Push for resolution on water issues

Queensland's Local Government Minister Stirling Hinchliffe has called on his federal counterpart to fulfil the LNP's pre-election commitment to help Palm Island residents gain access to clean drinking water.

Mr Hinchliffe said the State Government had provided more than \$6 million to tackle five of six priority water projects on the Island and it was now time for the Federal Government to sign off on promises made in the lead up to the Federal election.

Member for Townsville Scott

Stewart also said the projects needed Federal support.

"...We need the Federal
Government to provide the \$2
million it promised so we can
complete the sixth project, which
is installing a new rising main from
the water treatment plant to the
main reservoir," Mr Stewart said.

"Last week, cleaning of the island's five water reservoirs was finished, but the water is still going to look a little discoloured.

"For the time being, however, the boil water notice is still in place and will be lifted by the council in consultation with Queensland Health."


Obe was the first Palm Islander to play A grade for the North Queensland Cowboys.

PALM Island Barracudas sides Gold and Green performed strongly at the Bindal Sharks Allblacks carnival in Townsville earlier this month.

A total of 16 men's teams, four women's and eight under 17 sides played on the day with the men's comp representing the most teams of any Queensland Allblacks carnival this year, just beating the 15 who played at the Arthur Beetson Foundation Murri Knockout in Brisbane the week before.

In their qualifying round matches Barracudas Green — who were a Memorial side for Stanton Wotton — 30 defeated Charters Towers side Black Bream 2 and Barracudas Gold 28 beat KASL United 18.

After those games a massive crowd watched Gold and

Green meet on field two on Saturday afternoon at the Sports Reserve in what was an entertaining contest.

2019 COOLBURRA SHIELD



A courageous Skipjacks went down 16-8 to Lavarack Barracks Rugby Club — formerly Australian Army Thunder — at this year's prestigious Bill Coolburra Memorial Shield competition, played on Palm Island, earlier this month.

LARC players travelled to Palm Island by ferry.

It was the 12th match for the shield with the Army now holding a 7-5 winning record.

It was the first time in three years the two sides have met on the Skipjack's home ground.

Skipjacks captain coach Fred Bulsey said it was a hard fought game.

"We were on top early but one of their players got injured and they got over us after that," he said.

Best players for Skipjacks were

Billo Wotton, Raoul Miller, Hamilton Taia, Karlin Murgha, Fred Bulsey jnr and his brother Isaac Bulsey.

Skipjacks made the first breakthrough with Isaac Bulsey crossing for a try in the 10th minute.

It was in the second half that Army surged scoring their first try and converting to take the lead.

Brute strength and gritty determination saw Army cross two more times before the Skipjacks struck back with a try of their The inaugural all women's Edna Coolburra Plate, named in honour of Uncle Bill's late wife, and contested by Skipjacks Ladies and Townsville side Walkabouts, also had the dust flying.

Moewaiya Youngblutt scored first for the Skipjacks, but it was the Walkabouts who dominated, winning the match 14 to 4.

Best player was Dianne Fulford and best on field award went to Lesha Dempsey from the Walkabouts.

Rugby league greats Vern Daisy and Bruno Cullen (pictured left) were just two of 100 or more players and officials at a 50-year reunion for the famous Mount Isa Miners in Townsville last month. The event was held on the exact date of the team's famous first victory in the prestigious north Queensland rugby league competition, the Foley Shield, which they won nine times between 1969 and 1988. Many of the players who represented Mount Isa during those dominating years, dubbed the 'golden era', were Indigenous with two of the greatest including Vern and his brother Frank. Vern said it was an emotional three days of catching up and celebrating with old mates such as organisers Johnny Moran, Alan Hansen & Mel Brosnan and former players Ken Muckan, Terry Hammond, Bill Bawden, Gavin Shepherd, Bob Wilson, Terry & Dennis Keefe & Bryon Woodcock.
