Respect and sorrow for Cairns deaths

MANY men, women and children paid their respects to eight children killed in Cairns before Christmas at a memorial in the Townsville CBD last month.

A public funeral and procession held in Cairns last week was attended by more than 5,000 people.

In Townsville they gathered two nights after the tragic event to place flowers, toys and candles as a mark of respect.

Like Cairns, Townsville has a large population of TSI families.

In addition numerous church services were held and attended by TSI people and others to remember the victims and pray for their families.

There has been a steady flow of Indigenous and non-indigenous people paying their respects in both cities as well as several other centres affected by the tragedy.

Edward Seaton was almost in tears when he stood near the memorial as news reports about



the tragedy appeared on the nearby big screen. "You never think anything like this will happen and now it has and it is all over Facebook. I feel for the families involved," Mr Seaton said.

"I would like to thank everyone for their support with my Happy Valley concert on New Year's Eve and I hope you all enjoyed your night.

"Big thanks to Gemini Geia, Mop and Dr Bone's band, and all the rest who put in their time.

"If you want me to do another concert I will do it again."














Mural project completes JPHS halls and walls



Twenty murals featuring traditional and contemporary art styles are up in the halls of the Joyce Palmer Health Service after a threemonth project completed by local artists, including elders.

Mainland local indigenous artist Denise Weightman said the project's inception grew from consultation with community elders, Queensland Health and Campbell Page Organisation's regional manager, Dale Last.

Ms Weightman said the Palm Island community had embraced the project.

"Each session we found the artists, particularly the elders, would have an audience of local community members who gathered to watch them paint," she said.

"The paintings include local scenes, dreamtime stories and local cuisine.

"The traditional paintings are

even being used as a teaching tool by local elders, who show children in the community scenes and ask questions."

Ms Weightman said Mr Last had developed the idea into reality for participants.

"Dale saw an opportunity to combine 'job ready' training with public cultural arts on Palm Island so he called me for concept development, community liaison and coordination of the mural project," Ms Weightman said.

"The primary aim of the project was training up local artists to assume professional arts employment for future public arts projects on the Island.


"Through community consultation, it was decided to use the icon of a tree with all its metaphoric connotations of strength, protection, unity, diversity, nourishment, fertility and family to be the emblem of the local hospital foyer.

"An historically significant Beech Almond Tree situated at the old boat ramp on the island's foreshore was chosen as the first mural subject."


Joyce Palmer Health Service acting nurse unit manager John Rallings said he and the staff were extremely happy with the outcome.

"Everyone should be extremely proud of their efforts, the results are fantastic," he said.
