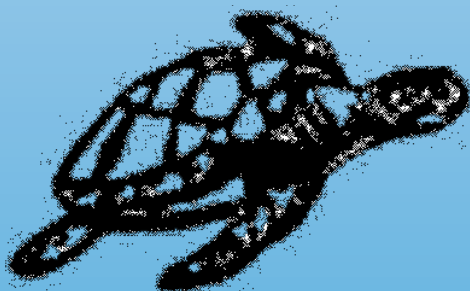

Banking problems set to improve

Many of Palm Island's banking problems may soon be over when the new government building is completed.

After a series of meetings with Bendigo Bank representatives, hopes are high they will soon be signed up as a permanent tenant within the soon-to-be completed government building. Community Sector Banking - a joint venture with Bendigo Bank - Executive Officer Greg Peel (*pictured above*) said they were keen. "Our function and role is to try and build social impact solutions to help build stronger communities," he said.



"So Bendigo Bank has a community bank model which is about building the economy, and the Community Sector Bank supports Bendigo by building society and social impact sort of strategies around that."

Palm Island Cr Raymond Sibley (*below*) said it was a "great opportunity" for Palm Island.

"I think it is a great opportunity for Bendigo Bank to come into the community to set up a banking service here," he said.

"Bendigo bank is going to be a big help to the community, if people want to get loans they can do it here instead of having to go into town."

He said many other issues around cash flow, ATM availability and face-to-face customer service would also be largely resolved.

PM hears Palm Island concerns at national local government meeting

Palm Island Mayor Alfred Lacey attended the inaugural Australian Council of Local Government meeting in Canberra last week.

More than 500 local councils, including many of Queensland's Aboriginal Councils, had the opportunity to network together with some, as you can see from the picture, taking the opportunity to speak



to the Prime Minister directly. At the meeting the PM announced a \$300 million Regional and Local Community Infrastructure Program, a share of which will end up being spent on Palm Island. Minister for Local Government, Anthony Albanese, said smaller local projects accelerated and encouraged economic development while

improving the quality of life in local communities.

"This is a significant opportunity for local councils to rise to the challenge and address local infrastructure needs," he said.

PIAC CEO Barry Moyle said Palm Island, along with other Indigenous and smaller rural councils, had been promised \$100,000 each in untied grant

money from the new fund.

"The Council will be discussing this in the near future to identify possible projects for the Island," he said.

"It was important for the Mayor to attend the

ACLG meeting to represent not only the Palm Island, but Indigenous people generally and in particular to be able to take up the opportunity to meet with the Prime Minister."

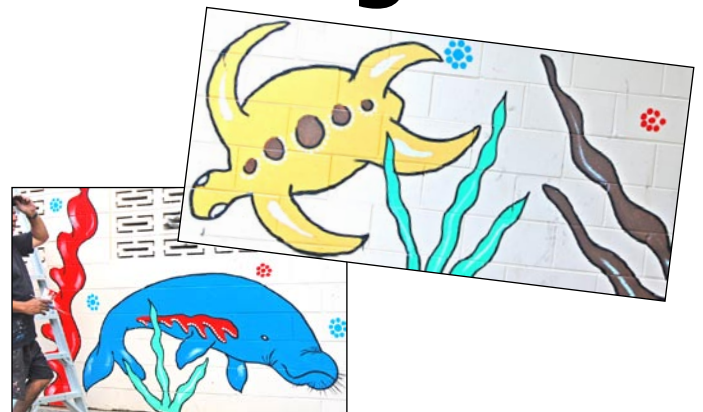

New murals by visiting artist

St Michaels and Bwgcolman Community School was lucky last week to have a visiting artist do some of the new murals that you can now see.

Arthur was born in Cherbourg, south-east Queensland, and is a descendant of the Wakka Wakka tribe.

One of 14 children, Arthur trained as a teacher and for several years taught Aboriginal art to children from pre-school age to high school level.



As a child, Arthur acquired an interest in art and his many skills through stories and traditions passed to him from his uncles.

All of his designs depict the motifs and symbols of hunting. His inspiration comes from the native fauna of the Kabi-Kabi region in Queensland.

He has also expressed a interest in doing some of the murals on our new buildings that are going up.

October sun in Cuba for PI Ambo

Ian Day from the Palm Island Ambulance Service recently went away on holidays to the Caribbean. These are just some of the many stories he has to tell us about how different things are in the three countries he visited.

I decided to go to three countries - Puerto Rico, the Dominican Republic & Cuba - with most of my time in Cuba.

I suppose the main thing I want to say here about my holiday is sometimes we do not realize how lucky we really are living here in Australia and even here in Palm Island.

While I was away on Palm Island I made a concerted effort to look at ambulance services and general health services in these three countries. Puerto Rico being a American Territory they were pretty good a fairly functional Ambulance



service, hospitals and that sort of thing if people wanted to ring for a ambulance they rang 911 the ambulance would be there pretty quickly and be transported to hospital pretty similar to here on Palm and Australia. When I went to the Dominican Republic these countries is almost third world.

Because they do not have the same facilities that we have here in Australia in the Dominican if you called for a ambulance in the city you were very luck to get one any accident or health conditions you had to find your own way to the clinic and then if the doctor said you were sick enough he would then call for a ambulance that would transport you from the clinic to the hospital.

There were no ambulances out in the rural areas not many clinics if you were injured or sick in the country you had to find your own way to a hospital that could sometimes mean a trip of up to three four hours to get to medical aid.

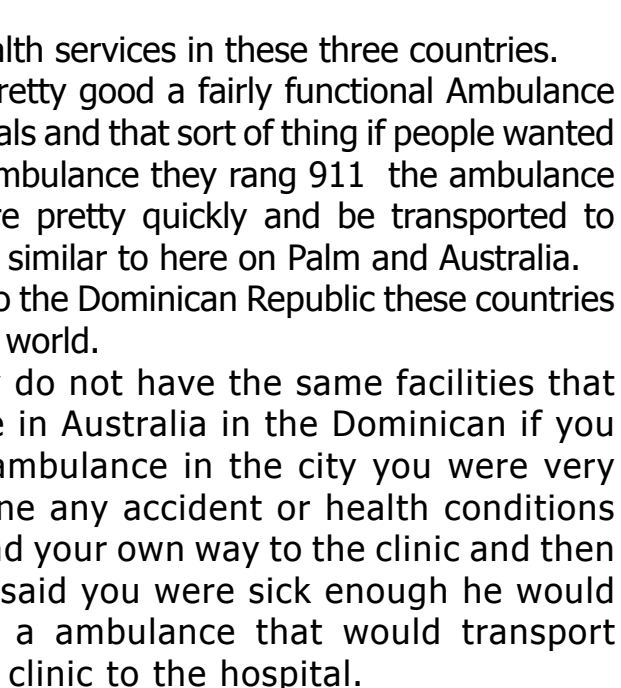
In Cuba things were worse its like stepping back in time in Havana the capital of Cuba its like being back in the 50's and 60's with old American cars and Russian cars and some horse and carts.

In southern Cuba there was hardly any cars it was all horse and cart the average wage of someone living in southern Cuba was about \$7 a month - they rely on the government to supply them with rations.

And the Hernandez family that I was staying with in Cuba they relied on the government to give them rations they would get a bag of rice, a bag of coffee beans, salt, oil, and fat the provisions that they got for the month had to last for the month.

Mrs. Hernandez who I was staying with had been in a car once in her whole life.

I was fortunate enough to be able to hire a car I was able to take her in the car to the markets that was the second time in 47 years that she had been in a car.

The Indigenous Adult Health Check – Keeping You Healthy

Being Healthy isn't only about feeling well or not being sick.

If you are healthy it means that you can have a good time and do the things that really matter to you and your family. So getting an adult health check is important. You don't want to wait until you are really sick before you see a health worker or doctor. Getting a check early will also stop you from getting sick later on. It will help you live longer.

Sometimes the things we do or don't do make a real difference to our health. Throwing away the smokes, getting healthy feeds, cutting down the grog, getting a bit of exercise and watching the weight can stop us getting sick, keep us healthy and even help us get better quicker. It's worth it to make a few changes.

Community health conducts health checks on Tuesdays, Wednesdays and Thursdays. Everyone between the ages of 15 and 54 are welcome.

Six Palm Island boxers travelled to Townsville to take part in a boxing tournament held at the Kirwan tavern on Friday the 7th of November.

Only two boxers could be matched but those two put up the best two fights of the night. Big Nat Seaton has just turned 18 years old and is still a teenager. Nat took on Super Heavy Tank Turner who is a senior boxer in his late 20's and has had much more experience. Big Nat lost to a close decision over four two-minute rounds after Nat gave back to his opponent just as much as he received and the bout was a real crowd pleaser. Ten-year-old Steen Walsh completely outfought his first opponent, Brendan Davis from the Townsville Hawks Boxing Club. Young Steen then took on Jake Bowen from Moranbah in his second bout which was described as the best of the night. Jake Bowen ran straight across the ring and attacked Steen from the first bell and continued to take it up to Steen for the whole fight. Steen gave it back to Jake Bowen with a little more than he received and fought like a boxer who has much more experience. Steen won the bout by a split decision. Brendan Davis was a year older than Steen and 1kg heavier. Jake Bowen was also a year older than Steen and 3kgs heavier and had already had two other bouts before he fought Steen.

I believe our boxers will all perform well at the Australian Titles, to be held at the showground's in Townsville on Thursday 27th, Friday 28th, and Saturday 29th of November. Peter Bonner will be having his first professional bout on 29th November.

Boxing is a sport that builds up confidence and self esteem. Boxers learn to be good sportsmen and make many good friends with other boxers. Young Steen Walsh and Jake Bowen became friends before

The Palm Island Boxers and myself are so very grateful to the Cathy Freeman Foundation and Chloe Hooper for making it possible for our boxers to take part in the QLD State Titles in Cairns. We are also grateful to JobFind who has bought new singlets for us.
