

# Palm votes will count in federal election outcome

Votes from Palm Island polling booths in the electorate of Herbert will play an important part in deciding which candidate wins one of Australia's most marginal seats, which could be crucial in deciding the overall result of the May 8 Federal election.

After the 2016 election the LNP Government held 73 seats, Labor 69 and there were eight cross-bench MPs in the 150-seat Parliament.

The LNP had the support of some crossbenchers to form a Government.

Heavyweights from all sides of politics have been visiting Townsville especially in the lead up to polling day, including PM Scott Morrison, Opposition Leader Bill Shorten and Katter Australia Party leader Bob Katter.

Labor's sitting member for Herbert Cathy O'Toole won the 2016 election by just 37 votes over previous LNP member Ewen Jones.

But without the overwhelming

support of voters from Palm Island, Mrs O'Toole may not have taken the seat.

Palm Islanders had 430 formal votes of which Mrs O'Toole claimed 310 (72%) and Mr Jones just 32 (7.44%).

After preferences were distributed Mrs O'Toole had 86.74% compared to Mr Jones' 13.26%.

2019 candidates were finalised earlier this week but were expected to include Mrs
O'Toole, Phillip Thompson
(LNP), Nanette Radeck (KAP)
and Sam Blackadder (Greens).

Palmer Australia Party and One Nation were also expected to nominate candidates before Tuesday's deadline.

Mrs O'Toole has visited

Palm Island many times in the past year and was amongst more than 250 dancers who attempted to enter the Guinness Book of Records for the world's biggest corroboree.

Mr Thompson is a former serviceman who fought in Afghanistan and has been very active on the hustings in Townsville where the majority of Herbert voters live.

Ms Radeck has the backing of party boss Bob Katter who is well liked on Palm Island where he has visited many times.

The Townsville Bulletin newspaper ran a story on page one in its April 12 edition with the headline 'Herbert tipped to decide May 18 election result'.

Palm boxer Raymond Haines (pictured right) won his bout in the 57kg division by points decision over Drayden Marou.


It was sweet revenge for Raymond who lost to Drayden at the recent State Titles.
