



Federal praise for schools' win in truancy battle



Palm Island has set a benchmark for schools around the rest of Australia after dramatically reducing truancy rates since 12 Student Attendance Officers have been on the job, Federal Minister for Indigenous Affairs Nigel Scullion (*above right*) said during his visit to Pam Island earlier this month.

The Student Attendance Officers have been employed under a Federal Government Program since the beginning of this school year.

By the third week the average attendance rate had reached

98% at one of the schools.

During the first two weeks it was 88% and 90% – well up on average rates for 'wagging' last year.

Local residents recruited as Student Attendance Officers

have a role to check up on families when their children miss school or help to find suitable transport options to ensure kids make it to class on time.

The team from Campbell Page are delivering the pilot program in close collaboration with local partner organisations, school principals, parents, carers and community.

Campbell Page CEO Xavier Crimmins said it was good to see Federal Minister for Indigenous Affairs Nigel Scullion take an interest.



“It was good to see the Minister taking a personal interest in the success of this initiative and wanting to see first hand the results that are being achieved on the ground,” he said.

“School attendance rates are already significantly higher and I’d like to congratulate all



involved on a great start to the year.

“This couldn’t have been achieved without the combined investment of schools, parents and the community.”

Principals Jeff Jones (Bwgcolman Community School) and Gary Recklies (St Michael’s) described the program as a success.

Mr Scullion praised students whilst stressing the importance of a good education.

“You students here on Palm have really set the benchmark for schools around Australia and this is community driven and the workers are locals who know the challenges facing families,” he said.

Mayor Alf Lacey also praised the program and said it was similar to one many years ago on Palm Island.

“Back then elders would go around and take kids

to school and talk to families,” Cr Lacey said.

During his classroom visits Mr Scullion asked students what issues they saw which could be improved.

They nominated overcrowding, transport such as roads to be fixed, more ferries and planes to



the island, and the need for more local shops and cheaper food.

“I will be speaking with Council and the State Government about the prospects of an additional food shop as opposition ensures for lower prices,” the Minister promised.

“Local people should be encouraged to grow their own fruit and vegetables to save money.”



Mr Scullion spoke to some of the Student Attendance Officers about their important roles, including 25-year-old Kylie Doomadgee.

“The Minister was down to earth,” she said.

Another officer, Simmeon Oui said he felt privileged to play a part in ensuring kids attend school.

Travel relief for renal patients

Local dialysis will be available for more renal patients on Palm Island as facilities at the Joyce Palmer Health Service are about to be expanded to include a new chair.

That's good news for those who currently have to travel to Townsville for treatment.

Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council Mayor Alf Lacey and Townsville Hospital and Health Service chief executive Julia Squire both welcomed the news.

"This new initiative is evidence of the Palm Island Health Action Plan at work and allows our people to stay on the Island bringing a lot of relief to families," Mayor Lacey said.

"It's a great partnership between the Shire and the Townsville Hospital and Health Service."

Townsville Hospital & Health Service (THHS) Board chair John Bearne said the health service had listened to the community and delivered a needed service.

Townsville THHS chief executive Julia Squire said newly diagnosed renal patients would still need to have their initial treatment in Townsville.

"Once established they can then dialyse on the island," she said. "We continue to have very productive discussions with the Shire and the community and we are really delighted to have been able to deliver what the community has told us it needs."

Mrs Squire said an additional dialysis chair would be available at the Joyce Palmer Health Service for patients undergoing dialysis for end-stage renal failure.

"We are currently looking at how we can schedule shifts for dialysis that will enable our patients to get the maximum benefit of the extra chair," she said.

Mrs Squire said the upgrade would include new water treatment equipment, new

electrical and air-conditioning systems and some structural work to increase the floor space.

"While the upgrade is underway, we'll be training more nurses in renal dialysis," she said.

"This is fantastic news for island residents.

"Once they are stabilised, Palm Island residents will be able to dialyse with the support of family and loved ones and without having to leave the island."

Talking the walk or walking the talk?

Sea wall progress in Minister's sights

WHILST on the Island Federal Minister Nigel Scullion inspected new sea walls being built under the Palm Island Foreshore Reconstruction Project.

Extensive damage to the Palm foreshore caused by Cyclone Yasi in February 2011 triggered the redevelopment, funded by the Federal and State Governments under the Natural Disaster Relief and Recovery Arrangements.

The work has been done with a combination of construction skills held by people from Palm Island as well as specialist contractors.

Mayor Alf Lacey accompanied Mr Scullion during his inspection and the Minister

was particularly impressed with the work done by a Palm Island gang which included Kevin Castors, Josh Geia, Aggie Wotton and Michael Castors.

“This work has all been done by Palm Islander people,” Cr Lacey said.

New staff on board for newest PCYC youth projects and programs

PCYC would like to introduce several new staff appointments to the community.

Firstly, Aaron Thaiday Jantzen is once again on board with Bwngcolman Radio 97.3FM, which is managed and operated by local community members in line with Indigenous Broadcasting Program objectives to support direct local control over content.

The station provides 10 hours of local pre-recorded interviews, talk-back, community announcements, news/weather, music requests and happenings every day.



Palm Island's primary youth support program, the Youth at Risk Initiative (YARI), will be jointly coordinated by Mere Ponga and Yolanda Kerr.

YARI is about providing a range of services which are flexible and responsive to the highest priorities and needs of vulnerable young people. Young people in most need of support are those at risk of homelessness or involvement in the youth justice and child safety systems. The program also focuses on integrating service provision without duplication while reducing



administration compliance burdens.

The program is primarily aimed at 10-18-year-olds, as well as 19-25-year-olds.



Similarly the Indigenous Community Sport and Recreation Program (ICSRP) is also to be jointly coordinated by Selena Hughes and Delena Foster.

Everyone from 5-100-years-old is the target of this program, aimed at increasing opportunities to participate in high quality sports and recreational activities.

The program supports increasing the capacity of communities themselves to plan, deliver and manage local activities appropriate to local needs.

ALSO THIS WEEK the PCYC launched the Palm Island Youth Development and Leadership Activity on Wednesday 12 March including a formal introduction for the community to several programs and initiatives including the new Palm Island Youth Council, youth interagency network, **CAMP OPAL**, and the Youth Mentor Support Group. New subdivision open for business and welcome

THERE were emotional scenes on Palm Island late last month, as brothers Moe and Keith Bligh unveiled a plaque to officially open the new Kitchener Bligh subdivision named in honour of their late father.

Special guests the Federal Minister for Indigenous Affairs Nigel Scullion and Queensland Minister for Housing and Public Works Tim Mander were at the ceremony, along with about 100 people including Mayor Alf Lacey, Councillors Mislam Sam, Frank Conway, Eddie Walsh and Roy Prior and several Elders.

Kitchener Bligh was a hard working Palm Islander who played a vital role in local construction.

“It was a very happy day for Palm Island and these new houses will be good for people,” Mr Keith Bligh said.

“This has made me think of Kitchener.”

The subdivision is one of two, the other being at the old rodeo grounds with a third in planning stages.

Mr Scullion said new housing would help with overcrowding in existing social welfare housing.

“Palm Island residents have been living with a housing shortage and overcrowded conditions for some time,” he said.

“This project demonstrates both the Australian and Queensland Governments’ determination to

improve the circumstances of Palm Islanders.”

Mr Mander said 13 new houses were completed already and 32 more were on track for completion by later this year.

“171 refurbishments have also completed and there are more to come – these new houses have a six star energy rating and are designed to meet all local conditions,” Mr Mander said.

“The houses use cross ventilation and natural light to limit the need for air-conditioners, fans or artificial lighting.

“Palm Island Shire Council is completing external driveways, car ports, garden sheds and fencing.

“All concrete is coming from the local Batching Plant.”

Cr Lacey said the opening of the sub division was significant for Palm Islanders.

“This shines a beacon of hope for our people here,” Cr Lacey said.



FOR two years Lynndel Prior lived in a small caravan in the bush but now enjoys one of the new houses.

"This has been a dream come true for me and it is just so good to come home from work where I have a place of my own," Ms Prior said.

HISTORY was made in the Council board room when Luella Bligh signed the deeds to the first 99-year home ownership lease on a Deed of Grant in Trust (DOGIT) community in Queensland.

The Palm Island Council, CEO Ross Norman, Ministers Scullion and Mander and others witnessed the event.

"This is a first for Palm and a very historic day," Cr Walsh said.

Cr Lacey said the home was purchased with Luella's own money on her own land.

"This will encourage our people to have ownership," Cr Lacey said.

Luella was delighted as she posed for a pic with her twin sister Leonie Hopkins.

"It is wonderful and my home is on Wallaby Point Road at Long Beach," Luella said.

A large number of local, state and national media were on Palm Island for the occasion.

A split points decision lost promising young boxer Brayden Nallajar a match against Mackay boxer Kyle Swanepoel earlier this month.

Brayden, aged 11, had travelled to Home Hill for a Sunstate Amateur Boxing League tournament hosted by Rock Solid Club.

He was the only Palm boxer to fight on the 18 bout card and did well against a more experienced opponent.

Trainer Ray Dennis thought Brayden did enough to win the close bout in the 35kg junior division.

“But that was the judge’s

decision, which we accepted,” Mr Dennis said.

The other Palm boxer to travel to Home Hill in the Burdekin was 15-year-old girl Kathleen Haines for whom an opponent could not be found.

“Her only possible opponent was an 18-year-old who was 10kg heavier and I didn’t want that,” Mr Dennis said.

“Kathleen has now had four bouts for two wins and her losses have been to bigger girls.”

He said he wanted to thank Kevin Castors who drove the small team to Home Hill, and Raymond Sibley from the Palm service station who helped with sponsorship.

A much bigger team of boxers will compete at the North Queensland Games in Townsville in the first week of April.

“We will have at least six boxers and maybe as many as eight,” Mr Dennis said.
