'd like to thank the community for putting their trust in me again and I'm looking

forward to another four years of hard work towards achieving our vision for our community," he said.

"I'd also like to thank the new Councillors for putting their hands up to do some hard yards for our people here on Palm, and I look forward to working with them all.

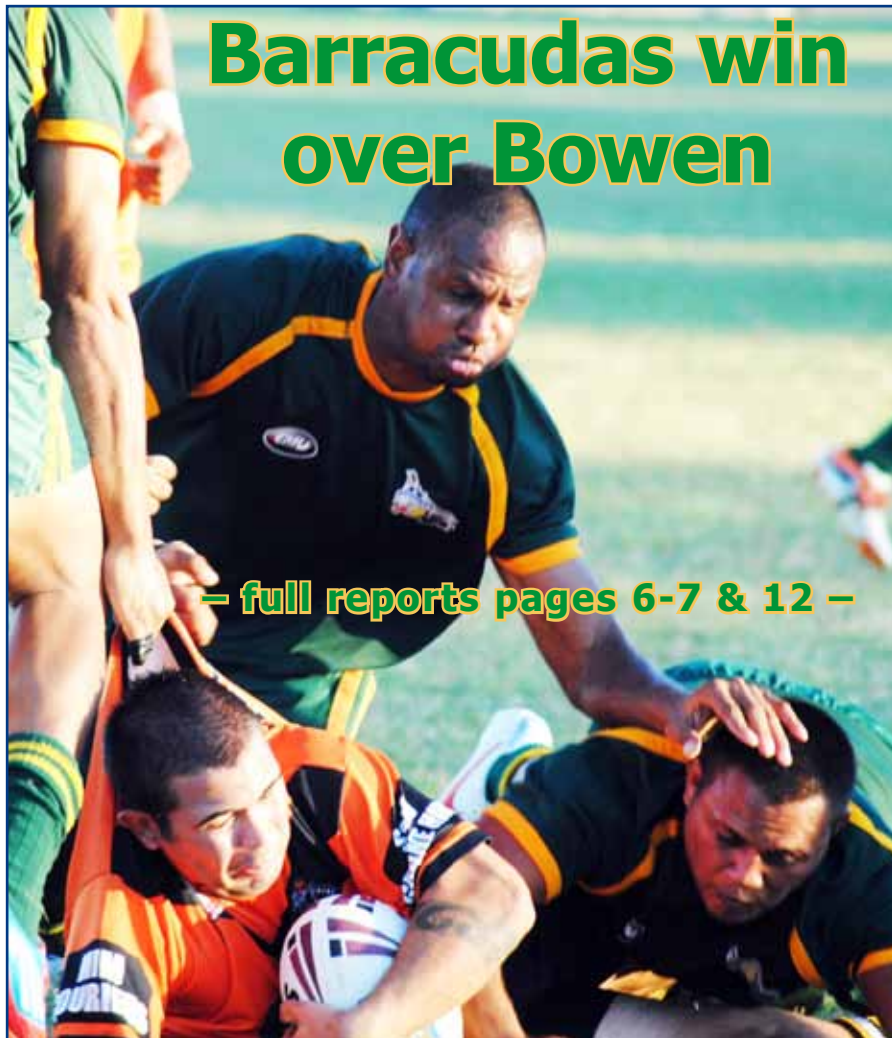
"Now we can really put our heads down and start working together for the better life and community we all want for our people, our families and most importantly our children."

CDEP diesel back online

'State-of-the-art' diesel lines are now in place at CDEP thanks to a gang of workers' hot, dusty and hard work to put things together late last month.

Coolgaree working hard to get people trained

Coolgaree's Employment & Training team has worked hard to place participants from CDEP and a number of referrals from Job Find into various courses since the start of 2012.

First Aid and CPR training with Mark Gilmore from St John's Ambulance has been undertaken over two days at the PCYC with 15 staff (listed below) from Coolgaree attending and passing.

In March 16 people were signed up for an 18-week Cert II in Construction at TAFE.

This course is now in its seventh week and progressing well.

Following that an Asset Maintenance course was run over 10 days with 15 participants, all of whom completed and passed the course. They are now waiting to receive their certificates, so well done!

Six CDEP participants are currently studying for their Cert II in Heavy Machinery & Civil Construction Course, which started at the PCYC in April and will finish on May 17.

A Cert II in Security was due to start this week, also at the PCYC, with eight CDEP participants expected to participate.

Finally 13 participants are expected to enrol in a Cert II in Hospitality due to start on May 8 and run over a period of five weeks.

A Youth Camp will be taking place on May 7 to Fantome Island for three days. The camp has been organised by Coolgaree for under-21-year-old participants in CDEP.

Motivational speaker Jeremy Donovan will be attending the camp and delivering programs aimed at helping young men with any social or personal issues.

Coolgaree Employment & Training offers a \$300 voucher as part of our 'Earn & Learn' incentive for the completion of Certificate II courses, which is given to people after they receive their certificates.

Townsville 'Murrayoke' open to Palm Islanders

Palm Islanders who find themselves in Townsville over weekends are invited to join the Smallwood family's "Murrayoke" (karaoke!) nights at the Hermit Park Hotel every Friday night.

Gracelyn Smallwood said it was a not-for-profit social night.

"It's more about having a social night where our people can feel welcome and comfortable, and where we emphasise responsible drinking and a zero tolerance for violence," she said.

"We have food served from 7pm, the footy on the big screen and we're open until late.

"Any Palm Islanders who are on the mainland are very welcome to come along to a real family atmosphere where we always have a lot of fun."

She said prizes were randomly awarded to singers, dress should be neat and casual (no thongs or singlets), and there was a \$2 cover charge.



Milestone achieved for financial services through ICAN

A better level of financial help is now available on Palm through ICAN workers Ronald Fave and Ray Kent after they recently graduation from a diploma-level financial counselling course.

Mr Fave said it was a milestone for them and Palm Island.

"I think it's really important to be able to learn as much as you can, but find ways and means of making it practical; somehow that people could be able to use to help themselves, better their lifestyles, achieve their goals financially," he said.

"That's just one aspect of what we all do at ICAN as well.

"Today, we graduate with the Diploma in Community Services Financial Counselling.

"We went through a whole series of modules that allowed for us to be able to pick up on key areas that people without skills would not be able to pick up on.

"There's no doubt the people of Palm Island are better off having people that are skilled helping them and also being culturally understood by them, I guess.

Mr Kent said they had wanted to be better skilled so they could help people on the Island.

"We know that lots of people have lots of problems; they get ripped off, they don't understand their legal rights," he said.

"So, if we're better trained, we can actually help the clients a lot better.

"The government's new laws which give customers much more rights, but you got to understand what those rights are otherwise you won't be able to use them.

"And one of the things we did was go through in detail what those rights are, so we're a lot more skilled at being able to say to people, for example, if you buy a fridge and it doesn't work the person who supplied the fridge has to take it back from Palm and get it repaired so the person doesn't have to pay as they did in the past.

"So, it's little things like that that make a huge difference to the client."

Go Barracudas

THE Barracudas football team are the pride of Palm Island after thrashing Bowen District 46-16 in a representative rugby league match late last month.

Last year a combined Palm Island/Bowen competed in the prestigious north Queensland Foley Shield but was dumped for this season when the competition was reduced from eight sides to three.

To ensure Palm Island and Bowen players who compete in their respective domestic comps gained a chance to be noticed for representative honours, the QRL Northern Division organised this match at Bowen's Denison Park.

It was played before a large crowd after Townsville rolled Mackay 42-28 in a Foley Shield game there.

The Barracudas side was selected after round three of local Palm fixtures on 14th April and only had a couple of training sessions under coach Genami Geia. Players, officials and supporters travelled by bus to Bowen on the day of the game.

Along the way back Darryl Pearson and some other supporters were seen at Home Hill.

The game was a cracker and star Barracudas winger Miceal Sibley scored a try in the fourth minute. However Bowen hit back with a converted try soon after to see the home side lead 6-4.

From there it was never in doubt after classy winger Obe Geia jnr crossed out wide and then Sibley scored his second try at the 20th minute.

Barracudas forwards Fabulous Fred Bulsey -- the team captain, Caleb Geia, Costa Sam and Frank Baira were dominating and making lots of metres up the centre of the ruck and that allowed the ball to be continually fired to eager outside back. Bowen seemed fragile out wide.

Thirteen minutes later tough Barracudas five eighth Darryl Pearson crossed after a clever chip kick and his brother Gary converted.

When elusive halfback John Baira scored a try just before halftime, Gary Pearson converted putting the Barracudas ahead by 24-6.

At the break coach Genami Geia didn't want his charges to get complacent and told them it was "nil all and the game starts again from now."

Barracudas second half tries were scored by Darryl Pearson, Miceal Sibley, James Sibley and Fred Bulsey.

Palm Island Voice would like to add young Mundy Bay Warriors back Morris Watson, big Walter Geia, and Barracudas stalwart Esrom Geia to that list.

Watson came off the bench and had class written all

over him.

After the final siren, players and supporters posed for pictures despite an attack by hungry sand flies and mosquitoes.

Rugby league's Northern Division Manager Scott Nosworthy said the Barracudas players "were far too good for Bowen".

Mr Nosworthy described Obe Geia jnr as the "Flier from Palm Island."

His remarks auger well for speculation that Palm Island will be included if the Foley Shield is expanded again in 2013.

To add to the interest, local lad Fred Haines jnr played well for Townsville in the win over reigning Foley Shield champions Mackay.

His dad Fred Haines snr and mother Eva were both at Bowen watching both games.

William PI in top form, trainer says

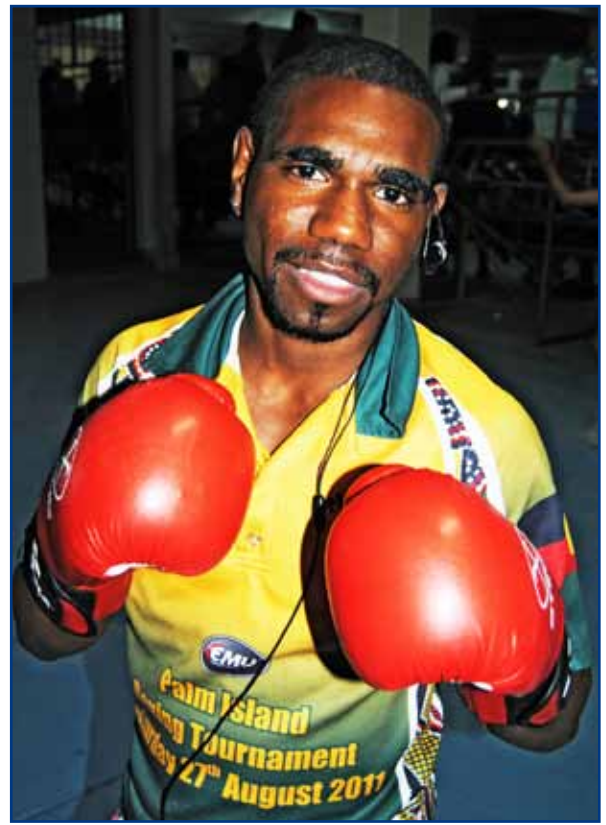
WILLIAM Palm Island has been showing continued great form since moving to Townsville and training with the Dragon Do Jos Boxing Club.
