PIAC secures funds to kickstart market days

Palm Islanders will soon be running their own shaded market stalls, initially in the mall, thanks to PIAC securing nearly \$50,000 in funds to kickstart the initiative.

Local Government Minister Warren Pitt announced the funding yesterday through the State Government's Blueprint for the Bush initiative.

PIAC CEO Barry Moyle said the money represented an exciting opportunity, not only for potential stall holders but for the island as a whole.

"This is an exciting opportunity for locals to get involved in our very own markets and maybe to commence their own retail business," he said.

"And it was also about trying to market our local artists and craftspeople as well.

"There's the possibility down the track of attracting daytrippers from Townsville to come and experience a positive Palm Island and to purchase our wares.

"We've had discussions with Sunferries about that and they are keen to get on board as well, so what might happen is that a ferry will come in on Sunday morning to and from Townsville especailly for the markets."

Mr Pitt said the new markets would be a valuable community asset and would help residents of Palm Island to develop commercial activities and build financial independence.

"The aim of this project is to provide Palm Islanders the opportunity to strengthen and enhance the community through the establishment of their very first regular market," he said.

"It is a chance to showcase locally made arts and crafts along with fresh vegetables grown on the island.

"The project will involve up to 50 Islanders and will include training for Coolgaree Community Development Employment Project workers in the construction of traditional shelters and the purchase of 10 shade shelters."

Mr Moyle said PIAC has also put in a request with Sunferries for an additional return service on Monday mornings.

Mr Pitt said the Blueprint for the Bush's Our Place Our Future initiative provided rural and remote communities with resources to strengthen their capacity to shape their future.

Dredging was scheduled to commence on Tuesday 27 January and will continue until end of March 2009.

On site dredging for the first two weeks will be every alternative day after which it will be increased to six days a week. Temporary dredge boundary markers (80mm pipes) have been installed with a 2m offset along the channel boundaries. These markers are painted

yellow for easy observation.

A crane barge with a clam shell bucket and a dumb barge (transport barge) will be used for the dredge program and a traffic plan for the program has been developed.

In short, dredging equipment will move out of the way to allow all services to the barge ramp and jetty to continue as normal.

The New Year brings us the opportunity for a fresh start and new a season for the Jets girls to dominate.

The holiday period has seen an increase in people enjoying their boats.

I would just like people to remember to take their safety equipment, plenty of water and food.

If you are not sure what you need there is a free boating guide available at the Police Station.

Most important of all please tell someone where you are going and what time you expect to return.

An incident happened en early December where a group set out on a Monday afternoon and experienced difficulties on their return to Palm.

Family did not notify police that they were missing until the evening of the next day. The group was rescued at about 2am the following morning quite a distance from where they ran out of fuel.

Fortunately everyone was in good health and all was well but it could have so easily not been the case.

Families also if your loved ones are missing on their boat please let the police know as soon as possible so we can start looking for them. The Christmas season has also seen an increase in children riding motorcycles.

Parents please be aware that you are responsible for your children whilst they are riding the bikes.

If your child is seen riding the motorcycle on the road you can be issued fines in excess of \$500.

Police don't have to be the only witness for people to be charged. Police are willing to take action where witnesses come forward and provide statements to police.

I am sure you have all heard that police on the Island are soon to be issued with Tasers.

I can appreciate that this is an issue of concern for some members of the community.

Police from the Cultural Advisory Unit in Brisbane and TASER experts will be holding a Community Meeting at the PCYC on Friday 13th February at 11am.
