Residents' anger at being searched again (and again)...



'ENOUGH!'
PALM Island residents are angry police have searched their bags again on at least two separate occasions as they boarded the Sealink ferry in Townsville last week.

Consultations around Alcohol Management Plans (AMPs) have revealed punitive laws and police searches are a big issue for many Palm Islanders, as has been reported in the *Palm Island Voice* several times, including on the front page of Issue 98, published in February last year (*above*).

Mayor Alf Lacey said a draft AMP report to present to the State Government has revealed the AMP's rules and continual bag searches of

residents by police at both ends of the ferry continued to be an issue for locals.

"Council continues to be disappointed at police methods when they conduct bag

searches both in Townsville and on Palm," he said.

"So do residents and that is included in the draft report to be presented to the State Government."

Proud railway history to go on show

MANY Palm Island men worked hard on the railway line between Townsville and Mount Isa some years ago as an integral part of the construction and maintenance of the vital rail link.



The stories and experiences of Torres Strait Islanders, Aboriginal people and Australian South Sea Islanders are on show in a new exhibition at Townsville's the Museum of Tropical Queensland.

Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey was invited to the official opening of "I've Been Working on the Railway", held last Tuesday.

Museum of Tropical Queensland Director Peter McLeod said the exhibition uncovered stories of camp life, the realities of the work, hardships, separation from their land, islands and families, and the opportunities and challenges of working on the railway.

He said it also included acknowledgement of the World Track Laying record set on 8 May 1968 on the Mt Newman line in Port Hedland (WA).

Personal accounts of working life were central to the exhibition, he said.

"While some families went with the men, living in the arduous and every-changing camp existence along railway tracks, we also

explore the experiences of the many families who were left behind and continued life with their husband or fathers far away," Mr McLeod said.

"I've Been Working on the Railway" is open from 13

August to 13 October 2013 and will be accompanied by a display of local historical railway photographs, stories and objects.

It will also be shown in Canberra, Newcastle and Perth.

Elder has had enough of 'degrading' searches

Resident Elder Maggie Blackley (*pictured middle below*) said she was angry and disgusted police searches for alcohol continued.

A former-Councillor, Mrs Blackley said she was annoyed when seven police officers searched her baggage and that of other passengers as they were about to catch the 10.30am ferry on 8 August from the Townsville ferry terminal.

"We are treated like second class citizens," she said. "The police break the seals on bags and luggage and leave it that way after they finish searching.

"I was searched six times and I don't even drink."

Mrs Blackley also said police were rude as they searched.

A passionate advocate for

the rights of Palm Islanders, she said she felt the searches were degrading and made Palm Islanders feel like criminals.



"We have our personal items put on the ground for everybody to see and that often includes scores of passengers going to and from Magnetic Island by ferry," she said.

In one recent search Mrs Blackley said a couple were each taking a carton of legal mid strength beer to Palm and both were marked with their names.

"The lady picked up the two cartons to place them

on a trolley and the police confiscated them saying she could not take more than one," she said.

"This is what we have to put up with."

She said it was mostly Indigenous passengers who were searched, and that often police were also waiting at the Reel Women Jetty.

"If the police search our bags they should also be doing that to every worker coming to and from the Island such as nurses, doctors, police and everybody else," she said.

Overall, Mrs Blackley said, the searches were a genuine waste of public taxpayers money.

"What is the Australian public saying about this?" she said. "Why should our personal items be on display to the general public?"

"This is so degrading."

Townsville MP John Hathaway was contacted for comment but did not respond before deadline.

There were 25 bouts on the big card at the Ayr Catholic Church Hall and the six Palm boxers were all keen for a bout.

However three of our fighters – Kevin, Dennis jnr and Natalie weren't able to be matched.

Kathleen lost on points in her second ever bout but Mr Dennis said she was

heavily outweighed.

"She weighed 48kg and her Ayr opponent was 7kg heavier and much taller," he said.

"It was a really good effort."

Brayden lost on points in the 32kg division and Albert jnr was outpointed by a quality opponent from Babinda in 60kg class.

"We haven't been to a tournament for some months so it was a good effort overall," Mr Dennis said.

Gene Barry kindly drove the 12-seater hire bus and supporters Luke Lenoy and Neville Haines also went along.

Gene is the father of

Brayden and Neville the dad of Kathleen.

Neville is well-known as a quality pool and eight-ball player at the Coolgaree Sports Bar and Grill.

The team travelled from Palm by Sealink ferry on 9th August and stayed at Townsville's Hotel Allen that night.

They left for Ayr about 9am on the day of the Sunstate Amateur Boxing League tournament which was well-attended.

Accommodation was found at the Ayr Caravan Park that night after the bouts and they returned at 1.30pm on Sunday 11th August to catch the ferry home to Palm.

2014 EXPRESSION OF INTEREST

The Brotherhood of St Laurence, through HIPPY Australia, is seeking Expressions of Interest (EOI) from organisations to implement HIPPY in the 25 recently announced communities.

The program currently operates in 50 locations across Australia. It is a two year home-based parenting and early childhood enrichment program that empowers parents and carers to be their child's first teacher. The program builds the confidence and skills of parents and carers to create a positive learning environment in order to prepare their child for school. It also offers some parents and carers a supported pathway to employment and local community leadership.

Organisations wishing to apply should demonstrate experience in working with families, children and the local community, with links to early childhood education, child care, schools and other community, family and children's services. It is expected that organisations will provide managerial support to the program coordinator, as well as an office and a child-friendly group meeting space.
