



Strong, young and local workers win on community upgrades

Fifteen youths aged between 17 and 22 have started as Junior Construction Workers for the Council and are set to work on projects including the forthcoming Coolgaree Bay foreshore project and more.

"This is a great opportunity for us and we are all looking forward to working on projects which will benefit the community," Fred Bulsey jnr said.

The new employees have been encouraged by Council employees Raoul Miller, Fred Bulsey snr, Bobby Ryan and Clinton Pearson.

They will be working on the \$1.7 million Coolgaree

Bay Community Connectivity Project that will develop the foreshore and construct a footpath from Jetty Road to Manbarra Road.

The jobs were created and funded by the Queensland Government under the 'Works for Queensland Program'.

Deputy Premier and Minister for Infrastructure and Planning Jackie Trad said the work was made possible with a contribution as part of the Advancing Our Cities and Regions strategy (AOCR).

"This work is a partnership between the council and the Queensland Government and is a prime example of the great outcomes that can be achieved in our regional communities with Works for Queensland," Ms Trad said.

"It's great news that 15 young people will be starting their new jobs because of this program," Deputy Premier Jackie Trad said.

"I look forward to working with the Council as we continue to implement the Palm Island Liveability strategy which is improving water security, energy efficiency and resilience to natural disasters."

Mayor Alf Lacey welcomed the Government's support for the liveability projects.

"This partnership between the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council and the State Government has brought opportunities for residents to be involved," Mr Lacey said.

"The project has created safe and comfortable spaces for the whole community to enjoy, as



well as providing local employment and training opportunities for local people."

Palm Island received \$2.6 million through the Works for Queensland Program.

The government is also assisting the Council to refurbish its netball courts and clubhouse with a grant of \$440,000 under the State Government's 'Get Playing Plus' infrastructure program.

Men's Healing Group keen to take on more starters

Men's Healing Group organiser Walter Morgan has invited all Palm Island men to attend a Healing Camp he hopes will be held soon.

The Healing Group is against domestic violence and educates men about diabetes and other issues affecting them.

Mr Morgan said the Group has been operating on Palm for 10 years.

"Some of the elders are leading the way in the push to pro-mote and install culture in our community," he said.

"We have already started with hunting gathering bush food and the bush walking for spear sticks, opening old pads



up and Kup-Murri.

"We still need more people who share a common interest in hunting to promote what we are trying to install, such as eating bush tucker, which is what our people should be eating."

Mr Morgan said he wanted to encourage more men to come and join their Tuesday night meetings at the Palm Diversionary Centre.

Queensland Deputy Premier Jackie Trad was a special guest at the opening of the newly refurbished mall area earlier this month.

The ceremony started at noon when guests were welcomed to country by respected elder Allan Palm Island.

A smoking ceremony organised by Archie Fraser and a blessing from Peena Geia helped to ensure the new-look area was off to a great start.

Students from Bwgcolman State and St Michael's Catholic Schools were there as were hundreds of locals.

Mayor Alf Lacey said the new town square was a big asset for the community.

- "People sit around here and talk to each other," he said.
- "We are happy that Deputy Premier Jackie Trad came here today."

Ms Trad also met the 15 young men, aged between 18 and 21, who gained employment under the Government's \$200 million Working for Queensland program.

The scheme provided \$26 million to the Council for work that includes redevelopment of the Coolgaree Bay Foreshore.

Some of those youths will gain licences in the near future to drive light trucks.

After the ribbon cutting the mall was officially open and then there was a big feast.






















Being 'bold for change' on International Women's Day



Youngster Jase Thimble was the star of a team of five Palm Island PCYC boxers who travelled to Magnetic Island on earlier this month for a Sunstate Amateur Boxing League tournament.

Unfortunately the other four — Raymond Haines, Lamar Sibley, Chris Pearson and Lamar Sibley — lost narrowly, mostly against older and or heavier opponents.

Trainer Ray Dennis said Raymond Haines fought valiantly in the 54kg division.

"Raymond is only 15 and lost both bouts by split points decision," he said.

"One of those bouts was against an 18-year-old and the other against as Australian champion, so he did very well."

Lamar Sibley and Chris Pearson also lost on points in

the 32kg class and Brayden Nallajar was beaten on points by an older boxer in the 45kg division.


"To get bouts they had to be matched

Foley Shield back for 2017

For the first time in four years the iconic Foley Shield will once again be up for grabs in 2017 after a decision made by the QRL Northern Division.

Many talented Palm Island footballers lined up in the Foley Shield competition, which started nearly 70 years ago in 1948 and was named after Arch Foley.


Some of the quality Palm Island footballers have competed in the Foley Shield include Hector Poynter, Jim Baira, John Baira, Raymond Georgetown, Josh Geia, Raymond Blackman, Vern & Frank Daisy and Ron Geia (Snr), to name but a few.

In 2012 season the competition was reduced to just three teams - Townsville, Mackay and Cairns.

It was announced in Townsville on February 20 that clashes between Intrust Super Cup teams – the Cairns based Northern Pride, Townsville Blackhawks and Mackay Cutters and their under 18 and under 20 sides – will count towards the overall winner of the 2017 Foley Shield.

At the launch were legendary Foley Shield players including Palm Islander Vern Daisy and Marshall Colwell, both of whom were amongst the former champion players to line up in many Foley Shield matches.

In the 2018 season the QRL Northern Division hopes to again have teams consisting of representative sides from A grade competitions around North Queensland contesting the Foley Shield.



MEANWHILE Palm Island Voice correspondent Alf Wilson was thrilled to have a chance yarn with Vern "the legend" Daisy who now lives in the community.

Vern was amongst the best rugby league players ever to lace up a boot in North Queensland and his performances for the all conquer-ing Mount Isa team in the Foley Shield comp is often talked about.

The now 69-year-old champion footballer also coached the Barra-cudas when they competed

in the Townsville comp.

He is held in high esteem on the Island and spoke to us about efforts by the late and great Sydney coach Jack Gibson to lure him to the NSW capital to play for Parramatta.

Vern also was chased by the Balmain Tigers and remains a genuine role model on Palm and around North Queensland.

His efforts have been noticed by many Palm Island residents who want to also shed some weight.


He said the secret of high achievement was simple.
