Underwater Museum set to look for commercial operators

Stakeholders on deck for underwater idea

Palm Island Council has been working with lead organisations and government in Townsville to develop a Museum of Underwater Art it is hoped will help to grow a sustainable tourism industry on Palm Island and provide jobs for young people.

a sustainable tourism indus
Underwater art museums
are artistic installations,
usually involving sculptured
works placed on the seafloor
or riverbeds to provide a
visual, emotional and physical
experience for visitors.
Among the most famous and
effective examples of this art
form are works by Jason deCaires
Taylor, who has installed major
works in several northern
hemisphere locations, including
the Bahamas and Grenada
(Caribbean), Cancun (Mexico) and
London (Thames River).
"We call it a museum for a
very important reason," Jason

of preservation, conservation
and education. They're places
where we keep objects of
great value to us, where we
value them simply for being
themselves."

Work on the Museum of Underwater Art installations for the Strand, the John Brewer Reef and Palm Island was undertaken last week with world-renowned sculptor Jason deCaires Taylor in Townsville.

"Mr deCaires Taylor's work attracts global interest with tourists and divers eager to interact with his artwork," Tourism Industry Development Minister Kate Jones said.

Mr deCaires Taylor said it marked the start of a series of consultation workshops with local artists, Indigenous representatives, suppliers and manufacturers.

Installations for the third project at Palm Island are planned for mid to late 2020.

New financial reporting system will ensure greater transparency

A new system of financial reporting is being put in place at the Palm Island Aboriginal Shire Council, ensuring greater transparency for the community.

The move follows the appointments of a governance advisor and a financial controller six weeks ago, which was done with the full support of the Council.

A spokesperson from the Department of Local Government, Racing and Multicultural Affairs said they were pleased with the progress being made.

"Some further time is required before a final report and recommendations are available but the early strides the council is making, working closely with governance advisor Gary Kleidon and financial controller Neil Michel, have been positive and very well supported through the efforts of the council staff and the councillors," the spokesperson said.

"During the first six weeks of the appointments, a tremendous amount of work has been undertaken to determine the status of the council's governance framework and financial position. "Mr Michel is also working with councillors toward implementing a new, much more detailed reporting regime, allowing the councillors, and staff to fully understand the council's financial performance.

"The council's staff are its most important asset and Mr Kleidon and Mr Michel are working with the council to ensure that the current structure and staffing levels are appropriate to meet its operational needs."

Youth Parliament opportunity enjoyed by 10 young hopefuls



Ten Bwgcolman Community School Year 5/6 students went to Townsville to participate in the Indigenous Youth Parliament late last month.

Supervisor Letitia Murgha said the event was structured like an actual Queensland Parliament sitting.

"Nine of our students were assigned as a member of an electorate and had to a deliver a speech," she said.

"Janiques Shannon was chosen as the Sergeant At Arms and was given the duty of carrying the mace and to announce the Speaker of the House who was the actual Speaker of the Queensland Government, the Honourable Mr Curtis Pitt."

She said she also had the duty of keeping time for all the speeches. "Janiques did a fantastic job in as the Sergeant At Arms," Ms Murgha said.

"The other students also did a fantastic job delivering their speeches with confidence and poise on their own, at the lectern, in front of 120 students from around the Region as well as Local Members of Parliament, teachers, parents and community members.

"Some were assigned to speak about a prominent Indigenous person such Cathy Freeman, Ashley Barty, Matty Bowen, Johnathon Thurston or Koiki Mabo, and some were assigned to speak about an issue such as the Great Barrier Reef, water issues on Palm Island, the environment, or NAIDOC.

"This was a great opportunity for these students to interact with other students and to demonstrate that they do have the confidence to participate at such an event."

Water works ready to start

A spokesperson from the Department of Local Government, Racing and Multicultural Affairs says Palm Island's cleaning the Island's water storage reservoir is set to begin this month.

"The Department is continuing to work with the council to ensure priority projects are still being delivered, including six infrastructure projects to be delivered in the coming months," the spokesperson said.

The infrastructure projects are:

- Installation of a Supervisory Control and Data Acquisition (SCADA) system to the Water Treatment Plant;
- Internal clean, roof replacement and vermin proof the 4.5ML main drinking water storage reservoir;
- Decommission two
 undersized water treatment
 plant reservoirs and replace
 with a large 3ML treated
 water tank to increase
 capacity of treated water
 storage;
- Install additional backwash and sludge tanks and pump;
- New raw water line from Solomon Dam to Water Treatment Plant; and,
- New rising main from Water Treatment Plant to main reservoir.

PICC is an Aboriginal Organisation committed to community control principles and protocols of self-determination through the provision of whole-of life services for people of the Island that reach across generations.

The Registered Nurse (RN) works alongside a team of Health clinicians at the PICC Children and Family Centre. The RN is responsible for the delivery, management and coordination of quality patient care and service delivery. The RN is also responsible for the total care of the patients, which includes triage, priority categorisation, early detection of health issues, clinical interventions, liaison with other members of the health care team, coordination of patient treatments and preventive care services.
