CDP to be in community hands

Palm Island's long-held aspirations to return our Community Development Program (CDP) to community-control will finally happen at the end of this financial year Mayor Alf Lacey says.

"CDP is coming back to the community, it is now up to the community to step up and take it on," Cr Lacey said.

"From 1 July 2019, the Palm Island Economic Development Corporation (PIEDC), a wholly owned subsidiary of Council, will provide a community—owned and controlled CDP service which focuses on local

economic development as a vehicle for job creation.

"PIEDC will deliver the CDP with an experienced Aboriginal CDP provider, Rainbow Gateway Ltd (RGL) as its partner, which will ensure job seekers participate in activities and gain experience that build work-readiness and contribute to the broader community.

"It will also be about fostering Indigenous businesses and assisting Bwgcolman and Traditional Owner communities to generate economic and social benefits for all of us.

"In short: this is an opportunity we, as a community, have been waiting for."

PIASC CEO Ross Norman said Rainbow Gateway Ltd (RGL) was part of the Myuma Group of charitable social enterprises which are 100% owned and directed by the Indjalandji-Dhidhanu Traditional Owners of Camooweal in North West Queensland.

"RGL has successfully delivered CDP services in the West Isa/Alpurrurulam Region since July 2013 and in the Cloncurry Region since April 2017," he said.

"RGL shares Council's vision of a CDP service that is locally-owned and -driven, highly responsive to community needs and aspirations, and focused on increasing community self-sufficiency through economic independence.

"Although RGL is not a local organisation, its owners and directors have strong personal, familial and historical connections to the Palm Island Bwgcolman community and Manbarra Traditional Owners.

Strong connections

"The Myuma Group has also previously worked with Council, Coolgaree and the community in the context of Myuma's Camooweal-based, Indigenous prevocational training programs, which have already assisted dozens of Palm Island jobseekers to

transition into resource and construction industry careers.

Excellent partnership

"These factors combine to make RGL an excellent supporting consortium partner to PIEDC."

Mr Norman said Council established PIEDC in 2014 as a private subsidiary company whose objectives were to own and operate assets both on and off Palm Island, foster economic development, encourage business activity, and create long-term jobs for Palm Islanders.

Community accountability

"PIEDC's profits will be transferred to a community-controlled charitable development trust," he said. "PIEDC's Board comprises the Mayor, two Councillors, and three independent members. "Council has resolved that PIEDC — being accountable to community but separate from Council itself — is the

most suitable community-

owned vehicle for aligning CDP delivery with the community's objectives."

Long term vision

Cr Lacey said Council's vision had always been that CDP should be locally-owned and community-driven.

"Community engagement in the program will be central to PIEDC/RGL's approach," he said.

He said over the next few months community consultation and engagement would occur and everyone was encouraged to be a part of those meetings.

He also said he wanted to thank outgoing organisation Campbell Page and their staff.

"Campbell Page have delivered the CDP service here for a number of years now," Cr Lacey said.

"Their services have been an important part of the community and the activities delivered have contributed to the community and the participants in many ways."

The first sod of soil has been turned on a new building which will be the first stage of a three part retail precinct Palm Island Mayor Alf Lacey says.

"This stage will include retail shops on the ground floor and office space above," he said. "The first stage will be built between the current town mall and the primary health care district which will provide a link between the two."

Cr Lacey said the building would be built by A Gabrielli Construction and was expected to be completed by the end of 2019.

"So fit out will occur in early 2020," he said.

"If community members are interested in opening a shop or leasing office space they should respond to the expressions of interest currently available from Council reception."

Deputy Mayor Roy Prior said stages two and three were still looking for investors.

"The second stage is proposed to include a supermarket on the ground floor and council offices above, while the third stage is proposed to include further retail and offices and a tourist information office/gallery space," he said.

"The final two stages of the building require further investment of around \$30m."

Cr Prior also said the colours depicted on the artist's impression of the first stage building were not final.

"The proposal for the design theme for the building is ocean-themed during the day, and night sky themed at night," he said.

"There are several areas on the building where artwork can be incorporated and local artists will be engaged to develop the arts works to be integrated."

Cr Lacey said several children from each of the schools were chosen to be a part of the sod turning.

"This retail precinct is a part of their future," he said. "This is a place where they might work or socialise as well as purchase goods and services not available on the Island right now."

CFF says Boleen will be missed!

2019 marks the fifth birthday of the Cathy Freeman Foundation's (CFF's) HIPPY (Home Interaction Program for Parents and Youngsters) Program on Palm Island.

CFF started running the early childhood program in 2014 with 11 families — since then more than 100 families have completed or are currently enrolled in the two-year program.

HIPPY is a home-based parenting and early childhood enrichment program which works with the parents or carers of four- and five-year-old children.

It is an Australia-wide program run nationally by the Brotherhood of St Laurence, and funded by the Australian Government's Department of Social Services, which aims to improve school readiness.

A large part of the program's success on Palm Island has been due to the significant contribution



of the Program Coordinator Boleen Gorringe over the past four years.

Last year 16 families celebrated completing the twoyear program, making an overall total of 62 Palm Island families who have graduated.

Boleen has played a critical role in the success of the program and CFF is sorry to see her leave this year.

Ranger project offers new skills



Palm Islanders have shown strong interest in taking an active role in a Community Ranger project which could provide new opportunities for employment, self-direction and entrepreneurialism.

More than 50 people turned out to the opening of a workshop hosted by the Reef & Rainforest Research Centre (RRRC) at the PCYC this week, where organisers showed some of the skills training Palm Island Community Rangers could learn including SCUBA use, welding and nautical rope skills.

Attendees were enthusiastic about the program's possible benefits and community-driven approach.

Local resident Moa Sam said he was particularly interested in Crown of Thorns starfish control.

"We love our reef, we rely on it, it would be our number-one priority to make sure that we could still keep our reef in good nick," Mr Sam said.

"We have seen them [Crown of Thorns Starfish] on the reef

here, we want to do something about them.

"From what we saw here today about this program, how it is set up, my only

real question is 'where do we sign up?"

RRRC managing director Sheriden Morris said under the pilot community elders would select between 20 and 30 candidates to undergo training as rangers and then direct the activities of ranger graduates, at least a third of which would be women.

"This is fundamentally a community-controlled program, it will be up to the people of Palm Island to decide how it proceeds," she said.

"We have demonstrated there's



multiple skills to learn in the program and those skills can be put to use in a lot of different activities that will generate economic opportunity, such as a Crown of Thorns Starfish control program and farming giant clams.

"What it's really about is the Palm Island community coming together to really drive the agenda themselves.

"We're very encouraged by how enthusiastic the response has been — clearly there is a strong desire on Palm Island for the opportunity to protect the environment and build up the community."


