A winning start for Kathleen's boxing career

FIFTEEN-year-old Bwgcolman State High School student Kathleen Haines' is well on track to being the new 'Queen' of Palm Island sport after winning her first ever competition fight in Blackwater earlier this month.

Blackwater is 700kms away from Townsville and Kathleen was one of the nine-member boxing team plus trainers and supporters in a 12-seater bus headed for the Sunstate Amateur Boxing League tournament.

Palm Island Voice also made the journey with myself - Alf Wilson - and Palm Islander CJ Pearson sharing the bus driving duties.

Barracudas hot favourites in Cairns this weekend

PALM Island will meet Torres Strait in their first game at the Remote Area Rugby League Far North Queensland Challenge in Cairns this weekend.

Other sides competing will be Southern Cape York, Bowen, Northern Cape and Three Rivers and the Palm Island Voice will be there to cover all the action.

Palm Island will be one of the strongest contenders and are a hot favourite to take out the carnival.

A large number of Palm Island supporters will travel to Cairns to see the five games each side will play over two days.

Matches will be played to two-20 minute halves. which players will no doubt appreciate due to unseasonable humidity in the northern city over previous weeks.

On day one in field one, at Jones Park in Mann St, Westcourt, Southern Cape will meet Bowen while on field two Northern Cape will play Three Rivers at 9am. Torres Strait against Palm

Island should be one of the clashes of the weekend in

what will be an entertaining carnival overall.

Round one of the Thursday Island based four-club Kaiwalagal Rugby League competition commenced at TI's Ken Brown Memorial Oval on 11 May.

By comparison the sevenclub Palm Island domestic competition started early in April, so the Barracudas players will have a potential fitness advantage.

Keen judges believe Torres Strait and Palm Island will have the two best sides of the carnival so their clash in game three at 9.50am is sure to attract the attention of crowds.

At 10.40am on the same day Three Rivers clashes with Southern Cape and at 11.30am Torres Strait will meet Northern Cape on field one, while Bowen takes on Palm Island on the other oval.

In 1pm games, Bowen meets
Three Rivers and Northern
Cape takes on Palm Island.
Then at Barlow Park

starting at 2.15pm Torres Strait is drawn to meet Southern Cape.

This will be a curtain raiser to the Northern Pride Intrust Super Cup match and will also attract a large crowd.

Games on Sunday May 26 will all be at Barlow Park, with Northern Cape to meet Bowen at 9am, Torres Strait v Three Rivers at 9.50am

Palm Island v Southern
Cape at 10.40am, Torres
Strait v Bowen at 11.30am,
Three Rivers v Palm Island
at 12.30pm, and Southern
Cape v Northern Cape at
1.10pm in the final match.
Following the carnival, a
Northern United team will
be selected to play against

Cairns on 29th June 2013.

Mungalla leadership training gets a big 'thumbs up'

Four boys from Coolgaree Aboriginal Corporation attended a leadership camp on working cattle station, "Mungalla", run by Jacob Cassady just outside of Ingham, in April.

The boys were Kenneth Huddy, Gary Fulford, Cyril Murray Jnr and Robert Snyder, and also with them was Coolgaree Employment & Training Arm mentor Sidney (Chikko) Charles.

The program gave the boys an opportunity to learn new skills in areas such as basic care for horses and livestock, repair and maintenance of fences, maintaining water supplies and livestock, recognising and treating weeds, and machinery operations.

Evening sessions were dedicated to the leadership course and included personal development, breaking cycles, leadership, communication and how to

change thinking.

Presenters included NSW
Trainee Of The Year,
Aboriginal Electrical Engineer
and Elder Uncle Trevor Prior
Jnr, Mungalla Managing
Director Jacob Cassady and
aualified trainer and assessor
Peter Bates.

The boys were very enthused and a couple have expressed a desire to work in this industry.

For maximum benefit to



the Palm Island community
Coolgaree is attempting to
integrate the boys into the
PCYC Youth Group and has
also offered their skills to the
Animal Control department
of the Palm Island Aboriginal
Shire Council.

This course was funded through the Department of Families, Housing, Community Services and Indigenous Affairs under 'Closing the Gap'.

The Expo provided an opportunity for students from Bwgcolman Community State and St Michael's Catholic schools to have a good look at their pathway options for secondary schooling over the next few years.

Representatives from 13 schools from as far north as Weipa and as far south
