

An uncertain number of Palm Island boxers will travel to Townsville to compete at this Saturday's Sunstate Amateur Boxing League tournament.

It is being hosted by Fozzy Hooper of Dreams Club.

Veteran trainer Ray Dennis said he was not sure how many boxers would make the trip.

"It is NAIDOC celebrations here so I will just have to wait and see," he said last weekend.

Two youngsters who have impressed Mr Dennis are Jase Thimble and Musa Prior.

However both are having trouble getting suitable opponents in their age and weight divisions.

Twelve-year-old Jase is the son of Jason Thimble and could not be matched at the recent Palm tournament.

He has an impressive record and has had to take part in exhibition bouts at some tournaments.

Musa won gold at the Palm tournament but could not be matched at the subsequent Gold Gloves in Townsville winning a gold medal by walkover.

"They are both promising young boxers," Mr Dennis said.

He said a big improver had been Tiquri Prior, who is aged 16.

"His last opponent was two years older," he said.



Patrick Clarke is considered a big chance of going to Townsville on Saturday and if so could be competing in the main bout.

"I won't know how many will be going until the ferry leaves Palm," Mr Dennis said.

Last weekend Rolland Geesu won selection into the 2018 Queensland Reds U16s in rugby union.

His next game will be when his new team plays a curtain raiser to the St George Queensland Reds v Sunwolves Super Rugby clash at Suncorp Stadium.

Roland played at the 2018 Queensland Rugby Union Boys Junior State Championships which run over three days.

Over 900 players from around the state took part in the event across U13s, U14s and U16s, as well as an U12s development carnival.

Regional sides included Townsville Brolgas, Central Queensland Bushrangers, Sunshine Coast Stingrays, Darling Downs, Gold Coast and the Northern Territory competing against teams from Brisbane across the age divisions.

Queensland Ruby Union head of participation Rama Chand said the standard had been high.

"This tournament provides participants with the chance to represent their region and test themselves against some of the best young talent in



Queensland," he said.

"It was great to see three finals all so closely contested, and for the spoils to be shared across both Brisbane and regional sides.

"We also had big crowds cheering on each team which was great to see.

"The State Championships are a proven pathway within Queensland Rugby, with current St.George Queensland Reds including Tate McDermott (Sunshine Coast), Hamish Stewart (Darling Downs), Harry Hoopert (Darling Downs), Andrew Ready (Brisbane) and Duncan Paia'aua (Central Queensland) all having emerged from the tournament."
