New taxi/shuttle up and running

Up to seven people at a time can now travel Palm Island in style with a new taxi shuttle service now up and running around the community.

Torres Strait woman Tessa Bulsey (nee Tamwoy), a member of one of 10 families of TS descent on Palm, started her new business in October.

She has a Tarago vehicle which can take residents and visitors anywhere on the 10km of bitumen roads on the island.

Mrs Bulsey said business was good with everybody telling her it was a service the island needed – previously people, and especially visitors, needed to organise lifts from friends or workers there.

"I have been busy and get to chat to a lot of people," she said.

"I will be getting another vehicle, a nine seater, and will have a volunteer helper in Lindsay Malone."

The PI taxi is not part of the network of taxis on the mainland but has the support of the Palm Island Council, including Mayor Alf Lacey who recently visited TI for the Zenadth Kes Cultural Festival.

"It is great to see a local woman having her own small business," Mayor Lacey said.

Prices are very reasonable with a \$10 fare per person for passengers or a \$15 limit for families.
