

As grand as the Strand?



Demolition works are complete and further works have begun on the redevelopment of the Coolgaree Bay Foreshore between the jetty and the helipad.

The project aims to provide the community with a great place to be and to socialise, foster community pride and support tourism development.

The design includes upgrades to the footpaths, lighting, landscaping and seating, and incorporates design elements such as a yarning circle and a ceremonial art installation currently under development by artist Billy Doolan.

The design centrepiece will be a carpet snake shaped footpath incorporating an art installation at the base of its tail and a permanent stage as its head in Fred Clay Park.

Community consultation on the original designs resulted in the removal of a permanent Kup Murri pit from the area.

Council staff will be engaged in several elements of the project while two local youth will be working with the landscaping team contracted to undertake the works.

The project is jointly funded by the Queensland and Australian governments under the Works for Queensland and Tourism Demand Driver Infrastructure funding programs.

The foreshore redevelopment will be like our 'Strand'.

In fact, we think it will be better than The Strand!

Aja Boyz will be back to defend our title next year.





An art installation is to be built along the foreshore. These works will represent all the different tribes (clans) that were sent to Palm Island ('Punishment Island', as it was once called). This installation will represent every tribe that was known to be sent here. The work will be a memorial to these people, so they are acknowledged for who they were and where they were sent from. This memorial, I



believe, is a giant step towards reconciliation and an understanding of why this settlement exists with the now Bwgcolman people.

Totems of each of the tribes will be added as a symbol of these people and to show non-indigenous peoples why totems are important to these tribes.

"Patrick has been training the house down over here at the PCYC Gym," trainer Ray Dennis said.


"He's fronted up for six straight sessions and is very serious about turning pro."

Three ladies sides competed in the carnival, which was played in wet and muggy conditions.

A week earlier Manatu was a star for the Palm side Aja's Girlz who beat Bowen in a hotly contested ladies exhibition game at the Townsville Bindal Sharks carnival.
