Study finds DSP access criteria 'extreme'

Researchers looking into barriers people with disabilities face when attempting to access the support pension (DSP) were on Palm Island last week to give feedback to the community about their findings.

Western Sydney University's Dr Karen Soldatic and Dr Michelle Fitts said the barriers they had found included the financial costs of accessing specialist medical care and the difficulty of keeping scheduled appointments due to the inadequacy of transport facilities for people with a disability.

"Changes in eligibility criteria are impacting the health and wellbeing of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people living with disability" Dr Karen said.

The two interviewed several service providers, all of whom said they found new criteria "extreme".

"Clients who have conditions which are presumed to be treatable, such as cancer and mental illness, face significant challenges in accessing the DSP" Dr Michelle said.

The study found during the time between collating evidence for their claim, awaiting their application outcome and/or submitting an application to appeal the outcome, people faced even harder challenges, as they were often

forced to rely on Newstart Allowance.

They said the research highlighted the need for the Australian government to engage with local service providers and incorporate their feedback into DSP reforms so it could meet the needs of people living with a disability.

"We would like to acknowledge and thank the ongoing support we have received from community members, service providers and persons living with disability, their networks and families, who participated in focus groups and interviews in Palm Island" Dr Karen said.

The research was undertaken in Townsville, Palm Island, Broome, Geelong, near Melbourne, and Illawarra, south of Sydney.

Dr Mabo's memorable legacy

Tributes flowed for Dr Ernestine "Bonita" Mabo AO at her State Funeral held at Townsville Stadium last week.

Premier Annastacia
Palaszczuk and Deputy
Premier, Treasurer and Minister
for Aboriginal and Torres
Strait Islander Partnerships
Jackie Trad joined Dr Mabo's
family and friends, dignitaries
from around the country and
the wider community in paying
tribute to a life dedicated
to fostering inclusion and
effecting change.

The Premier said Dr Bonita
Mabo and was one of the most
prominent Indigenous and South
Sea Islander activists of her
time.

"She empowered her people to

speak from the heart and stand up for what they believed in," Ms Palaszczuk said.

Dr Mabo was a proud Aboriginal woman with South Sea Islander ancestry and family ties to Vanuatu.

Vanuatu's Minister of Foreign Affairs said he, his government and the people of Vanuatu shared their sympathies with the family.

"And with the people of Australia, and in particular the Aboriginal and South Sea Islander communities, for the loss of this remarkable woman," he said.

"Her work and that of her late husband Eddie was closely followed by the people of Vanuatu, who saw this work as reflecting Vanuatu's own struggle for independence, land rights and sovereignty.

"We will miss her but are comforted that her legacy will live on and will be reflected in achievements that are still to come."

Reconciliation Australia board member Kenny Bedford said Dr Mabo — his aka (grandmother) — was a gentle and caring soul who always put others before herself.

"She was proud of her South Sea heritage and was a quiet achiever who naturally played a significant role in what eventually became the Mabo decision," he said.

"She was adored by all who knew her.

"Because of her, we can."







Skipjacks will travel to Cherbourg for two games against the home side.

"We had to change the dates to 12th of January and we're hoping to play two games on the day and they will be for a couple of memorial shields," Skipjacks spokesman Alex Morgan said.

The Skipjacks Club is one of the oldest clubs on Palm Island, formed more than 80 years ago.

Many Skipjacks have family connections to Cherbourg and players have been training hard in preparation for the clash.

"We will be taking a lot of young fellows down there," Skipjacks coach Fred Bulsey said.

He said they would include Clarence Nugent, Robbie Snyder, Fred's sons Isaac and Fred jnr and others.

Isaac Bulsey has already started pre-season training in Townsville with the Blackhawks under-20 team, who will contest the Statewide Intrust Super Cup comp later in the new year.

For the past 11 years Skipjacks have played an annual match against the Australian Army Thunder for the prestigious Bill Coolburra Memorial Shield.

The lads will be looking to start the year on a winning note but will face a tough task against Cherbourg, who will enjoy huge home support.

Moves are underway to form a new domestic rugby league competition in 2019 despite many players lining up for clubs in the Townsville and District comp.

Fred snr also said he was looking to organise a Palm team to compete at next year's Dan Ropeyarn carnival in Bamaga.
