
Palm Island Ambulance Service's stinger program has won "Highly Commended" in this year's national 2009 Australian Safer Communities Awards.

## They're out there again...

The Stinger Season has arrived with one person from Palm Island already confirmed as stung by one of the marine creatures.

It's a timely reminder that prevention is better than cure, says paramedic Ian Day.

The young person concerned had her stinger suit purchased for her the week before, but wasn't wearing it at the time of the attack.

After a painful night in hospital she told the Palm Island Voice she wouldn't be going into the water again without it. QAS Palm Island has just taken delivery of this year's supply of stinger suits and for the first time now cater for all ages and all sizes from size 2 child to size 28 adult.

Mr Day said some sizes were limited and sales would be on a "first in, first served' basis. He also said they could not take book-ups, only cash.



## Stingers are nere

SWIMMERS off Palm Island beaches have been warned about the presence of marine stingers.

Officer in Charge of Palm Island Ambulance Service Ian Day says there has already been three cases of marine envenomation.

"Also a further case of an allergic reaction to a marine creature with both cases in the past week," he said.

Many youngsters swim in waters off Palm Island including in the sea near the jetty and in front of the Shire Council offices. Earlier this month the Townsville Bulletin newspaper reported stingers almost the size of soccer balls had hit Townsville shores.

Swimmers across the region have been warned that stingers of this size usually start appearing after Christmas and in early January.

Box jellyfish have also been netted at Rollingstone's Balgal Beach, and at beaches north of Ingham.

So the possibility they will start being found in bigger numbers off Palm Island is a concern.

### Sting(ers) in the tail of extended wet season make sure your tail isn't stung!

Swimmers should be aware that heavy rainfall has flushed marine stingers out of creeks and rivers, which has increased the presence of box jellyfish, even though there has been no recent reports of anybody being stung.

Palm Island ambo Ian Day said the official marine stingers including: stinger season doesn't usually finish until April but may extend into May this year due warning signs. to the big wet season.


