Prevention and response work acknowledged

at IFV Forum

The Queensland Indigenous Family Violence Prevention Forum was an event dedicated to celebrating the work done by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people in preventing and responding to family violence.

It was an opportunity for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander workers to come together and learn from, share with and inspire each other.

The QIFVP highlights strategies and programs that could be used effectively by others, with discussions that relate to working with men, women and children who are either victims, or perpetrators, of domestic and family violence

The theme of this year's forum was 'Language of Change'.

Keynote speakers were Karla McGrady, who spoke on a new



national resource to support prevention, and Charlie King, who talked about what works.

Supporting organisations and presenters included SNAICC, Queensland Health, Junkuri Laka (Mornington Island), Act for Kids, Murrigunyah Aboriginal & Torres Strait Islander Corporation (Woodridge, SEQ), Healing Waters (Townsville) and Mission Australia.

Asbestos defeats efforts to

save Church

Palm Island's historical St George's Anglican Church is being demolished due to disrepair and presence of asbestos.

Built in 1935, the church building has needed repairs for some time.

Anglican Diocese Bishop Bill Ray said for some time he had hoped it could be saved.

But in December last year he told the Palm Island

Voice (Issue 243 - pictured below right) he was sorry to say the church had to be demolished because the building was unsafe.

"This situation has developed because of the lack of maintenance over the years," he said.

"It was important that the Diocese addressed the asbestos that was damaged.

"All the materials from the site are being removed from the Island."

He said he was thankful for cooperation from the Catholic Church.

"We are thankful that the Catholic Sisters are storing the plaques and other items used in worship," he said.

"As Bishop I was delighted the Roman Catholic Church had offered their Church for our worship.



Local church beyond repair

With "deep regret" the Anglican Church has announced the demolition of St George's Church on Palm Island.

North Queensland Bishop Bill Ray said the Anglican Diocese had made every effort to keep the Church open by undertaking some work to provide a space for worship.

"Sadly, that did not prove to be a workable solution," he said.

"With the Church in such disrepair, there were a number of concerns about safety within on Palm and the Roman the community.

Catholic Diocese's Bisho

"The Diocese thanks the Mayor and the CEO for their support and help in making the building secure until the demolition begins."

He was quick to add all was not lost.

"I am very pleased that the Sisters at the Parish Centre on Palm and the Roman
Catholic Diocese's Bishop Tim
has allowed us to use their
Church for Anglican worship,"
he said.

"This is a very generous offer.

"Once the demolition work has been undertaken the

has been undertaken the Diocese will explore ways forward, both in terms of sacred space and ministry."

"Many Anglicans, while appreciating other felt they could not accept.

"When the demolition has been completed, discussions will commence in how we can move forward, not only in terms a Church building, but as the People of God moving into ministry." Results of the Council's most recent population survey showed 22% of Palm Island's 3000 residents identified as Anglican and another 24% as "other Protestant".

48% identified as Catholic,

5% listed no religion and 1% as
Baptist. There is also a small
number of Muslims on the Island.
